Taking the next steps to sustainability

An update on the Corryong Neighbourhood Centre (CNC) '1000 Steps to Sustainability' campaign to ensure its future How are we going?

1. The bakery is continuing to operate at a very small surplus. Ongoing monitoring and improvements to ensure this is sustained will continue.

Fundraising is 2. now just over \$30,000 but still no confirmation on the amount in the UMIF/ FRRR donation account. Community feedback has indicated that potential donors have concerns about donating to clear existing debts leading to a Committee decision to pivot the "1000 Steps" campaign to assure the community that donations will only be used to provide a Youth program for 2025 and to support the core CNC operations until DFFH funding can be restored.

3. We are continuing to reduce hours and costs to match customer demand. 4. We are continuing to manage creditors.

5. We have responded to the DFFH letter providing details of our plan and progress and requesting a deferral of the contract cancellation until 30 April (after Festival & Easter). At this stage we have only received acknowledgement an of receipt of the letter and advice that they will not cancel the contract on 7 Feb as previously determined. No funding until issues are resolved, but insurance coverage will continue during the deferral period.

6. In order to protect UMIF assets and to cover the clearance of CNH debts which will not now come from donated funds, the UMIF Committee has decided to proceed with the sale of underutilised assets.

Why don't you get the accounts audited?

The finances of the both Corryong Neighbourhood House Inc and Upper Murray Innovation Foundation Inc are audited annually by

Their independent audit opinion is included in the financial statements which are presented at the AGM each year and are publicly available from the CNC office. Given the complexity and diversity CNC/UMIF of the operations, the annual audit takes approximately five days to complete and costs \$12,500. Given the change in circumstances leading to the fundraiser but with consideration of our lack of funds, we have also sought additional independent financial advice (pro bono through Accounting for Good).

All our funders are also provided with a comprehensive financial report at the end of each quarter.

Professional and Directors' indemnity insurance, which only assists when committee members are making informed decisions in good faith.

After discussions with stakeholders, we have also sought independent legal advice (pro bono through Justice Connect) to confirm and clarify a range of information to ensure our committee is making informed decisions. This process takes time and we will keep the community informed of any advice received.

Haven't you received enough money after the bushfires?

We have, indeed. received approximately. \$1.9M in bushfire related funds through CNC and UMIF since January 2020. Of these funds, \$760,000 was held in trust or auspiced (ie not for us to spend, only manage and distribute); and \$750,000 was for very specific projects and activities which have been delivered in accordance with those requirements.

The committee has made the decision to ensure that all donations made to the "1000 Steps" campaign - either to the CNC account or through the UMIF/FRRR donation account - will be used to provide a Youth Program only for 2025 and beyond (currently completely unfunded) and to support the core CNC service operations until DFFH funding can be restored.

Alternative measures have been implemented to pay outstanding debts and the bakery is required to operate financially independently.



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Early detection saves lives

Australia has one of the highest rates of skin cancer in the world and Lions clubs in Victoria and Southern NSW are doing something practical about reducing that level and its impact on families.

The incorporated charity - the Lions V Districts Cancer Foundation - has put a Skin Check and Awareness Unit on the road, following excellent financial support from Lions clubs and generous public and private supporters.

The Lions Club of Corryong has announced that the van will be here on March 4th and 5th at the Youth Club Hall in Donaldson Street to provide provide a free skin checking service to local people. The van be operated by fully trained, certificated and professionally supervised volunteers. The unit will also be a valuable resource for local people to access not only the skin check but valuable and timely information about skin care and selfchecking techniques. Early detection of skin

lesions potentially saves lives, so this visit will be a timely support and reminder to local people of the need to take care of their skin.

It typically takes around 30 minutes for a full body examination, though the exact time can vary depending on the number of suspicious spots found and the individual's skin type.

Following the skin

check, visitors will be issued with a referral to their GP if there are any suspect spots or lesions. The unit is not a medical clinic, so diagnosis or treatment requirements are not discussed.

