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

After completing his apprenticeship in the junior ranks by winning two titles in 2028 an 2019, Tooma-based horseman Travis Bandy has taken out the senior Stockman's Challenge at this year's Man From Snowy River Bush Festival.

Travis is following in his father Scott's footsteps, a five-time victor of the prestigious event. "It was a significant win for Travis but it was very special because Scott had won it five times," said Challenge co-ordinator, Jasmine Pierce.

"It's the only time a father and son have both won the challenge."

Travis has finished in the Top 10 for the past two years for 3rd and 4th placings but the 21-yearold took all before him to post a comfortable 69½ point victory over Kieren Davidson after Sunday's finals.

Previous winners, Tooma-based brothers John and David Mitchell, finished in 3rd and 4th respectively giving them Top 10 places in the past three renditions of the event.

Last year's winner Morgan Webb placed 9th overall.


The Ladies Challenge winner was Larissa Guaran who held out Chloe Mitchell by just 15 points.

Scarlett Chaston was crowned Junior Champion and the Striplings event was won by Jack Lindley.

The bush festival was thought to be the largest since its inception in its current format 1995.

Visitors were flooding into the Upper Murray over the Easter period and many of these stayed on for the extra week to take in the festival. The Corryong golf course was filled to capacity with 1000 camp sites occupied.

Health chief moves on

Corryong Health CEO, Dominic Sandilands, resigned from the position last Thursday to take up a role as Chief of Corporate Affairs at Albury Wodonga Health. His resignation will take effect from May 23, 2023.

Ms Barwick added that "Mr Sandilands will be leaving Corryong Health in a strong position in terms of its services, staff and finances. The board congratulates him and wishes him well in his new role.

"Mr Sandilands has agreed to provide support to an interim CEO who we will announce in the coming weeks. The board has already started work with the Department of Health Victoria to search for a new CEO to ensure business continuity during this recruitment period."



Case presented for demerger

Snowy Valleys residents are being invited to attend community forums to hear from Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) Demerger Business Case report author and project lead, Professor Joseph Drew of the University of Newcastle.

Professor Drew initially met with representatives of key stakeholder groups, councillors and council staff back in mid-February collecting information, feedback and individual views on the advantages and disadvantages of amalgamation to help inform his report.

Now he is coming back to present his findings to the wider Snowy Valleys community and councillors.

"I will be returning to to present the findings from my review at two community forums," said Professor Drew.

"This is now the community's opportunity to hear the evidence and

have their say.

"My approach to the forums will be to present the evidence from my research on the advantages and disadvantages of a possible de-amalgamation.

"I'll be giving a presentation for about an hour and a half, following which you will be able to ask your questions and complete a survey provided to all attendees," Professor Drew explained.

Following the community forums,

Professor Drew will work with his colleagues to finalise the completed business case which will then be presented to councillors at their May council meeting.

"At the end of the day, the decision to proceed with an application to the Minister for Local Government to demerge is one for the community and current group of councillors," said Professor Drew.

Planned burns rise as weather cools

Hundreds of Victorians are continuing to undertake private burnoffs as fire restrictions are now easing across the state.

Country Fire Authority (CFA) and partner agencies will be making the most of cooler autumn conditions to conduct fuel reduction burns to lower bushfire

risk for communities, while farmers and private landholders will also take the opportunity to ignite stubble burns on their properties.

Combined with weather conditions that will prevent smoke from dispersing into the upper atmosphere, it's predicted that smoke may hang

over the city and parts of Victoria throughout these periods.

"Along with the important planned burns that are conducted in our forests, parks and reserves led by FFMV and the many kilometres of road, rail and grassland burns that are led by the CFA, this time of year also sees


a large amount of smoke coming from the necessary burn-offs that our farmers and rural property holders complete," CFA Chief Officer, Jason Heffernan,

Smoke from wood heaters will often settle in the local area from where they are burning.

"This localised smoke

or smoke haze can often be misinterpreted as coming from planned burns from a long way away, but this is not always the case," Mr Heffernan said.

Walk among our pioneers

The old section of Corryong cemetery - now known as the Corryong Pioneer Memorial Cemetery - which served Corryong and the Upper Murray district, holds its fair share of saints, strugglers, vagabonds and rough diamonds.

Following on from the success of the Upper Murray Historical Society's 2018 Cemetery Walk it has been decided to repeat the event this year, following interruptions by bushfire and a pandemic.

The Historical Society and Man from Snowy River Museum Committee invites the community to join them on the afternoon of Sunday May 7th at 2pm for an interesting and informative tip-toe through the tombstones to be followed by a cuppa and nibbles at the Corryon RSL Hall.

The original government-sanctioned cemetery, the Towong Cemetery, was surveyed off in 1861 and has been known alternatively as the Towong Cemetery, the Gravels Plain Cemetery, the Tintaldra Cemetery and Millers Hill Cemetery. Many of the district's original pioneers are buried there.

During earlier times and even after the Towong Cemetery was founded, some of those pioneers, kin and others were buried on the properties and squatting runs where they lived and worked. Why break up families in death?

Those who haplessly died by misadventure in



remote areas or in isolated bush huts were more often than not buried on the spot by the local constabulary after a cursory and often very hurried post mortem. As was usually the case when their bodies were eventually discovered, they were not in a fit condition to remove. This very unpleasant task fell on the town's first policeman, Senior Constable Robinson, on a number of occasions. It was not until some 14 years after the township of Corryong was established that the resting place of our pioneers and their

families was relocated.

