Hub closes but support continues

The Upper Murray community came together on Sunday to mark the closure of the Upper Murray Recovery Hub and to celebrate the strength of its people.

Located at the former junior school campus in Corryong the hub has played a significant role in responding to the recovery and the building

of community strength after the 2019-20 Black Summer Bushfires.

"Five years on, we want to acknowledge the incredible resilience of the community in partnering with council and state and federal governments to achieve some amazing initiatives," said Towong Shire mayor, Cr Andrew Whitehead.

"The hub has been a beacon of courage and support since the devastating bushfires of late 2019 and early 2020. It's played a crucial role in our community's recovery by offering everything from counselling and financial advice to employment support, business development and community organisation meetings.

"This would not have been possible without the tireless efforts of the recovery team, residents, volunteers and

the financial support of governments and philanthropic organisations."

Sunday's event saw an impressive turnout of community members and stakeholders, all eager to celebrate the recovery journey. Highlights included delicious finger food from Café Corryong Brew, enchanting performances by Per Westman and the Fruit Fly Circus, live music by local talents Paige Heinjus and Mountain Alliance, creative face painting by

the Corryong Youth Group and inspiring speeches from dignitaries.

"This event marks a transition in council support for the community impacted by these fires," Cr Whitehead said.

"Although council will no longer operate a recovery hub, we will continue to provide referral support to people as they need it via our Community Development Team.

"Council acknowledges that the recovery journey is a long and ongoing process and individuals will require different support at various phases in their recovery."

Highlights of the recovery journey have been compiled into a video that was displayed on the day and a *Celebration of Recovery* book is available online via the council website at www.towong.vic.gov.au.

The book will also be available to browse through at the Tallangatta Library, Tallangatta Neighbourhood House, Corryong Neighbourhood Centre, Corryong Library, and Corryong Visitor Information Centre.

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Doors open for young talent

A music career beckons for young singer-songwriter Paige Heinjus following a breakout year in which she won the Towong Shire 2023 'Battle of the Bands' competition and the Junior Bush Idol title at the 2024 Man From Snowy River Bush Festival, with an original composition.

The talented 16-year-old also supported Golden Guitar winner Fanny Lumsden on her Country Halls tour at the Khancoban show in February (on a week's notice!) and most recently, she performed at the Upper Murray community recovery celebration on Sunday.

She also performs at local venues and is quickly developing a fan following.

Paige became interested in music around age 10 and is self-taught on guitar and "dabbles in piano and saxophone". She also enjoys writing and singing her own songs and her influences include artists such as Taylor Swift, Ed Sheeran, Fleetwood Mac and of course, Fanny Lumsden.

Performing on guitar with a voice warm and authentic, Paige writes songs using a range of diverse genres from timeless pop melodies and lyrical hooks, to country and captivating folk music.

Paige recently graduated from an Academy of Country Music junior program at Tamworth, just one of 27 young artists accepted for the course, which involved eight days of intensive tuition and master classes.

"It was pretty full-on but a wonderful opportunity to work with and learn from some great artists," Paige said.

"I got to co-write a song with Piper Butcher who made the last 24 of Australian Idol and The Bushwackers band, which was really cool."

She also co-wrote and performed songs with the mates she made on the course.

"I also did my first radio interview which was a bit daunting!" Paige added.

The experience has inspired her to pursue her love of singing and

songwriting and a career in music in some way.

"I want to continue performing and maybe become a music teacher at

Grocer goes preservative free

Cam and Dee Harmer are taking the first few steps to only stocking items that do not contain any kind of artificial ingredients at their Providore in Khancoban.

The idea to only use preservative free items has long been a vested dream for the couple.

Their aim is that by the end of 2025 the Pickled Parrot Providore will only stock preservative free items in the grocery store and only cook with preservative free items in the café.

By reducing their preservative items the Harmers want to showcase local produce at its best and making cooking much simpler.

"It really is rather easy to cook without preservatives," Cam said.

"We have been doing it for years, only now we choose to make it a thing in our grocery section of the providore."

So far throughout the first six months of 2024 Cam and Dee have been slowly reducing items from the grocery store including bottled juice, muesli bars and tinned foods which have been replaced with preservative

free options. This has been a gradual change, simply of when one item sells out, they have been re-ordering the alternative.

