Towong excluded from talks

A decision by councils across the border region to march on the Victorian Parliament next week in a united campaign for the construction of a new Albury-Wodonga hospital has been put on hold, pending talks with the

Minister for Health, Mary-Anne Thomas.

The councils have previously rejected the proposal from the Victorian and NSW governments to redevelop the Albury hospital.

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Pilot hangs around to be rescued

A paraglider competing in the Corryong PG Open event last week had to be winched to safety after becoming stuck in a tree on Mt Mittamatite.

Emergency services were called after reports the paraglider conducted a forced parachute landing about 3pm on Monday February 3rd.

The female pilot became stuck in a 10 metre tree and was unable to free herself due to the height and strong wind.

Local police notified Police Victoria Search and Rescue (SAR) Squad – which specialises in vertical rescues and members were subsequently flown

in from Melbourne by the Air Wing.

Early reports said the woman was suspended from the tree for around an hour and a half but her ordeal actually lasted for more than five hours.

Four SAR members were winched to a nearby location and hiked approximately 300 metres in rugged terrain before reaching the site.

An SAR member climbed the tree and set up a roping system before safely lowering the paraglider to the ground.

The woman was winched onboard the helicopter about 8.40pm and did not require any medical treatment.

Inspector Dalton, Water Police and Search and Rescue Squads, said "This rescue was complex as we had a paraglider stuck at height, in rugged terrain and on top of that strong wind made it challenging for the air crew.

"Thankfully highly skilled search and rescue police were able to get there as quickly as possible with assistance from the Air Wing.

"It's always a great day at work to rescue someone in need."

Letters to both state premiers seeking meetings to discuss the issue were ignored up until the decision to mount a Spring Street protest.

Minister Thomas subsequently arranged a

30-minute online meeting with the mayors of Albury and Wodonga - Kevin Mack and Michael Gobel - on Tuesday to put their

Both mayors said they were disappointed not to have the opportunity to meet face-to-face.

Instead, the meeting will be held via Microsoft Teams involving the two mayors and their respective chief executives.

This was also deemed unsatisfactory as it excluded other councils involved in the hospital campaign.

"We made a very specific request t include other mayors if it was going to be on Teams, understanding it's difficult to get a lot of mayors down to Melbourne for a faceto-face," said Cr Gobel.

He said that request was refused as was a later appeal to have the Towong and Indigo mayors join in online.

A final decision on whether to proceed with the march on Parliament on February 19 will be dependent on a meeting today of the 17 councils involved.

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Horse ride highlights war history

A group of Light Horse enthusiasts will head off on a 700km trek next month to commemorate the birth and death General Sir Harry Chauvel, one of Australia's most distinguished and decorated army generals.

A leg of the Chauvel Border Trail Ride will be from Cudgewa, over Keelangie and on to Tallangatta, recognising the journey men and horses from the Upper Murray took to serve in

Ross Smith, president of Tallangatta's Sandy the War Horse Committee and experienced endurance rider Pat Leary from the Wagga area will be joined by various riders throughout the Chauvel Commemorative Ride, which will visit schools and RSLs along the route.

The trail runs from the Light Horse Memorial in the New South Wales regional capital of Wagga Wagga to the statue of Brigadier Murray Bourchier CMG DSO in Victoria's regional capital of Shepparton. The trail follows the road winding through the hills and along the spectacular valleys of the foothills of The Great Dividing Range on the border of New South Wales and Victoria.

"We are currently preparing for the ride but nearly every day something changes," Ross Smith said.

"We have been gathering more support recently which has been

"The councils along the route have been very supportive of the ride as have many schools.

"We are also partnering with Soldier On which provides support for veterans and families."

The ride begins on March 4th at the Brigadier Sir Murray Bourchier Memorial in Shepparton

- the 80th anniversary of General Sir Harry Chauvel's death - and makes its way up along the minor roads through the Benalla and Wangaratta districts. The party will be joined by 10 Light Horse troopers on this leg.

