

Folk festival continues century old tradition

Picture yourself sitting on the banks of an idyllic creek, listening to wonderful music played by some of Australia's most talented musicians and celebrating local traditional music and dance...

Imagine no more!

Upper Murray residents are invited to come and join in the fun and music at the Nariel Recreation Reserve on the banks of the beautiful Nariel Creek and also at the Memorial Hall Corryong, to welcome in the 2025 New Year.

The Nariel Creek Folk Festival is the oldest of its kind runing in Australia, continuing a long tradition of more than 100 years of old time music and dance in the Nariel Valley. This is a memorable, nationwide achievement for the residents of Upper Murray.

The festival began in 1962, originating from a picnic of music and dance held on the banks of the Nariel Creek. This followed a night of dancing at the Nariel Hall and in Corryong, enjoyed by locals and visiting members of the Victorian

Folk Music Club.

The dances and music were of historical significance to the collectors and archivists of music and dance in Australia. The picnic has now become a wonderful family festival, based in the Upper Murray area, already steeped with so many artistic and folkloric traditions.

This year the festival begins with a traditional Nariel dance on the night of Friday 27th December which will be held at the Memorial Hall Corryong. Dances were held at the Memorial Hall for many years and the festival committee has decided to bring them back into Corryong.

A Contra Dance, run by Ray and Jennie Simpson, is held between 5pm and 7pm on Saturday 28th December. Contra dancing is easy to learn and a very social dance. All steps will be expertly called for each dance by some of Australia's leading dance callers. Beginners and families are all welcome!

Two more Nariel dances will be held at the Memorial Hall in

Corryong on Monday 30th December and the final Nariel Festival dance on Thursday 2nd January. The dance music is provided by the Nariel band including Ray and Jennie Simpson and many of their friends.

All dances are called or "led off", so no previous experience is necessary. Children's dances are also included, as well as a door prize and spot prizes throughout the night.

On New Year's Eve you can relax and enjoy a blackboard concert from 3.00pm followed by a bush dance at 8.00pm, with the local Rotary Club doing the catering. New Year's Day features a very relaxed picnic concert from 12.00pm also followed by the bush dance on the evening of New Year's Day.

The New Year's Day concert begins with the younger children displaying their musical or poetry talent followed by lots of local and imported talent, young and old, professional and amateur, providing a wide range of family entertainment for the whole day.



These events are held on The Green at the Nariel Recreation Reserve. The band for these dances includes talented musicians from all areas of Australia, as well as featuring the Nariel Band and Nariel tunes.

Come along and dance your favourite dances with family and friends and learn new dances in a friendly and fun atmosphere. The Corryong dances are alcohol free and dress is light casual. The door fee covers entry and an excellent supper of freshly made sandwiches, with tea and coffee included.

At the festival, many opportunities exist for watching or participating in campfire sessions, learning tunes and techniques from other musicians and dancers, catching up with friends

and meeting new friends.

There are also many programmed kids' activities on every other day, so if you are looking for something for the youngsters to do over the holidays, take them out to the festival for an activity and a swim.

This year the festival committee will again be raffling two tickets to the National Folk Festival in Canberra at Easter 2017 (worth more than \$800) as well as other prizes. Thanks go to the local businesses who have supported the festival with raffle prizes and to the local emergency services for their support.

Memorial adds to avenue appeal

River Tourism Association in conjunction with the Memorial Hall, RSL subbranch and Upper Murray Historical Society is working on a new addition to Corryong's Avenue of Honour.

The Avenue of Honour was first planted in 1918 to commemorate the 122 servicemen from Corryong, Colac Colac, Nariel and Khancoban who left the district to

serve in World War I.

The project involves a memorial which will include two carved trees, a seat and a granite rock with a plaque listing the 122 servicemen. Further details of how these elements will all come together will be shared in the coming months.

original trees The planted were Deodar Cedars. Many of these still remain, however a number have succumbed to time

and are no longer part of the original avenue.

Unfortunately, the size and quality of the two dead Deodar Cedars planned to be used for the carvings were not suitable. The commissioned artist, John Brady from Gippsland, has used alternative timber to depict four faces on each tree to represent the servicemen. He has created the carvings using actual photographs of a selection of the Upper

Murray servicemen. All of the carvings are based on a number of real people so the memorial represents all who served.