While the change is still underway the couple is very excited for what the future holds for their shop.

"The community is yet to really take much notice of the change because of who we are and how we cook has always kept in line with preservative free, wholesome cooking anyway," Dee said.

"It's the changes to the grocer that have been so slow and gradual but it has never really come as a shock to anyone that our next step was to become fully preservative free by 2025."

The couple originally hoped to have their store sitting under the preservative free banner by next year but they say they will feel more confident saying the end of 2025 will ensure no food wastage occurs during this change. The Pickled Parrot Providore is open seven days a week and welcomes everyone to come and experience their food, shop their local giftware and stock up on weekly grocery supplies.

Enrol now for council election

Victorian Electoral Commissioner, Sven Bluemmel, has issued a call to Towong Shire residents and ratepayers to be ready to have their say in the upcoming election in October.

"Make sure you're enrolled correctly by the close of roll, which is 4pm on Wednesday August 7th," he advised.

"As this is a postal election - a safe and completely secret method of voting - it's important to check your address details are correct and this includes any alternative postal address.

"If you're an Australian citizen and recently turned 18 or moved and haven't updated your address or if you've just closed

your post office box with Australia Post, you can enrol or update your details online at vec.vic.gov.au/enrolment."

People living outside Towong Shire who pay rates for a property they own in in the municipality, non-Australian citizens who occupy and pay rates on a property in there or a representative of a company or business operating in the shire can apply to the council to enrol by calling 1300 365 222.

Mr Bluemmel also reminded voters that the rules for council enrolments have recently changed.

"Voting in local council elections is now compulsory for all state-

and council-enrolled voters," he said.

"In previous elections it was not compulsory for council-enrolled voters to vote but now everyone must vote if they are on the voters' roll."

Voters who will be away during the election period can have their ballot pack redirected to an address of their choice by completing a redirection form online at vec.vic.gov.au by Monday 9 September.

More information is available by calling 131 832 or at vec.vic.gov.au, where state-enrolled voters can also sign up to the free VoterAlert service to receive important election reminders by SMS and email.

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Church milestone celebrated

The centenary celebrations commemorating the laying of the foundation stone for Holy Trinity Anglican Church Cudgewa on 16 July, 1924 were held on 14 July, 2024.

The service was well attended with visitors coming from near and far. Bishop Clarence Bester, the Bishop of Wangaratta, officiated, accompanied by his wife Michelle, the Reverend Canon Alan Kelb and his wife Lee, and the Reverend Dr Peter Pocock.

The foundation stone in the front of the church reads "To the Glory of God this stone was laid by

Mrs W M Blair 16th July, 1924." Descendants of the Blair family attended the centenary service. The trowel presented to Mrs Blair at the laying of the foundation stone was on display and will be mounted in the church as a commemoration of the event.

In the 2019-20 bushfires Holy Trinity Anglican Church came very close to destruction, however it was saved by the dedicated work of the firefighters. Additionally, a group of volunteers some years ago undertook major work at the church to replace the whiteant-

riddled floor.

After the anniversary service, everyone went to the Cudgewa Hall for lunch supplied by the Cudgewa Football Netball Club and the cutting of the cake by Linton Vogel. The fellowship and food was enjoyed by everyone who attended, many from different parts of Victoria and NSW.

A PowerPoint presentation of photos and certificates, supplied by parishioners and friends, gave a historical backdrop showing weddings, baptisms, the fire damage to the church surrounds and floor renovations.

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How to help your cows in cold conditions

With an increasing number of winter blasts across eastern Victoria, reducing the impacts of cold weather on cattle is essential to both animal production and welfare.

Energy requirements of a cow can increase by up to 20% in colder weather with lighter-condition cows being more affected than those in adequate condition.

The impact of cold weather, particularly when combined with wet and windy conditions and low pasture availability, can severely affect cows that are already low in body condition as a result of the late autumn break and reduced pasture growth rates in the Upper Murray.

Lighter cows will suffer more from cold stress than fatter cows - fat is an excellent source of insulation as well as being an important energy reserve.

