Community urged to speak up on phone services

Independent Member for Indi, Helen Haines, is encouraging individuals and community groups to take part in a federal

examining the existing and future telecommunication needs of regional communities.

The Regional Telecommunications Review

is held every three years to investigate equitable access to telecommunications services across regional Australia.

"This review is an opportunity for people across Indi to tell the federal government directly the about challenges they

because of poor phone and internet services," Dr Haines said.

"Since becoming the Member for Indi, I have worked tirelessly with local communities, councils and other organisations to improve phone and internet connectivity in key affected areas."

Dr Haines helped to secure a public consultation for the review in the electorate of Indi at the Benalla Town Hall on May 3.

"Regional communities are held back by unreliable NBN coverage, mobile phone blackspots and slow internet speeds during peak holiday periods," Dr Haines said.

"We should not have to settle for second-rate telecommunications. Reliable internet and mobile phone coverage are not 'nice to haves' our modern society relies on them to run businesses, work from home, study and access crucial healthcare services."

Anyone impacted by poor services is encouraged to attend the public consultation on Friday 3 May at the Benalla Town Hall from 10:00am to 11:30am.

School upgrades welcomed



Major works are planned for the Walwa primary school.

Six public schools across the Indi electorate including one in the Towong Shire, will benefit from \$3.5 million awarded under the Commonwealth Schools Upgrade Fund.

The investment will fund vital infrastructure projects that promote safe, modern and inspiring learning environments for primary school students.

Federal Member for Indi, Helen Haines, informed local schools of the grant opportunity earlier this year and wrote letters of support for some of their submissions.

The second round of the Schools Upgrade Fund was open to all public schools for large-scale capital works projects and the Walwa Primary School was successful in securing \$612,696 to replace hardcourt areas including supporting drainage renewal works and to upgarde the playground including a shade sail.

"Our young people need safe and modern learning environments to thrive, so it is fantastic to see this funding flow to schools which need it in Indi," Dr Haines said.

"Upgrades to playgrounds, sports grounds outdoor spaces and fundamental amenities such as toilets support student wellbeing and engaged learning experiences.

"This much-needed investment will be enthusiastically welcomed by students, parents and teachers alike," Dr Haines added.

College art inspires pride in heroes

Towong Shire libraries in Corryong and Tallangatta are showcasing a collection of local war heroes assembled by Year 6 students in the region, as part of an Anzac Day research project.

Using digitised service records from the National Archives of Australia, students created informative posters detailing the service history of individuals listed on their town's war memorials, transforming them into vivid representations of local heroes who fought for our freedom.

Approximately 8

posters are on display at both the Elyne Mitchell Library in Corryong and the Tallangatta Integrated Community Centre (library) until May 4th.

Opening the Corryong exhibition on Tuesday, Towong mayor, Cr Andrew Whitehead, expressed his appreciation for the initiative.

"This collaborative effort between our libraries and local schools is a testament to our commitment to honour and remember the sacrifices made by our servicemen and women," he said

"It's heartening to see our younger generation engage with our history in such a meaningful way.

"These posters educate and inspire our community which, in turn, gives us a greater sense of pride and unity in our community."

Spotlight goes on council services

Federal Member for Indi, Helen Haines, will be part of a committee investigating the financial sustainability and service delivery obligations of local governments over the coming months.

In March the House Representatives Standing Committee on Regional Development, Infrastructure and Transport launched an inquiry to examine and report challenges on impacting local governments and their delivery of services to the community.

"Since being elected as the Independent Member for Indi, I have worked closely with the nine regional councils that cover the electorate," Dr Haines said.

"What I hear time and again from mayors, councillors and CEOs is that their local government budgets do not stretch far enough to cover the needs of their communities which rely on councils to

deliver essential services such as maintaining local roads so that their safe to drive on, putting in the critical infrastructure needed to build more homes and looking after the spaces that bring our communities together.

"Beyond meeting core infrastructures needs of communities, some councils also provide important community services such as childcare, aged care, disability and local health services. We must ensure councils can continue to fund these important community amenities.

