

"The program will help these towns to transition away from a native timber industry by identifying new opportunities for their long-term future," Ms Thomas said.

"We are supporting businesses and local communities to take control of their future, seek new opportunities and create more jobs."

Under the program, an independent project officer will engage with locals, community groups, businesses and government over a twoyear period to identify each town's strengths, assets, challenges and opportunities for innovation and economic development. The officers will be appointed through each town's local council

or community group. The nine towns will join Noojee, Orbost, Yarram and Heyfield which have already commenced work on their Local Development Strategies.

The communities will also have access to the recently announced \$22 million Community Transition and Development Fund, which will also support communities in transition to implement new strategies.

"The Local Development Strategy grants are a key part of the more than \$200 million Victorian Forestry Plan, ensuring communities are well supported through the transition," Ms Thomas said.

Support group helps boys in need

"I love being involved. I want to make a difference."

Those are the words of Richard Hamilton who is the operations manager of a large family dairy business in the Mitta Valley of north east Victoria which supplies Bega Cheese.

Richard's words are synonymous with two separate passions - his role on the dairy farm and his work with an organisation called Boys to the Bush which aims to provide direction and hope for young men who are caught up in a challenging home environment.

Richard, who represented the UK in rowing at the Atlanta Olympics in 1998, is the ambassador for Boys to the Bush and apart from hosting boys aged between seven and 17 on the Mitta farm, he also speaks at functions organised by community groups to help spread the word of the need to help, support and sponsor the organisation.

Richard said the demographic of boys the group was assisting had the worst outcomes in the developed world in terms of suicide, incarceration, education, employment, and poverty.

"That is why we are focusing on them," he said. environment they were born into, a large proportion of the boys we are assisting are the those who are most likely to grow into men that are absent fathers, do not respect women or become perpetrators of domestic violence.

"Because

"By intervening early with these boys, we are doing a hell of a lot for girls and women in the future. It is a proactive not reactive approach. Goverments spend billions of dollars on women's shelters, domestic violence interventions and child welfare. Then there's

the costs of incarcerations. "Investing in these kids in their more formative years will have a massive social benefit return to the communities that invest the most."

Many farmers and tradespeople in the north east of Victorian and the southern Riverina of New South Wales host boys for a day or at overnight camps either individually or in small organised groups. They are encouraged to take part in farm activities or just feel what it's like to be able to climb a tree, fish in a farm dam and cook around the campfire.

Richard said the group was running a few camps for some girls, mainly siblings of some of the regular boys.

"We have some skilled and passionate women now working for us and they will continue to run just a few of these camps a year but boys are our

focus." he said. Boys to the Bush is a not-for-profit charity that was set up five years ago by three former school teachers in Southern NSW. It currently operates using a 'user pays' model of funding, which is typically distributed by a child's case worker from the allowance allocated to children in out-of-home

²⁵ care or through the NDIS.
 ¹⁰ The organisation is also seeking sponsors to support and broaden the

project. "We are continuing to grow, both in the number of kids we are assisting, in staff numbers and geographically and 2022 will see us established in Albury, Forbes, Bathurst, and Wangaratta," Richard said.

"We employ 73 full time and casual people and we anticipate we will see more that 5000 kids in 2022. Of these, we will potentially make real, lifesaving progress with more than 1000 of them.

"We are well on our way to achieving our vision of assisting 130,000 kids by 2030."

The Mitta farm,

operated by the Paton family, hosts boys on a regular basis and is now employing full time some of them who have taken part in the Boys to the Bush program.

Richard also paid tribute to the Paton family for its involvement and support.

"We need more people to come on board and help out either with their time or with sponsorship," he said.

"This is a very worthwhile community project."

He was a long-standing committee member and president of the Nariel Creek Folk Festival and was incredibly dedicated to the continuation of this historic annual event.


Ian was also a skilled mechanic, woodworker, bushman, handyman, fisherman, gardener, farmer, firefighter, darts player and cook.

Reiland ricochets to a record price

Local breeders were active at the recent Reiland autumn bull sale where stud and commercial buyers jockeyed for high credentialled bulls, pushing the sale average up by \$7629 on 2021 to set a new record average of \$19,479 and a new top price of \$64,000.

Interfaced with AuctionsPlus, the sale was hosted by the Lucas family at Killimicat Station, Tumut last Thursday and drew 55 registered buyers from NSW and Victoria.

A total of 71 bulls were offered and sold to a top of \$64,000, a gross of \$1,383,000 and an average of \$19,479 - up \$1856 on the previous record set last spring.

New client, Ian Bates, Riddellvue Angus at Alexandra, secured the top price bull, Lot 40, Reiland Ricochet R952, eclipsing the previous sale record of \$38,000 set at the spring 2021 sale.

20-month-old The bull weighed 736kg, had a scrotal circumference of 40cm and was sired by Reiland Nimbo N116. Ricochet ranked in the top three per cent for calving ease, top eight per cent for birthweight, top one per cent for intramuscular fat and top two per cent for days to calving.

Reiland Angus retained 30 per cent semen and marketing rights in the elite sire and he will be included in the bull team at World Wire Sires Mr Bates said Ricochet

complete was the phenotypic and structural package.