Producers need to look out for the lighter cows, as these lighter cows can result in weaker calves being born in the spring, have poorer joining rates for autumn calvers or increased cow mortality. Hungry cows will be cold cows and cattle will eat more in cold weather to generate body heat. Livestock need to eat

more roughage in cold weather to give them energy for heat production as the fermentation and breakdown of cellulose creates heat energy. If livestock don't get enough roughage in the colder months, they will drop condition quickly as they use body fat to create energy for warmth. Feeding out late in the afternoon will provide 'heat' through the night.

Roughages like hay are broken down by microbial action, and this process generates heat. In addition to roughage, it's important to keep an eye on the protein and energy levels of the diet.

While consuming roughages will help the cattle to stay warm, it is important to ensure adequate protein in the diet to feed the rumen bacteria.

Without the rumen bacteria being well fed, cattle will struggle to consume the roughages needed to generate heat and stay productive.

As well as making sure fibre requirements are met, it is important to keep an eye on the forecast weather conditions and if possible, move cattle into sheltered paddocks or those with windbreaks.

This will reduce the impacts of chill by keeping animals out of the wind and give a better return on supplementary feeding.



Separating the lighter condition cows will enable producers to better manage these in-need cows with a specific feed and supplement plan and reduce competition for feed.

There are many more reasons for livestock's need for roughage during winter, including:

- even though some roughage may be left uneaten, for digestive function livestock require a minimum amount of fibre and long roughage to maintain their digestive systems. This is sometimes known as the 'scratch factor' and stimulates rumination (cud chewing)

- when moving livestock onto green pasture their rumen needs time to adjust to a new feed type

- newly grown pasture may not have adequate fibre levels

- it may be better to supplement stock to allow the pasture to establish and develop

- hungry cattle need to be prevented from gorging themselves onto pastures that may have potential to cause nitrate poisoning or bloat

- if feeding grain or pellets with too little roughage, acidosis or grain poisoning can occur

- as we move further into winter, hay may be needed to reduce grass tetany risks and also allows a way of administering Causmag if treatment is needed.

Feeding adequate levels of fibre, managing lighter condition cows separately, using sheltered areas of the farm, knowing the energy and protein of the supplements being fed and monitoring fat scores of livestock through winter, are all key to

minimise the impacts of cold weather.



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Corryong CBD Update



Last week we had two crews working along Hanson St on Stage 3 and 5. These works included replacing awning posts, footings, and the fascia for the IGA building, constructing drainage pits and preparation for kerbs and footpath concrete. We also completed the concrete pour for Stage 5 and saw-cutting ashlar pattern for the footpath in front of the Memorial Hall.

This week we will commence planting in Stage 2 and 5 and prepare and complete the footpath up to the WAW Bank in Stage 3. Stage 5 works will continue beyond the Memorial Hall to the front of Roger C Brown's store. Works include footpath demolition, preparation for kerbs, installation of tree vaults and the replacement of damaged awning posts.

Stage 4 works will commence next week with works including demolition and water main property connections from WAW bank up to the Australia Post loading bay.

To ensure the safety of community members and site workers temporary fences will be installed around work areas.

