# Free masks on offer locally

The Victorian government has announced that it will provide free N95 and KN95 masks to protect some of the most vulnerable members of the community this winter.

More than three million masks will be handed out to the community through state-run testing sites, across the public transport network and community health services including the Corryong Health clinic.

Over the next four to six weeks every person that presents for either a free rapid antigen or PCR test will receive one box of 10 N95 masks, along with instructions on how best to wear them to reduce transmission.

Minister for Health Mary-Anne Thomas said "Wearing a mask, staying up to date with your vaccinations and ensuring indoor areas are well ventilated are all steps we can take to manage our own Covid-19 risk this winter and into the future."

# Milestone arrives for first school

150th anniversary of the first school to be opened in the Upper Murray.

The following story about Corryong School 1309 has been excerpted from the book 'Buggies to Buses 1877-1952', written by local historians Bob Kaighin and Betty Lebner.

Hugh Harris selected his land on a tree-less plain bounded by a creek on its northern side. He named his selection 'Hunter's Plain' after Dr. Hunter, his wife's foster father. On a corner of this land, Rural School No. 127, the forerunner of Corryong 1309, was erected. It was a timber-slab building of 26ft x 15ft, with separate living quarters.

On the first day of school on 1st May 1872, these pupils were enrolled: Angus, Elizabeth, James, John and Neil Briggs; Elizabeth Evans; Hector Fraser; Andrew, Annie, James, Mary Jane and Thomas Harris; Arthur, John and Joseph Land; Charles Murphy; Alice May McKenzie; John, Mary and William Stratton; and John and Beaumont Thomas Waters. Lovdy Grace Evans, Margaret Harris, George Murrell and Mary



Ami Waters were enrolled later in the year.

Hugh Harris later offer the land on which the school stood as a gift to the Education Department but unknown reasons, no legal transfer of the three-acre block was ever effected.

A committee management, with Hugh Harris as correspondent and Joseph Hanson as treasurer, was set up to oversee the school's operations and the first teacher, Robert Stratton,

children of our pioneer

Stratton's wife acted as school cleaner and earliest surviving correspondence from the school, written by Robert Stratton, complains that his wife had not been paid for her services for five months. A curt note in the dep't files reads, "Three shillings a week is the going rate for a small school - send £2."

The school became Corryong State School 1309 on 1st January 1874 and a Board of Advice was appointed the following year. This board comprised John Jardine (chairman), Donaldson (correspondent), Hugh Harris, James Wheeler and John Whitehead. They were all well respected residents.

(Added note: At this point the government took over the running costs of the school from the local

The first business of the board was to request that a new school be built. They wrote that the old school building, which was about 1.5km west of today's Corryong Consolidated School. sufficiently accessible" for the children of the growing Thowgla creek area. The site favoured was on Sydney Watson's run and they were advised "Application for the site recommended should be made without delay as selection in the neighbourhood is proceeding rapidly."

This recommendation was approved and the grant gazetted on April 2nd 1874 but there followed a long pause in progress towards the new school. In December of 1875, the board instructed Robert Donaldson to write to the dep't, stating that the current overflowing building was dilapidated

and quite unfit for the purpose, and that there was urgent need for a new building.

He wrote again in June 1876 "Unless a new school house is at once built I think very few parents will send their children to the present building..." And again, eight months later expressing "....the great dissatisfaction of board members." He pointed out that now was the time to build as much rain was expected in winter. He expressed his belief that the building was unfit for use, the enrolment (which by March 1877 stood at ninety four) would fall off. He added "If it is not the intention of the department to proceed with the building at once the majority of the members of the board will resign, as they do not feel inclined to meet and waste their time, nothing being

# Honor board finds a permanent home



Recent visitors to Café Corryong Brew in Corryong might have noticed a new addition to the interior - the Roll of Honor Board from Corryong State School No. 1309 that was once proudly and prominently displayed there for many, many years.

The board honours former students of the school who served and fought and those who died, in the Great War or World War One as it was later designated.

It eventually found its way to Corryong College and no doubt the intention was to find a similar place for it there but it ended up being relegated to a store room.