Stephen Learmonth, local amateur historian, has completed extensive research to confirm the names of the original 122 servicemen who were honoured by the original avenue. This list was compiled through consultation with the community (see the list

Know the fire risks before hitting the road

While you might be busy packing the car and planning Christmas lunch don't forget to check conditions and the VicEmergency app before travelling this holiday season.

The CFA is urging everyone to ensure they know what fire district they are travelling to and to regularly monitor the fire danger ratings for that area.

should People reconsider their travel on days of Extreme Fire Danger Rating and know what you can and can't do on a Total Fire Ban Day - particularly those who are camping and having barbeques.

CFA Chief Office, Jason Heffernan, said it was important to take a break this holiday season however, no Victorian can afford to take a break from fire safety.

"We know people have a lot to think about this festive season but taking a few minutes to plan and prepare could save the lives of you and those you love," he said.

"On hot, dry and windy days, have a backup location to visit that is not in a high-risk bushfire

"Do not travel to Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating areas - your life may depend on the decisions you make at this

"If you're staying in a bushfire risk area, the safest option is to leave the night before or early in the day on a Catastrophic or Extreme day.

"If you are visiting a holiday home over the summer period, making sure the grass is mowed and gutters are clean are just some of the things you can do to prepare for the fire season we are expecting."

Victorians are urged to download the



VicEmergency app and set up watch zones for the location they're visiting. That way the app will issue a notification for any fires or other emergency incidents in the area.

The CFA website has more resources and information on how to have a happy and fire safe holiday season.

Support for public interest journalism wins backing

Country Press Australia (CPA) has welcomed the federal government's announcement of a package to better sustain and support public interest journalism in the years ahead as part of the News Media Assistance Program (News MAP).

Country Press president Australia Andrew Schreyer (pictured) said the government's federal announcement comes at a vital time for the industry. Regional and local newspapers play a vital role in their communities which cannot be replicated through other forms of media and this significant announcement, following various enquiries and a stringent government process is a welcome relief.

"This is another important plank in the government's federal efforts to support public

interest journalism and follows the unveiling of the \$15M News Media Relief Program, last week's announcement of the News Bargaining Incentive, as well as \$10.5M for ACMA's Media Diversity Measurement Framework."

The package includes \$116.7M to support news production and journalism through sustainability funding to news media outlets over three years from July 1, 2025, as well as grants for capacity building and transformational projects to help make news media outlets more sustainable in the future.

Mr Schreyer said CPA was keen to learn more about how the funding will be provided, so that publishers could make informed decisions about their businesses with the most up-to-date information.

"We are pleased to see other stakeholders such as the Australian Associated Press and the community and First Nations broadcasting sectors gain muchneeded funding," he said.

"We understand the government might not be able to provide every detail of this important funding package as quickly as would like, but we need greater clarity, and sooner, for our publishers.

"Whilst we greatly appreciate the overall announcement, we are disappointed that the package includes just \$3M of advertising. We believe advertising is the single best way to provide support to the newspaper industry and the \$3M falls well short of doing that.

"This merely maintains the status quo and reflects a situation that contributes to the



ongoing crisis in the news industry."

Mr Schreyer said this latest announcement caps a period of significant and much appreciated investment by the federal government into fostering public interest journalism that would lay for the foundations for further transformation of the industry.

"The federal government recognised local media as critical to the health of our democracy, to social cohesion and to informing regional and rural communities, and we greatly appreciate their support," he said.

Growing feral deer populations across NSW have prompted Local Land Services (LLS) to highlight the safety and environmental risks to the community.

Five introduced species of feral deer have established populations throughout the state including in urban areas where they can be harder to control and have even greater human health and social impacts.

NSW, landholders have a responsibility to manage biosecurity threats on their properties including pest animals like feral deer to protect land and livestock and minimise the threat to public safety.

LLS can support landholders to manage feral deer by providing the latest advice on control methods and coordinating wide-scale control programs. These control methods include aerial and on-ground

shooting programs as well as trapping to safely and humanely cull feral deer.

Program Lead Invasive Species, Emmaline Froggatt, said due to their behaviour, feral deer often went undetected their population grew or seasonal conditions forced them to venture further out of timbered areas.

"To some people, four or five deer might not seem like an issue but herds of 45 start to become a real problem," she said.

"Unfortunately, by that time, the novelty has worn off and they are much harder to control.

"Deer are not native to Australia and don't have a natural predator, so they are quite resilient. This makes them at best a public nuisance and at worst, a serious threat to agriculture and human safety."