The troop plans to ride through Wodonga and Albury on March11th and 12th and from there they continue north to Wagga and Junee before returning through Young and Cootamundra to Gundagai and then through the Snowy Valleys to the Upper Murray.

The riders aim to arrive in Tintaldra on April 9th for a service at 6pm in Tintaldra's Avenue of Honour.

They are then scheduled to hold a service on April 14th at 11am at the Cudgewa War Memorial before going on to retrace the route taken by Upper Murray men who during WWI had to ride or catch the horse-drawn coach to Tallangatta to enlist. Before and during the war horses from the Upper Murray sold to the Army were herded over similar

The end of the war and the opening of the rail link between Tallangatta and Cudgewa ended an era for those who rode through the bush with the horses over Keelangie to Tallangatta.

The route over which they rode more than 110 years later has become overgrown. Road building, fires and forestry have also changed the landscape; and later the expansion of the Hume Dam in the 1950s and the eventual inundation of Old Tallangatta also wrought further changes.

The re-enacting riders are scheduled to arrive at the 'Sandy the Warhorse Memorial' in Tallangatta on April 16th.

The Commemorative Ride will highlight the Light Horse as a voice



from the bush in the Spirit of Anzac.

Ross has experience in trail riding and campdraft and has already done a reconnaissance along part of the route from Bullioh to Koetong.

Renowned endurance rider, Pat Leary, will lead the troop throughout the ride while Ross expects to complete around three quarters of the trek between visits to RSL

branches and schools.

"I also better turn up at my Mum's 100th birthday!" he added.

In conjunction with the ride, children's author Wolfer and Dianne commemorative and author George Petrou OAM plan to launch their new books.

Dianne's book is called Soaring with the Sugar Bird Lady, while George Petrou's title is The Art of Humanity.

Dates for the Albury and Wodonga book events are yet to be confirmed.

At Tallangatta the riders will commemorate the 160th anniversary of General Sir Harry Chauvel's birthday in

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Power provider acts on feedback



AusNet has submitted a proposal to the Australian Energy Regulator (AER) to approve \$3.5 billion in investment to upgrade the distribution network to improve its reliability and resilience for customers.

It follows more than two years of engagement and research involving more than 16,000 customers to seek feedback on the investment proposals.

AusNet Executive
General Manager
Electricity Distribution,
Andrew Linnie, said this
investment would provide
the funding necessary to
continue to meet customer
and community needs to
support reliability, safety
and electrification.

The \$3.5 billion is made up of:-

- \$1.35 billion to replace ageing assets so the network can continue to operate safely and reliably.
 - \$770 million to

increase the capacity of the network, support customer growth and enable more customers to electrify their gas appliances and transport.

- \$430 million to improve reliability for problem areas on the network and to make our network more resilient to extreme weather.
- \$430 million on digital systems to maintain core services, improve our responsiveness to extreme weather events, and uplift customer experience.
- \$240 million to integrate rooftop solar and large-scale wind and solar generators, putting downwards pressure on wholesale energy prices.

"We know our customers are facing costof-living pressures and we believe we have struck a balance between investing in the network, while keeping energy prices as affordable as possible," Mr Linnie said.

"We have seen a significant increase in frequency and severity of extreme weather events and it's important we make the network more resilient to these occurrences. We also want to improve reliability for many of our regional customers.

"The initiatives and investment proposed are an important step to enable our network to meet future needs," he added.

This proposal comes following feedback from AusNet customers on the draft plan late last year.

AusNet plans are approved by the Australian Energy Regulator every five years through the Electricity Distribution Price Review (EDPR) process.



But recent circumstances have made that impossible and we now realise that we need to do something momentous and fast, so we can keep our doors open, continue to build on the work done over the long history of the organisation and get back to prioritising the delivery of vital programs and services to our remote, rural community.

Catch a grant to improve fish habitat

Victoria's class marine, estuarine and freshwater fisheries will continue to flourish into the future with more fish habitat thanks to the second round of a \$2.5 million grants program.

