Haines updated on community projects

Independent Federal Member for Indi, Helen Haines, visited the Upper Murray last week, receiving progress reports on bushfire recovery projects including the new battery and solar energy system at Corryong Health, the Playles Hill Park project and the Tintaldra Recreation Reserve upgrade.

The Upper Murray Place Based Power Plan was awarded \$2.17 million by Bushfire Recovery Victoria Local Economic Recovery fund and includes a 66kW solar PV system and 303kWh batteries.

"This initiative is a fantastic demonstration of what renewable

energy can do to improve energy resilience and reduce power bills for regional communities like Corryong," Dr Haines said.

"It will address the reliability, vulnerability and variability of the region's electricity supply, which in the 2019-2020 bushfires meant power-outages lasted for weeks in Corryong and district including loss of communications."

The new energy system also assists in reducing Corryong Health's day-to-day electricity use, lowering their power bills. Even with a new onsite laundry service and increased health workers living onsite, Corryong

Health reduced its usage by 19 per cent and saved \$1,300 on its March power bills.

Dr Haines also inspected progress at Playles Hill Park, where volunteers explained the progress they are making and the plans for a labyrinth on the western slope of the park with a stunning but peaceful view.

"This volunteer-led project is moving ahead in leaps and bounds," Dr Haines said.

"I have seen it at a few stages now and it is incredible to see the way the community is building this space that will serve locals and visitors alike."

Get involved with park plans



The path adjacent to the pavilion is taking shape.

Redevelopment works at Playles Hill are progressing and the vision of a park for everyone to enjoy is taking shape.

The new viewing platform and undercover pavilion / barbecue are now open.

"The views from the platform are stunning and it is a great place to look over Corryong, Mt Mittamatite and the valley," said project group member, Cathy Ross.

"There is still some work to be done on the approach to the platform and the barbecue and lighting is still to be installed.

"Local contractor, Nigel Mouat, has done a terrific job with the pathways connecting the rotunda, pavilion and toilet block. This has removed the eyesore of the old broken pathway and has tied all of the construction elements together. He has also placed some large rocks to better define the car parks at the viewing platform and toilet block.

"Earlier this month Towong Shire organised an arborist to work on the trees in the park to remove dead branches and shape the trees and they are looking much better. A number of sick and dead trees are still to be removed.

"It is wonderful to see the number of our young people who have been taking advantage of the bike track which was opened just prior to Christmas last year.

"There are still jobs to be done but the project is nearing completion.

"Now that the majority of the infrastructure works are complete, the focus can shift to the re-establishment of the planted areas of the park," Cathy added.

The Playles Hill Project Group is now inviting all community members to get involved with the next stages of improving the park.

"We will be starting regular working bees - on the last Sunday of each month," Cathy said.

"Our first working bee for 2023 will be this Sunday 30th April at 10am.

"Bring your own lunch and at 12 noon we will make time to sit in the pavilion and have discussions for further working bees etc. We will recommence work at 1pm

for the people who are willing and able.

"The areas that we are able to work on are in front of the rotunda, around the toilet block and the area near the bike track. Tools required are chainsaws, brush-cutters, picks, shovels and pruners. We also need people with gloves to just move and stack the cut material.

"Once the infrastructure work is completed on the viewing deck we hope to be able to commence planting in this area. As other areas are progressively cleared of the woody weeds and invasive vegetation we will be able to extend plantings across these parts of the park."

Dr Haines also visited Corryong FoodShare, where Pastor Carol Allen provided her with updates on the organisation's imminent move to new premises in Harris Street.

First to fall remembered

In his welcome to the Anzac Day service in Corryong on Tuesday, RSL sub-branch secretary, Greg Nankervis, told of how two towns half a world apart were honouring the memory of a young Upper Murray soldier this year.

Malcolm Chisholm was the first Australian to die and the first of some 60,000 Australians who lost their lives on the First World War battlefields.

He was the elder son of Dr and Mrs William Chisholm. Malcolm's mother was Emma Isabel Mitchell from Bringenbrong, daughter of Thomas and Charlotte Mitchell. Having passed out of the Royal Military College Sandhurst in England, Malcolm was commissioned into the 1st Battalion East Lancashire Regiment.

After only four days in action, he was wounded on 26 August, 1914 and died the following day in the church in the northern French village of Ligny-



en-Cambresis.

Born on 25 February 1892 in his family's Sydney home he was only 22 years old.

His grave lies with six other soldiers in a small Commonwealth War Graves Commission plot in the cemetery in Ligny-en-Cambresis.