Corryong College teacher. Stephen Learmonth, who has a keen interest in local military history and military history in general - and who, in his role as an educator, has passed on his enthusiasm Corryong College students - recently offered the Honor Board to the Corryong & District

Memorial Hall committee which gratefully accepted his offer.

This board will be temporarily displayed in its present position for a month or so before it finds its permanent and more appropriate home in the adjoining Corryong & District RSL Hall among the many similar boards that once graced local valley schools.

The committee invites locals and other interested parties to view the Corryong State School Honor Board in its present position while it is still easily accessible. Perhaps you may find an ancestor or two there!

However if you miss the opportunity the RSL Hall is open to the public every Anzac and Armistice Day. The hall is well worth visiting for its photographic display alone.

One astute observer noticed that the board gives the dates for the Great War as 1914 to 1919 whereas she had correctly remembered that this conflict ended in

This seems to have touched a nerve in the dep't, as in March 1877, tenders were called for the construction of a school building 24ft x 16ft (7.3m x 4.9m) with a two room

residence attached. Six tenders were received and works were completed on 23 July 1877.

Further history of the school is available at the Man From Snowy River Museum in Corryong. November 1918. That is certainly true for European military personnel but for those who served from the far-flung reaches of the British Empire the war did not finish until they reached their home ports and were officially discharged.

One of the many tragedies of this time was that a good number of those brave men and women who survived the trenches or field hospitals died of the Spanish Flu soon after Armistice or on the troop ships steaming home.

Those who attended the Corryong Primary School might wonder at the discrepancy between the school number recorded on the Honor Board and the number that was displayed on the exterior wall of the school near the chimney facing Towong Road.

It can be explained as follows: the original school, Corryong Rural School No. 127, stood on Hunters Plain just below the aerodrome but in 1877 a new school was built and opened on the site of the recently closed junior campus. This new second school became Corryong State School No. 1309.

In 1919 Corryong State School became a Higher Elementary School and then in 1958, it was changed to the Corryong Consolidated School with the new number 6213.

# Concrete factory reaches tunnels target

Snowy Hydro's precast factory in Cooma has achieved an impressive milestone, with manufacturing completed for all concrete segments that will line the dry access tunnels for the Snowy 2.0 project.

More than 25,000 of these seven-tonne segments have been produced at the Polo Flat factory, which employs 120 people from the 2,100-strong Snowy 2.0 workforce. The segments are being used to line the main access tunnel and emergency, cable and ventilation tunnel at Lobs Hole.

"In total, 35,000 or 27 per cent of the 130,000-plus segments needed to line all of the Snowy 2.0 tunnels have now come off the Polo Flat production line," said Paul Broad, Snowy Hydro's Managing Director and CEO.

"We're proud to be manufacturing and investing locally and providing employment opportunities for local people as well. The precast factory is operated by our principal contractor Future Generation Joint Venture and it is powering along.

"To efficiently and safely produce enough of these massive concrete segments to line the 5.6 kilometres of dry access tunnels is a terrific achievement."

The factory supports the operation of the



three Snowy 2.0 tunnel boring machines (TBMs), which are excavating 27 kilometres of tunnels from Tantangara Reservoir to Talbingo Reservoir for the Snowy 2.0 pumped-hydro expansion of the Snowy Scheme. The Polo Flat facility includes a concrete batching plant manufacturing segment from two automated carousels, producing up to 24 rings, each one made of nine segments, per day.

Many of the raw materials like aggregates and sand are sourced from the local Schmidt Quarries at Mt Mary and Nimmitabel, which is reducing transport time and costs. Concrete is mixed within the batching plant, which is then

transferred into the factory and poured into specially-designed moulds. With the use of innovative robotics, the moulds progress along the carousel as the segments cure and finish. There is an onsite laboratory and testing to check the quality of every segment produced.

"Snowy 2.0 is leading the way in Australia to successfully deploy and use robots to automate the process of demoulding, cleaning and application of the release agent on the moulds, before pushing them through to the next production stage," Mr Broad explained.

"This has allowed the factory to maintain a safe and low-noise working environment for workers."