Victorian Fisheries Authority (VFA) CEO, Travis Dowling, said the Victorian government's \$96m investment to improve fishing, boating, piers and aquaculture was backing round two of the Fish Habitat Improvement Fund, which enables the installation of habitat so fish can rest, feed and breed as well as boosting the health of aquatic ecosystems.

"We know improving fish habitat makes a real difference to our fisheries and aquatic ecosystems long-term and encourage eligible groups and organisations to apply

for a grant," he said.

The grants are available through two finding streams - one open yearround to projects from recreational fishing groups for up to \$50,000 and funding for larger scale projects for up to \$200,000 where co-investment is required.

Among the projects funded through round one of the grants program was a partnership with the Australian Trout Foundation to invest \$49,000 into in-stream and streamside habitat in the Ovens River near Bright, complementing previous habitat improvement above and below this stretch of river.

In a further boost to the environment, many habitat projects make use of recycled or re-used materials such as oyster and mussel shells from restaurants and timber salvaged from damage or roadworks.

Applications for both funding streams are open now, with the larger-scale stream two grants closing

on Friday May 2nd.

ambulance crews remains high with hard working and first paramedics responders across Victoria continuing to attend around 100,000 critical 'Code 1' emergencies everv three months, response times have been on the improve.

Ambulance Victoria (AV) Executive Director Regional Operations, Danielle North said the last quarter of 2024 was AV's fourth busiest on record.

"We have seen a 26.6 per cent increase in Code 1 cases since the pandemic began more than five years ago," Ms North said.

"October to December is commonly one of our busiest times and last year was no exception as our crews were called to 99,799 Code 1 emergencies. This was also the third quarter in a row close to or above 100,000 cases.

"In the face of this sustained pressure, our highly skilled paramedics and first responders do a remarkable job providing best care to their communities, each and every day."

From October to December 2024, AV crews across Victoria responded to 64.9 per cent of Code 1 cases within the state-

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The state-wide average response time to Code 1 emergencies was 15 minutes and 42 seconds.

In the Hume Region crews responded to 5,837 Code 1 cases between October and December The biggest improvements were in the Mansfield and Wangaratta

In the Wodonga region, paramedics attended 77.7 per cent of Code 1 patients within 15 minutes – which was the third best result in the state

Hume Regional Director Narelle Capp said "We know there is more work to do and AV continues to work with hospitals to promptly transfer patients ensure all Victorians receive the right care at the right time.

"More new paramedics have also hit the road to help meet demand. Since last November, we have welcomed 84 new graduate paramedics to our ranks and a further 15 new recruits will start soon including qualified paramedics from New South Wales, Queensland, the Northern Territory and New Zealand.

"Our people are our greatest assets. It is through them that we continue to lead the way in patient care including one of the best cardiac arrest survival rates in the world.

"We are also giving them the latest technology they need to do their job and get back on the road quicker.

"In 2025, we are rolling out new digital radios across regional Victoria and iPads to all our crews with a modern platform making it easier and faster to complete electronic

patient care records."

Ms Capp added that "Our expert Secondary Triage team of nurses and paramedics also make a real difference by connecting patients with the care they need while helping free up crews for patients in time-critical emergencies.

"From October to December, 43,864 people across Victoria who did not need an emergency ambulance were instead connected to more appropriate care paramedics and nurses in Secondary Triage.


"In 2023-24. referred paramedics nearly 43,000 patients to the Victorian Virtual Emergency Department (VVED), with over three quarters cared for without transport to a physical ED.

"And our Medium Transport Acuity Service (MATS) crews dedicated for less-urgent attended 8,100 cases during the last quarter, freeing up more ambulances to respond to the most critically ill

Ms Capp encouraged Victorians to do their part to ensure AV's highly skilled paramedics were available for patients most in need.

"In less urgent cases, there are many options people can access when they need timely medical care and health advice all day every day but not an emergency ambulance or calling Triple Zero (000),"

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