Malcolm's death has resonated through more than a century and well beyond the Upper Murray. His story captured the imagination of commemorative portrait painter George Petrou OAM who painted a striking likeness of the young soldier.

George presented his original portrait of Malcolm to L'ANZAC-Cambresis in France at its service on April 26th.

George's painting and the generous purchase of the print by The Man from Snowy River Bush

Festival Board for the Corryong Memorial and RSL Hall, has connected Upper Murray World War 1 heritage to another small town half a world away.

Truck driver killed

A fatal crash in the Snowy Mountains involving a subcontractor on the Snowy 2.0 project has been described as a "complete tragedy."

A subcontracted worker driving a B-triple truck carrying pre-cast concrete for the project was travelling on the Snowy Mountains Highway at Dry Plain near Adaminaby on Monday afternoon when his truck crashed, rolled and caught fire.

NSW Police say the driver, a man believed to be in his 50s, was trapped and died at the scene.

A crime scene was established and forensically examined, with police continuing to investigate the circumstances surrounding the crash.

Snowy Hydro has extended its deepest condolences to the family, friends and workmates of the deceased man.

Snowy Hydro CEO, Dennis Barnes, said the incident was incredibly distressing.

"This is a tragic event and we are supporting our Snowy 2.0 principal contractor, Future

Generation Joint Venture (FGJV), our teams and all those impacted in the community at this very sad and difficult time," he said.

"The welfare of Snowy 2.0 workers are our immediate priority and project operations have temporarily ceased."

A spokesperson for Future Generation Joint Venture (FGJV) said the company extends its condolences to the driver's family, friends and co-workers.

"Our thoughts are with them in this sad and difficult time," they said.

"Arrangements have been made for our workforce to access confidential counselling and support from dedicated clinicians through our employee assistance program.

"This is a tragic incident for the Snowy 2.0 project and Future Generation is focused on supporting our workforce during this time.

"Safety and the wellbeing of our workforce will always remain the main priority of Future Generation and our JV partners."

Strategic water rights purchasing to bridge the gap to deliver Murray-Darling Basin Plan outcomes

The Australian Government, represented by the Department of Climate Change, Energy, the Environment and Water, is seeking to purchase permanent water rights of up to 44.3 gigalitres per year (GL/y) across six catchments in New South Wales and southern Queensland to help deliver the Sustainable Diversion Limits (SDLs) in the Murray-Darling Basin Plan.

Great news for the country that won't cost a cent



An open letter to Treasurer Jim Chalmers regarding the Budget

Dear Dr Chalmers,

There's a crisis in our country you can fix in your first budget, at no extra cost.

With the stroke of a pen you could help secure the future of critical regional news services, using money already allocated in the budget.

All you need to do is allocate a fairer percentage of the federal government's advertising budget to local and regional news services, rather than spending almost all of it with corporate capital city media and foreign-owned digital platforms (which don't produce any content or employ any journalists).

This can be achieved by simply adopting the Victorian Govt policy that mandates a weekly full page government advertisement in every regional and community paper.

Local and regional newspapers connect more than 80% of the country, but they get almost 0% of the government advertising spend.

In an era where false news spreads faster on social media than the truth does, trusted local news services reach more regional Australians than any other medium.

And unlike other media, every government dollar spent with a local newspaper is also an investment in regional journalism jobs.

This shouldn't be controversial.

A recent parliamentary inquiry recommended that a minimum of 20% of government print advertising should be placed with regional news services. A recent study conducted by Deakin University recommended the same thing. In fact, the Minister for Communications, Michelle Rowland, has been advocating for more regional newspaper advertising for many years.

We know there may be bigger budget issues, but this small policy change would be a simple and fair solution to a growing problem for regional Australia.

A policy that ensures weekly federal government advertising is placed in regional newspapers would be great news for the country.

And it won't cost you a cent.

The National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) will continue ongoing 1080 (sodium fluoroacetate) baiting programs for the control of wild dogs and foxes from 1st May, 2023 until 1st November, 2023 in the following reserves.

- Bogandyera Nature Reserve
- Jingellic Nature Reserve
- Clarkes Hill Nature Reserve
- Kosciuszko National Park

These ongoing programs will include the use of baits and canid pest ejectors that contain 1080 poison. In addition, NPWS will 1080 aerial bait from 1st May to 5th May, 2023 in these reserves.

All baiting locations will be identifiable to the public through signage around the baited areas.

Be aware that 1080 baits and ejectors are particularly lethal to domestic dogs and cats. As such, you must please ensure pets and working dogs do not enter these reserves. In the event of accidental poisoning seek immediate veterinary assistance.