It takes approximately eight to 10 hours to cure and de-mould each segment from start to finish, then they are stored for about two weeks before being transported to site, loaded into TBMs and installed in the tunnels.

Snowy 2.0 will link two existing Snowy Scheme reservoirs Tantangara and Talbingo - and its new power station with six pumpturbines will be located about 800m underground. Water in the top storage will be released for energy generation at times of peak demand and pumped back at times when there is excess renewable energy in the grid, so Snowy 2.0 is ready to meet demand when needed.

# Obituary: - Mary Maclean Pionagring vet overcame early

# Pioneering vet overcame early prejudices The Grapevine



Eulogy written and delivered by Dr David Hall BVSc. at a celebration of her life on July 20th, 2022.

Mary Bardsley graduated from the University of Sydney in 1951. She was the only female graduate in that year, which she shared with several returned soldiers.

There were very few female vets in that era. Now the majority of veterinary graduates are women and they are excellent veterinarians.

Bruce Maclean had not long moved from Dr King's Practice in Albury to open a veterinary clinic in Corryong, servicing the Upper Murray. Until then, there had not been any vet service to the area.

Mary, a new graduate, joined Bruce in 1951, following their marriage. How Bruce enticed this elegant Sydney girl to seemingly wild and remote Corryong is unknown to me

The Upper Murray was very different to now - rough roads, difficult access, primitive facilities and farmers unfamiliar with veterinary attention

for their livestock and pets. TB and Brucellosis were prevalent diseases, antibiotics relatively new and anesthetics were crude.

Calcium Boroglutanate recently was only determined to be a treatment for Milk Fever. Prior to this, a bicycle pump was used for udder insufflation of down cows. Mary told of boiling the powder on the stove. When given intravenously, the cows miraculously got up. Mary said "The farmers thought we were God."

Of course, Mary had a lot of prejudice to overcome, both as a new graduate vet and a woman. More so the latter but Mary was forthright and no doubt firmly put such folk in their place.

Amongst the chaos of practice, a tribe of kids were carted around on calls.

In 1978, I was a final year vet student at Melbourne University and not a very good one. Students had to do 12 weeks practice placement during holiday periods. On a small piece of paper

on the notice board for accepting practices was 'AB & MR Maclean, Veterinary Surgeons, Corryong'. I'd spent quite a bit of time at Old Tallangatta as a kid and seen the sign to Corryong and the train to Cudgewa but had never been there.

In May 1978, I rode my motorbike to Corryong, and spent two weeks with Bruce and Mary. I loved the type of work and the Upper Murray, so in September I came back for another fortnight. I was itching to ask for a job but as a long-haired lout, I didn't think I'd have much hope.

On the final Friday evening, with Bruce and Mary in the kitchen at Greenham Street, I was about to leave, when Mary said "Bruce... why don't we ask David to do a job for us?" I thought she wanted me to put the bin out. Bruce shuffled and said "We were wondering whether you'd come to work here?" Well, no question!

So, on New Year's Day 1979, I commenced work for Bruce and Mary. It was the tail end

of the TB and Brucellosis Eradication Campaign, so I got to orientate with blood testing and Strain 19 Vaccination. I had two marvelous mentors to guide me through the challenges of mixed rural practice.

Bruce and Mary sold the practice to Neil Farquhar and I stayed on working for Neil for a further couple of years.

Retirement didn't come for Bruce and Mary and clients from the Tumbarumba area continued to request their services.

I worked for the government, overseas, rural and small animals' practice during the next eight years until deciding to return to the Upper Murray in 1990 and set up a practice at Walwa. My hope was to work in partnership with Bruce and Mary. We discussed the venture in October 1990 but Bruce died suddenly in January 1991. Mary grieved his loss for the rest of her own life.

Mary and I kept in close contact over the following years, often discussing and sharing cases.



Even as age caught up, Mary refused to retire and would never turn away a patient or a farmer in trouble. Some of the patients remained as members of her household menagerie. It was difficult to find a place to sit in Mary's living room, as all the furniture was home to a cat or dog.