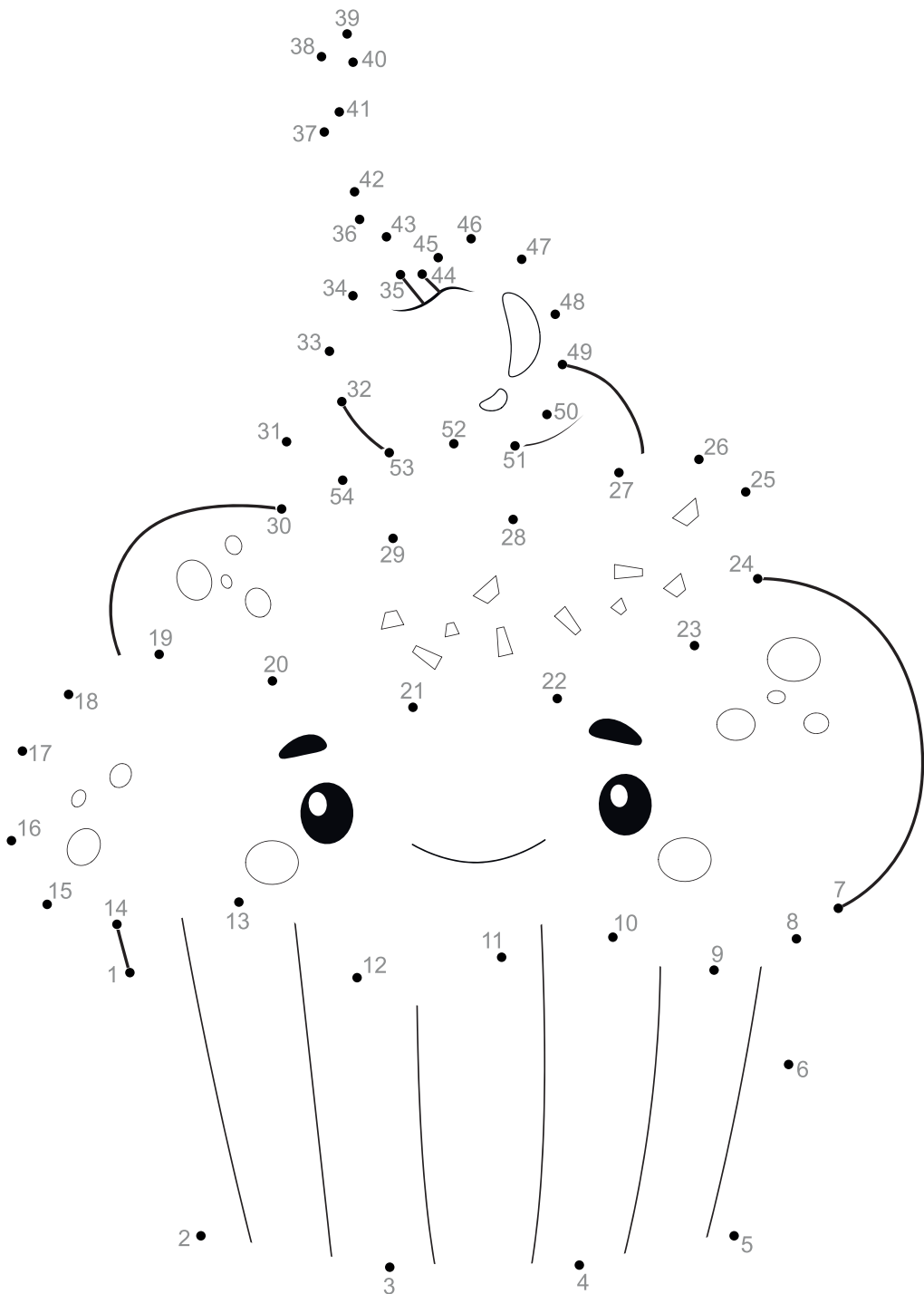

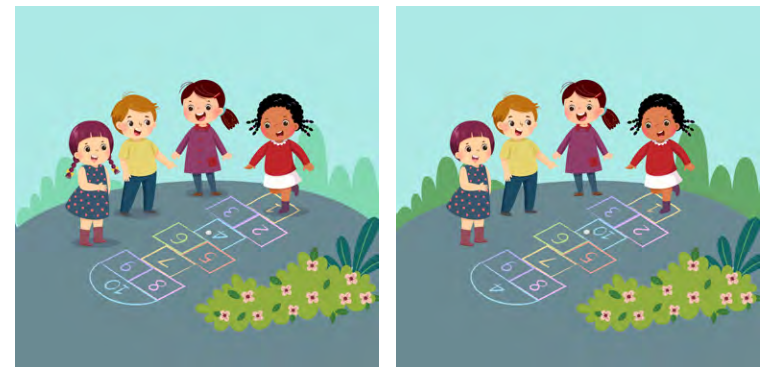

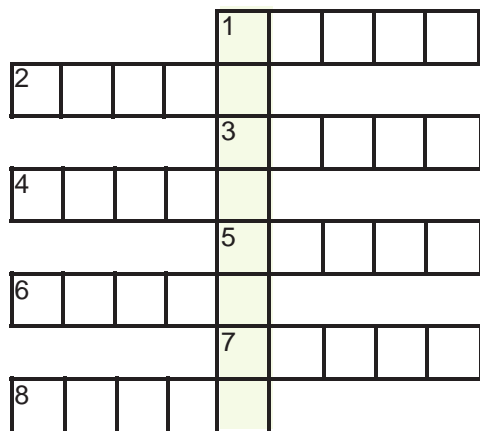