"While we cannot preempt what the inquiry will learn from public submissions and hearings, I look forward to working with my parliamentary colleagues to find solutions to current challenges and make recommendations for the federal government to act upon."

The inquiry's terms of reference will include:-

An understanding of

the financial sustainability and funding of local government;

- The changing infrastructure and service delivery obligations of local government;
- Attracting retaining a skilled workforce in the local government sector;
- Structural barriers to security for local government workers and service delivery; and
- The role of the federal government in addressing issues raised during the inquiry.

"As regional Independent MP, I will be particularly interested in the committee examining the challenges faced by local governments in meeting the needs of communities in regional, rural, and remote areas,' Dr Haines said.

"Thriving, prosperous regional communities require consistent and effective delivery and management of services and critical infrastructure."

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
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Audience was abuzz with questions

bee tragic", Karen Retra of Albury, recently gave a fascinating exposé on the lives and habits of the little native insect critters inhabiting the Australian bush and buzzing around in our gardens.

Straight off the back of the bush festival, the evening was well attended and during and afterwards Karen's talk, many questions were asked which highlighted the curiosity of the audience.

In response to one question, Karen replied that there are more then 2000 native bee species in Australia that have so far been scientifically described and perhaps another 500 to a 1000 species not yet formally described or even yet

a tiny bee about 2mm long to the large yellow and black carpenter bee which grows to about 24mm in length.

Karen also said during the evening that, unlike the European Honey Bee which is now under threat, only a very few Australian species are colonial and produce honey. Most are loners.

The pollinator seminar was hosted by the Corryong Wetlands group.

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Farmers have a say on mental health

For most, farming in Australia is a great way of life but at times it can also be physically and psychologically tough.

So, when things get overly stressful, who do farmers turn to for support?

Finding out what farmers want in terms of mental health support is the focus of a new University of South Australia study, with researchers looking to establish who farmers turn to once they've exhausted their personal coping systems through family and friends.

The rate of suicide among farmers is twice that of other employed people. However, farmers are half as likely to have visited a GP or mental health professional in the last 12 months, compared to non-farm rural workers.

UniSA researcher, Dr Donna Hughes-Barton, says it's vital to hear from farmers to understand how best to support their mental health.

"Farmers face multiple barriers to accessing mainstream physical and mental health care," Dr Hughes-Barton says.

"There are fewer faceto-face services in rural areas, which means it can be difficult for farmers to access mental health support. We also know from our previous research that distrust can be a problem when farmers feel



that health professionals do not always understand life on the land.

"Farmers are very adept problem-solvers and while this a great quality to have in a practical sense, they tend to 'tough it out' when it comes to their mental health, rather than reaching out for support from others.

"Increasingly, health bodies are trying to raise farmers' awareness about mental health issues and the importance of asking for help when needed. However, there is a gap in the research about what farmers respond to and want to see from mental health and wellbeing support services.

"This study aims to fill this gap. We want to know what farmers do when they're experiencing stress, and they've maxed out their coping strategies and support from friends and family.

"We also want to know what support mechanisms farmers would be prepared to engage with once they have reached this point."

Led by Associate Professor Kate Gunn and the ifarmwell team at UniSA, the study is supported by National Farmers Federation, the National Centre for Farmer Health, and Lifeline Australia.

"Our team is committed to promoting good health and wellbeing for farmers and their communities and we are passionate about developing and delivering services based on what farmers tell us they want and need," Professor Gunn

"Farmers' voices are at the centre of our work and that's why we're inviting farmers to have their say in how supports and services for them are developed and delivered in the future."

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Corryong CBD Update



Work resumed on the Corryong CBD Streetscape project on Monday, 22 April.

Currently, our focus is on decommissioning two underground fuel tanks, and we anticipate completing this by the week's end. Additionally, we're conducting soil testing around the remaining tanks to gauge contamination levels, which will inform any necessary soil removal.

Once the decommissioning is complete, we'll shift our attention to completing Stage 2 of the project, which is on track to begin next week.