At 82, Mary even performed a caesarian operation on a heifer ... "and it lived", she said. It's true, I have seen the cow.

We at Walwa and now

Tumbarumba Vet, feel honored that Mary allowed us to help her make the transition to retirement in her late 80s.

Mary could be bossy, sometimes vague or cantankerous with people but she was sharp, strong-willed, always available to help. And above all, she was extraordinarily kind to animals.

Mary Maclean was a pioneer of the veterinary profession. I consider myself fortunate to have come briefly into her realm.



She trailed her Australian compatriot Mackenzie Little, who produced a personal best of 64.27 metres to lead into the sixth and final round, but Barber unleashed her winning throw of 64.43m with her last throw.



# Common sense needed over footy crisis

Following a storied career with the Federal, Lavington and Brocklesby-Burrumbuttock clubs, football star Darryn McKimmie fears for the future of the sport in the Upper Murray.

McKimmie told the Border Mail last week that it was time that clubs put their parochialism aside and revisit the merger option.

McKimmie debuted for the Swans as a 15-year-old and won a flag with them the following year. He kicked the winning goal after the siren to win the Ovens & Murray premiership for Lavington in 2005 and then was playing coach for merged club Brock-Burrum when it won the Hume league flag in 2013.

The 44-year-old came out of retirement after an eight-year layoff to play for Feds last Saturday in a win over arch rivals Corryong.

After seeing most clubs struggle for numbers this season, particularly at the junior level, McKimmie he said the competition is in a sad state.

"When I first came back I knew to expect that the standard had slipped from speaking to different people but the biggest shock was the lack of involvement with supporters, volunteers and players all at a shortage," he said.

"I know it's not just the Upper Murray that's seeing this decline, it seems to be across the board but for the Upper Murray, I feel it's getting to a breaking point."

McKimmie highlighted junior developemnt as one of the biggest dangers the competition faces if changes are not made.

"Sure, there is animosity between clubs but if we can't put our differences aside and look at this predicament through our kids' eyes, who are the future, then we're all fools," he said.

"Having witnessed at Brock-Burrum how good mergers can work and what it can do for a community, I can't help but think the best way forward is to consolidate the Upper Murray Football Netball League into one club and head down the road to the Tallangatta and District comp.

"I think most people have had enough and the danger is that if we don't do some thing soon, I believe we'll have nothing," McKimmie warned.

# Roos' chief claims merger bird has flown

T u m b a r u m b a president, Mont Waters, says he is disappointed that former Lavington, Brock-Burrum and Federal star, Darryn McKimmie, has raised the merger question for the Upper Murray league.

Waters told the Border Mail that a proposal for the five clubs to merge and join the Tallangatta and District Football League (TDFL) was almost unanimously rejected by the clubs and that only Federal voted in its favour at a league meeting in September 2020.

A working party had been commissioned by the league, with the endorsement of AFL North East Border to develop the merger model.

Waters said "I was disappointed with Darryn's comments because there are so many positive stories that could be on the back page about the Upper Murray league.

"When people see negative stuff in the paper, it makes it harder for clubs to recruit for the following season. People start to ask themselves is the Upper Murray leaue going ahead? As a league we had two years to work on a merger and play out of Corryong in the TDFL.

"The proposal was put forward and failed.

"The clubs and communities voted against it because there is more to country football than just the game of footy.

"There is community involvement. They excluded Tumbarumba and Bullioh, so they didn't get any support from them.

"The bird has flown as far as merger talks in the Upper Murray." One motive for

commissioning the merger model was that the Bullioh club had applied to join the TDFL and the Border-Walwa club had gone into recess. If the Dogs' bid had been successful it would have left four clubs in the league. The TDFL rejected the Bullioh application which meant the Dogs could not re-apply for two years ie. until 2023.

It is not clear whether they will apply again but this uncertainty and the perilous state of the Federal and Corryong clubs regarding playing numbers will need to be addressed by the league.

At the very least, a merger of the Demons and Swans should be considered, although it is understood that Feds recently initiated talks on this front but discussion has stalled over the issue of the junior competition.