The original cemetery was deemed somewhat remote from the developing settlement that was fast growing to become the centre of the district. This move was not officially approved or planned

The Corryong Pioneer Cemetery, was "unofficially" established in 1889 when a griefstricken father forced the situation after his son Albert Edward Gerecke tragically died at the young age of nine. Rather than having him interred far from his family's abode, the bereaved father carried the boy up onto the ridge overlooking the fledgling town and buried him there in the hard granite soil.

Other graves quickly followed and the government's hand was soon forced to have the area surveyed off and gazetted for legal burials. After the cemetery was firmly established a number of graves were exhumed at Millers Hill and relocated to the new site.

The Corryong Pioneer Cemetery, in accordance with the tradition of the times, was divided into five sections - Anglican, Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist and Others or Unknowns. Separate in worship and separate in death.

"On May 7th we expect to cover six or so graves and their occupants and as like the last walk we conducted, we promise an interesting mix of personalities," said walk organiser, John Murphy.

"There will be time allocated for a few questions at the end of each discourse. If interested stick this date in your diary!"


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
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

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Blueprint released for community renewables

active in increasing the resilience of the power supply in the Upper Murray and continues to lead the way in renewables.

Working closely with community groups for the last few months, Indigo Power has developed a simple six-step blueprint as the roadmap for groups to follow and achieve 100 per cent renewable energy.

The first step is Electricity Retail: The Community Energy Hub.

"At least 100 members in each community energy hub signed up to Indigo Power retail," said Indigo Power Managing Director, Ben McGowan.

"This allows to understand a hub's profile and plan strategic interventions, like shared infrastructure or clean technology energy rollouts.

"Secondly, we share the energy amongst our customers through our energy-sharing software. This is a dashboard that gives each community the visibility it needs to reach 100 per cent renewable energy supply.

"A good hub must be actively constructed, with contributors across all membership types ie. electricity generators 30 per cent, residential electricity users 40 per cent, energy shapers 20 per cent, large daytime electricity users nine per cent and shared infrastructure one per

"Next comes the rollout of rapid small-scale deployment of the best clean energy technology," Mr McGowan said.

"Each community requires rapid deployment of solar PV systems to generate renewable energy, battery systems to store it, smart control devices for smart energy use, super efficient hot water systems to increase household energy efficiency and electric vehicle technology to decarbonise our transport.

"In the fourth step, the community gets directly involved with shared infrastructure that

community-owned. Towns need to identify and deliver the best-shared infrastructure options for each community such as large-scale rooftop solar and communityscale battery storage, EV charging at public charging stations and even pumped hydro energy storage and other community-scale assets on a case-by-case basis.

"This can only happen if there is a community energy group made up of passionate people for renewables," he explained.

"Each hub needs a team of local champions, to be the renewable energy leaders in their community energy hub, to drive change and to bring their community along with

"Indigo Power committed to supporting our community energy champions and convenes the Community Energy Network, a network of community renewable groups from energy Australia, across who come together to share knowledge, resources and advice.

"The piece final is giving back to the community. Indigo Power is 100 per cent Australian and community-owned, and as a certified social enterprise, 50 per cent of profits are returned to our communities.

"This blueprint resulted from many years of working with communities in the renewables space," Mr McGowan said.

"There is so much confusion out there and knowing where to start can be daunting.

We're pleased to be able to work with Community Energy Groups to increase


renewable energy supply in Australia and help guide them in their endeavours.

"Our work delivering impactful projects has taught us what is needed. Projects like the Yackandandah community battery and energy resilience projects in the Upper Murray and Tumbarumba with more than 30 energy node systems installed, three community batteries and more than 80 superefficientt heat pumps.'

Donald Mace, General Electricity Manager Retail, said partnering with communities to tackle climate change is at the core of the business.

"We are collaborate with communities and aim to work with as many groups as possible," he said.

"It is exciting to be part of a genuine movement at the community level that sees the importance of making changes now."

Ferry service closed for vital work


one of two Murray River ferries that cross the border from NSW to Victoria, will be closed for up to seven weeks for essential maintenance work.

A Transport NSW spokesperson said vehicular ferries on the Murray River need to be serviced every five years to ensure they meet government safety regulations and provide a safe and reliable service for ferry users.

"The overhaul of the three-car ferry will involve inspecting, servicing and replacing parts as well as cleaning and painting," the spokesperson said.

"The Wymah Ferry is an important service for the small rural communities around the area including Wymah, Granya, Talgarno and Bowna.

"It is one of two cable ferries crossing the Murray River between NSW and Victoria, the other being



The ferry service won't be running for seven weeks.

the Speewa Ferry near Swan Hill."

Work will be carried out on the ferry from Monday 1 May to Friday 16 June. Motorists will be unable to cross the Murray

River between Wymah and Granya during this time.

"Every effort will be made to reopen earlier, if possible," the Transport for NSW spokesperson

An alternative route across the Murray River is available to motorists at either the Bethanga or Jingellic bridges. These detours will add 80 kilometres or 130 kilometres respectively to the trip and up to one hour and 15 minutes.

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
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BUSH FESTIVAL BRINGS US TOGETHER

The event culminated with the Carol Reffold Memorial One Minute Poem competition, where entrants had to incorporate a line from the Man From Snowy River: "a household word today" or use the topic 'Corryong characters'. This year's winner, determined by audience applause, was David Stanley for his poem about poet Phil McManus.

Bullioh has been a traditional finals threat and will remain so under co-mentors Aaron Gordon and Clint Ried, despite being quiet on the recruiting front. The Dogs were the team to trouble Tumbarumba the most

last season and are likely to add to their playing list over the coming weeks.