It simply provides the skin check and alerts the visitor to skin lesions that require further checking and attention - a great first step in ensuring urgent needs are addressed.

The air conditioned van has three fully equipped checking rooms and an entry foyer, as well as a disabled lift and entry at the rear.

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What's the story on the legend?

'The Man or the Myth' is the 2025 theme for the Elyne Mitchell Photo Story Awards and also for the Art and Photography Exhibition at the Man From Snowy River Bush Festival this year.

The theme relates directly Banio to Paterson's poem 'The Man from Snowy River'. As the photo story competition stipulates that entries must reference the theme, aspiring entrants have been asking for some background information and guidance.

Ever since Banio Paterson first published his famous poem in 1890 people have asked if 'The Man' was Jack Riley or was he a composite character inspired by the poet's knowledge and experience of High Country stockmen? Or perhaps was 'The Man' simply a myth? What do you think? Some people might picture a stockman they know as their image of 'The Man'

There are others who suggest that if 'The Man' was a myth, then what about other myths to which the great poem alludes? Did 'the colt from Old Regret' really exist or was he a figment of the poet's imagination? Or was the poem simply inspired by Paterson's knowledge and love and creative response to the rugged beauty of the High Country landscapes?

Another possibility is that other people had a hand in creating the myth. What about the local

Upper Murray men who in midwinter in July 1914 just before World War 1 broke out, brought the dying Jack Riley to Corryong and told the story of their remarkable ride? Tom Mitchell claimed that just after he returned from the Second World War in 1946, Mr Findlay from Upper Towong told him the story of Jack Riley's last ride and how Jack's

body was laid out in

Corryong's Coffee Palace (now Roger C Brown's farm machinery and domestic appliance store). The yarns surrounding

Jack Riley's last ride contributed to the claim that Jack was indeed Paterson's 'Man from Snowy River'. After all, living at Tom Groggin and working for the Pierce family, Jack had been one of 'the Snowy River Riders on the mountains make their home, Where the river runs those giant hills between;' Here Paterson could have been describing Leather Barrel Creek as it cascades down from the Ramshead Range towards the Indi River. Or, was the bard describing the Indi River further downstream where it runs through the Murray Gates, a deep gorge formed from a steep ridge of Mt Pinnabar on the Victorian side, and a series of almost vertical spurs coming down from the Granuaille Mountain on the New South Wales side?

It seems that Tom Mitchell picked up on the yarns about Jack Riley. Born in 1906 Tom was almost eight-years-old when Jack Riley's body was brought down from Tom Groggin to Corryong. Tom loved bush poems and even tried his hand at writing some poetry himself.

During the Second World War when he was sent with the 8th Division to Malaya, along with photographs of his loved ones and keepsakes he took with him Paterson's book *The Man from Snowy River and other Verses.* Paterson's poetry was another link with the home he loved.

In early February 1942 following his loss of the anthology during the battle for Singapore, friends found Tom another copy in the British Library at Selarang Barracks in Changi Prisoner of War

Camp. While a prisonerof-war, Tom and some of his friends typed out poems for their mates on any paper they could find so that they too could read Paterson's poetry to remind them of Australia. If in their darkest hours their hopes of a homecoming were beginning to seem like a myth, that myth embodied hope. That sense of optimism became crucial to survival in the long years ahead until August 1945 when the Second World War finally drew to an end. Perhaps Tom realised

that following the privations of war, the Upper Murray also needed a myth or a story upon which to build its post-war future. Many believed there were contenders for Paterson's 'Man' from the other side of the mountains in the Monaro but for Tom and the Upper Murray Jack Riley was 'The Man'!