Preparations are also underway to commence work on the eastbound side of Hanson Street, from the Memorial Hall to the Man from Snowy River Arcade. Plans for this section, including increased parking bay depth, are currently under review by VicRoads for approval. As we gear up for demolition work on this side of the street in the coming weeks, we'll promptly notify affected businesses of the start date.

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Burnoffs can cause health concerns

With fire restrictions having eased in most parts of the state including the Towong Shire and calm autumn conditions prevailing, hundreds of private, agricultural and planned burns are expected to take place in the coming weeks.

While current conditions are ideal for burning, weather patterns may cause smoke to linger over parts of the state overnight and through to early morning.

Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) Chief Fire Officer, Chris Hardman, said it was crucial fire agencies took advantage of favourable conditions when they presented.

"Planned burning on public land is one of the tools FFMVic uses to keep Victoria safer from bushfires," Mr Hardman said.

"While we burn to the conditions not the calendar, autumn generally gives our crews more opportunities to conduct planned burns as the weather is more stable and fire behaviour is manageable and generally predictable.

"With the current favourable weather and forest conditions, we are dedicating all available resources to deliver planned burning.

"Reducing fine fuels such as grass, leaves, bark, shrubs and fallen branches means fires are less intense and slower to spread, making it more likely that firefighters can keep bushfires small and contained before they pose a risk to communities.

"Smoke can be a result of private resident or agricultural burns, chimney smoke or planned burns. We work closely with and use information from the Environment Protection Authority (EPA) and Bureau of Meteorology to keep the smoke impact from planned burns as low as practically possible and inform the community while delivering program.

"Victorians can also

sign up for planned burn notifications to prepare for any impact on their health or activities."

CFA Chief Officer, Jason Heffernan, is also urging Victorians to research and understand permit requirements before conducting private burn-offs.

Victoria's Chief Environmental Scientist, Professor Mark Patrick Taylor, said the EPA understands smoke from any source including planned burns and private burnoffs can cause health concerns.

"Be prepared by watching for FFMVic planned burn notifications and by checking the air quality for your area through the EPA's AirWatch air monitoring system," Professor Taylor said.

"Your nose is also au/for-community/

an excellent smoke detector. If you can smell smoke, take the necessary precautions to protect your health."

For the latest information about when and where planned burns are happening near you, visit https://plannedburns.ffm.vic.gov.au/

Detailed information about current air quality throughout Victoria can be found on the EPA's website.

If you see or smell smoke outside, you should reduce your exposure to smoke by staying indoors and closing your windows and doors – but only if it's safe to do so.

Keep your burn off safe and legal:-

• Check fire restrictions in your area and always register your burn at www. firepermits.vic.gov.au or by calling 1800 668 511

• Check and monitor weather conditions – particularly wind

• To avoid unnecessary calls to emergency services, notify your neighbours beforehand

• Leave a three-metre fire break, free from flammable materials around the burn

• Have sufficient equipment and water to stop the fire spreading

• Never leave a burnoff unattended – stay for its entire duration

• If your burn-off gets out of control, call '000' immediately

As a neighbour to Bogandyera Nature Reserve, Clarkes Hill Nature Reserve, Jingellic Nature Reserve and/or Kosciuszko National Park, the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) would like to inform you that it will be continuing to undertake ongoing 1080 baiting programs in all of these reserves from 1st May, 2024 until 1st November, 2024. These ongoing programs will include the use of both baits and canid pest ejectors that contain 1080 poison.

Additionally, Aerial Baiting will occur in the above reserves and National Parks between the 8th May, 2024 until the 17th May, 2024.

Please be aware that 1080 baits and ejectors are particularly lethal to domestic dogs and cats and as such you must ensure that pets and working dogs do not enter these reserves. In the event of accidental poisoning seek immediate veterinary assistance.

These activities are aimed at controlling wild dogs and foxes in accordance with the Upper Murray Wild Dog Management Plan and are being undertaken in conjunction with other stakeholders of the Upper Murray Wild Dog Working Group.