"He is a good fleshing bull with a great number set from front to back and he will do a great job in our program," he said.

"He will be semen collected and used over our first calf heifers."

Reiland Angus coprincipal, Mark Lucas, described the result as overwhelming in both terms of clearance and the overall average. "It was pleasing to see

the bull we identified as clearly being one of the best we have ever bred in 50 years commanding a big figure of \$64,000," Mr Lucas said.

"It's wonderful а experience to have a bull identified, recognised and located in a registered herd and potentially across the Angus breed.

"The underbidders on that bull were two commercial producers who had combined forces to buy an elite bull to use over their 800 heifers to input exceptional genetic gain at an economic figure.

"That bull is the second calf of the cow whose first calf Reiland Plymouth sold for \$28.000.

"There were six new buyers and it was great to see the positive comments about the uniformity of

the bulls on offer." The second top price of \$46,000 was paid by long time clients, Graham and Judy Houston, of Houston Pastoral at Burrowye for Reiland Ravish R718, a son of Reiland Kiwi K201.

Ravish ranked top one per cent for intramuscular fat on BREEDPLAN and Reiland retained 50 per cent semen and marketing rights.

Nick Gilvarry, Elders Tumut, said repeat and new clients competed strongly with bulls for every type of buyer at the sale.

"There were a lot of commercial buyers wanting growth in the cattle, carcase traits and low birthweight," he said.

"Our clients are having one of their best seasons yet, made some money out of their calves and are prepared to put it back into bulls." Reiland's private treaty bull sale will be held on May 17, the spring bull sale on September 2 and the stud is gearing up for a special female sale on AuctionsPlus on May 13.





Protected status creates discrepancy

An action plan recently released by the government Victorian which acknowledges the devastating impact feral deer have on the state's environment, has been questioned by the Invasive Species Council (ISC), as the pest continues to be protected by law in Victoria as a game species for hunting.

"It's a bizarre discrepancy," said Victorian-based ISC Deer Officer, Peter Project Jacobs.

"The new Peri-urban Deer Control Plan is the first of three action plans for the state which is intended to control expanding feral deer numbers in the outskirts of eastern and northern Melbourne.

"Feral deer are increasingly moving into Melbourne's suburbs. creating road hazards, destroying crops and gardens, contaminating critical water supply catchments and damaging national parks and the few remaining patches of urban bushland.



"The ISC welcomes the new plan and its explicit acknowledgement of the devastating social, cultural, economic and environmental impacts of feral deer as well as what needs to be done to control this pest.

"But only so much can be achieved while feral deer remain protected under state law.

"It's going to take bold decisions to push back feral deer from Victoria's suburbs. The time is ripe for the Victorian government to show it is serious about the impact of feral deer and remove their antiquated protected status from the Wildlife Act.

"Only then can they be rightly classified as a pest species and their control be unhindered by the interests of a small number of hunting lobby groups," Mr Jacobs said.





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
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Haines backs business leaders on integrity

Independent Federal Member for Indi Helen Haines has backed the results of a new national survey from the Australian Institute of Company Directors (AICD) which found more than 70 per cent of company directors surveyed are in favour of a federal anti-corruption watchdog.

The AICD survey also found more than 50 per cent of directors do not trust the federal government.

"This is extremely concerning for business confidence and a strong economic recovery," Dr Haines said.

"It is especially worrying at a time when gross national debt is teetering on \$1 trillion and households are being hit with cost of living pressures and future interest rate rises.

"It is simple economics. Taxpayer dollars should be invested in projects with clear returns on investment, not sweetheart deals to protect political careers or to win votes. Business leaders are astute economic managers and can see right through the waste.

"The establishment of a robust federal integrity commission with teeth, like the one I have prosecuted in parliament for the past three years, would restore trust and save us billions.

"If there was less waste and more accountability, we could slash waiting times for GPs, reduce wait times and gap fees for psychologists and build new hospitals and aged care facilities."

Dr Haines was the most vocal advocate for an integrity commission this parliament, tabling her own Australian Federal

Integrity Commission Bill in 2020 when "it became clear the Prime Minister had broken his election promise to establish one." "The government

"The government does not want an integrity commission with teeth, because it knows it will prevent them from using billions in taxpayer funds to buy votes at election time.

"If it was not for a strong independent voice in parliament like mine, the Prime Minister may have got away with it," Dr Haines said.



A spirited public plea from the Federal Football Netball Club has resulted in the recruitment of enough footballers to field senior and reserves teams in the 2022 Upper Murray League competition.

This threw a spanner in the works as the league's constitution specifies that all clubs must have a senior football team or the club cannot compete at all ie. at any level, in football or netball.

The Swans lodged an appeal against the decision which was scheduled to be heard at a league meeting on Monday night but that afternoon the appeal was withdrawn.

In the last week, the publicity surrounding Federal's plight had prompted a wave of support enabling the club to fulfil the league's requirements.

Although confident of fielding seniors and reserves on Saturday, the Swans are still looking for more players to ensure they can compete on a aqeekly basis.