One of the first things Tom did after he was elected as the local member of Parliament for Benambra was to choose a headstone and have a plaque made for Jack Riley's grave. Perpetuating the myth that Jack was 'The Man', the inscription on the headstone reads 'In memory of the Man from Snowy River Jack Riley

buried here 16 July 1914'. On Thursday 11 October, 1962 Tom took up the story about the identity of 'The Man' in Paterson's poem in the *Corryong Courier* (page five) explaining:

What actually happened was that when Mrs Mitchell (Elyne) and I were with the Australian ski team in 1936, my mother had a small party in Sydney to farewell us and the team. Among her friends there was Banjo Paterson and I asked Banjo exactly who was the Man from Snowy River.

'Banjo told me that the man was to a large extent imaginary *but woven around Jack Riley*.

'My father Walter took Banjo on his first trip over to Kosciusko and was listening to Jack Riley's account of his escapades on Kosciuszko that caused him to write 'The Man From Snowy River'.

'I am trying to find a letter at home' Tom continued 'that Banjo wrote me about this trip with my father and of meeting the man from Snowy River and how he (Banjo) was impressed by the way my father could kill a snake with his stock whip without getting off his horse.'

Tom always said he would dig out the letter Banjo had written to him.

Only it seems that Tom never did dig out the letter and as he died in 1984, we will never know if the letter existed or not or if it was indeed a myth!

What is certain is that by having the headstone placed on Jack's grave and his letter to the *Corryong Courier*, Tom had confirmed in local imaginations that Jack Riley was 'The Man' from Snowy River. Tom or 'Mr History' as some people called him, had made his place as a mythmaker.

But does it matter who 'The Man' was who inspired Paterson to write 'The Man from Snowy River'? What Banjo Paterson has given us is a poem that has inspired and will continue to inspire and thrill generations of Australians and visitors to our country.

What do you think? Now you have some background to the theme let your imagination run free, take a photograph and write an approximately 200-word entry for the Elyne Mitchell Photo Story Awards.

You may already have taken a photograph that inspires you to write about your interpretation or perhaps the theme has inspired your writing and you need to find a photograph?



Practical approach improves mental health for farmers

The National Centre for Farmer Health is looking for members of the farming community in three local government areas to participate in a new peer-led mental health research trial.!

The innovative 10week session program -Back On Track - will be running in the Towong, Corangamite and Wellington Shires.

Back On Track is an innovative, peer-guided mental health initiative designed to support farming communities and takes approximately one hour per week.

Funded by the Gardiner Foundation

and led by the National Centre for Farmer Health, this program focuses on improving mental health outcomes for farmers by providing practical, culturally appropriate delivered by support community trusted members.

Back On Track offers a supportive, practical approach to improving mental health.

Guidance is provided by peer coaches trained in behavioural activation - an evidence based method for boosting mood. The program has been

co-designed with farming communities to ensure it meet the needs of their

community members and is being delivered by trained coaches who live and work in Victoria's farming communities.

Participation in the feasibility trail is open to members of the farming community aged 15 and over who are experiencing low mood or depression. The three local government areas were selected to reflect the Gardiner Foundation's focus on dairy farming



He left school at 12 years of age as he was not keen on the studies. John was employed on different farms completing tasks such as ring barking trees, milking cows, marking calves and lambs, butchering sheep and pigs. Of course, mustering cattle on his horse was a favourite.

At 14 he was employed by Doug Emery where he learnt to operate tractors and saws. Doug also found that John was a very good swimmer and used him to pull ropes around submerged logs in the Murray River so they could be pulled by bulldozers into the banks. Doug also gave him a gun so he could keep the town dogs away from his sheep on the side of Mount Mittamatite. Many dogs met their maker at his hands. On one occasion Ossie

Bentley organised a trip up past Geehi to catch a few brumbies. John, Maurice, Tex Sharp and Little Graham Bentley headed off with Ossie. Several days were spent in the bush, where the brumbies were elusive and the obstacles were plentiful. The hours were long and the injuries many. By the time the food ran out there was only one brumby tied up and that was due to

John became entrepreneur early on, taking on a contract with the Montagues at Welaregang Station to drive cattle. The grass on the roads was needed due to drought conditions but after only a few days his partner pulled the pin and left him in the lurch. So big brother 'Mocka' was called to the rescue. For months they drove the cattle out through Holbrook down through Corowa toward Wangaratta then back again.

Some of the stories from this adventure are legendary. Like the time when on the edge of one town the cattle took fright at some machinery and stampeded into town, knocking over fences and terrorising the locals. Several COWS went behind one house where the washing was on the line and by the time the working dogs returned the cows one beast had a sheet draped over her horns.

Later on when they were getting the cattle back near Welaregang, they put the mob down to the river near the Jingellic Bridge. They then tied the two horses and sulky up outside the Jingellic hotel while they had a drink. To their astonishment they came out to see the horse hitched to the sulky had gone After some local news.


John had to ride the single horse as fast as he could to stop the sulky several miles up the road towards Welaregang. Obviously, the wayward horse knew where home was!

By the time John was 18 he needed to get wheels and he purchased his first truck - a Maple Leaf - and he set off carting small loads around Corryong.

However, he quickly identified that the trip over Keelangie to Albury was more lucrative, so John and Maurice became partners in Stockwell Transport.

In 1958 the transport company had to take a back seat for a while. John's mate Murray Hillier talked him into travelling to Queensland with him to

1960 they were married and lived in Corryong.

The Snowy Scheme was building the Murray power station system by this time and Stockwell Transport secured work for its trucks carting fuel, pipes and anything else that was required. For several years John completed a fuel run to Bella Vista six days a week which required a 5:30am start and a 6:00pm finish. However, due to rock falls and/or snow and mud this could end up being midnight.

In 1963, during the building of the sewerage system in Corryong, John secured a contract with the council to do the night cart for the houses that did not have the lines connected. So after a days driving, John would grab a couple of young mates and race around town collecting sewerage the bins. Afterwards, it was a quick clean up and a few beers to finish the day.

Carting bricks from Wagga to Corryong was another frequent trip and Joanie would quite often accompany him. On one occasion he had a young cousin in the truck as well and while coming up Urara Gap in the overloaded

in the trucking game. In 1962 Joanie fell pregnant with their first

child and in early 1963 she went to Melbourne to have the baby. Unfortunately, they lost their little girl. Then in 1965 their son Johnny was born. This changed John's life and he became more hard working and responsible.

During the Corryong years John was known to work hard and play hard, often going to the pub on a Saturday morning drink all day then go to Uncle Charlie's and play cards until the early hours of the

morning. By 1968 the Snowy work had all but dried up and the drought meant that the funds were tight. So John made the decision to move his family to Melbourne.

He drove trucks for many of the next 40 years. However, he did take on supervision jobs in between so he could spend more time at home with Joanie and Johnny. One job was with Smorgon Abattoirs. He was also the transport manager for F.A.

Neale for 15 years. John. Joanie and Johnny lived at Sunshine for many years. When Johnny left home, his

In 2010 John arrived back in Corryong after ending a 49-year marriage to Joanie. He found a new partner but struggled in the relationship. He then lived on his own for many years. He rekindled friendships from the 1960s and visited relations

regularly. He used the front of the Corryong bakery to keep a look out for old friends. Some discussions would last for hours. Maurice Christensen became a daily catchup.

kept John always his Fairlane car in top condition so he could jump in and travel to Melbourne to visit Johnny and his family. Other shorter Albury. excursions to Tumbarumba or Wagga were frequent as well. If you were lucky enough to drive the Fairlane, John would keep a good eye on you and control the air conditioner.

In the last three years John's health waned and his eyesight declined to the point he could not drive any more. This was a bitter pill to swallow for a man who had driven millions of miles.

His mobility scooter was a task. Wild brumbies struggled to buck him off but the scooter seemed to do it with ease. Several injuries needed to be attended to. Home help girls started assisting him once a week then more often. John was a little blunt for some girls but several embraced his manner and he admired them.




