Strategy champions new opportunities

Launched in February 2023, 'Innovation Upper Murray' is an exciting new project for the region, that locals can join now.

Funded by the state government

and supported by key stakeholders - Upper Murray Incorporated, Upper Murray Community Recovery Committee, Towong Shire Council, the Victorian Department

of Energy, Environment and Climate Action, and RMIT University - it aims to help the Upper Murray community and businesses identify opportunities for innovation, economic diversification and undertake long-term planning. The involvement of government and research bodies in the process, to support the successful adoption of initiatives, makes it a (place-based) method called Smart Specialisation Strategy (or 'S3').

"The 'Innovation Upper Murray' project builds on the substantial work of community consultation accomplished in the last decade and which led to the Upper

Murray 2030 Vision Plan, as well as the post-bushfire Community Recovery Plan," said Upper Murray Inc (UMI) chair, Jo Mackinnon.

"The S3 innovation focus aims to develop opportunities with strategic and robust competitive advantage that leverage the region's natural strengths and assets.

"In other words, the project's ambition is to champion exciting innovation opportunities derived from our region's unique strengths."

So far, data has been gathered to understand the region and its potential innovation opportunities. They include demographic

and economic data, analysis of existing plans and strategies for the region and close to 90 interviews conducted by a project manager, Juliette Milbank, who has since moved on to other ventures.

The 63 interviews were with members of the community, business, government, agriculture, the research and education sectors, along with an additional 25 organisations serving the region.

Interviews covered a broad range of community and business, from farmers to shop owners and from historical families to fairly new residents.

They revealed a rich range of motivated, skilled and inspired people.

Sixth generation farmer, Jayden Pierce and his wife Jasmine deliberately ride horses for the welfare of their cattle, while using electronic monitoring of their cattle movements to optimise feed and fertiliser.

Former teachers, Cathy and Warwick Ross, have been volunteering in the community since they retired in 2014.

Over the past 10 years, they have been heartily supporting Corryong's recovery and tourism activities.

Enthusiastic new locals such as Shelley Neale (who created Khancoban Kitchen spice business in 2020) and Mick Butler (who bought Hobie's Sports store in 2021), are running their businesses with a vision, while being actively involved in outdoor activities and local groups.

The data collected has provided the information for the Regional Context analysis and a summarised version of this document is available on the Innovation Upper Murray website, at the Corryong Neighbourhood Centre (CNC) and at the Upper Murray Recovery Hub, for consultation and

feedback, to obtain a final list of innovation ideas as opportunities to investigate.

In early findings, many strengths of the region revolve around the landscape with significant areas of natural parks and abundance of water, the excellent growing conditions of climate and soils, projected climate resilience compared to other regions. These strengths, which will be increasingly important in the future in light of climate evolution, are the basis of many opportunities in agriculture, tourism, conservation and energy production.

The next step of the S3 process is to involve the community in Entrepreneurial Discovery Workshops, to investigate in detail each opportunity and understand which

ones are worth pursuing.

This is done with the support of representatives from local, national government bodies and Australian experts in the discussions, to identify specific innovation opportunities with strong competitive advantage for the Upper Murray.

If you want to participate in this important step of the project, make sure you head to InnovationUpperMurray.org website, the CNC or the Upper Murray Recovery Hub to register your interest.

Feedback must be received by 28th February, 2024.

Council plans remain under scrutiny

Recently I received a letter from Towong Shire CEO, Juliana Phelps, regarding the council's response to the petition we submitted in December.

While I have previously covered some of the points she made, there are some which I have not addressed.

Firstly, however, I must apologise. Recently when reading an article about the Council's Extraordinary Meeting on the 10th of January I misunderstood what I had read and formed the idea that Councillors Andrew Whitehead and Peter Dikschei had voted to continue with the CBD Streetscape project as designed.

Unfortunately, when I attended the meeting last week, I repeated this erroneous idea to the participants. I want to make it clear that I was absolutely wrong on this point. Councillors Whitehead and Dikschei responded to community concerns about the project and voted to suspend work to investigate options to amend the design to better meet the community's needs.

While I disagree with some of the decisions they have made, I have found council to be composed of good people doing a tough, essential and often thankless task managing limited resources to best effect. I apologise for the confusion I have caused.

With regards to Juliana's letter, she has asked me to thank those who signed the petition for their feedback. There has been some suggestion that council ignored the petition but this was not the case. As I explained in my last letter, they proved very receptive to polite and reasoned discussion of the community's concerns.

Ultimately, however, council voted 3-2 to continue with the structure of the works as planned. In response to safety concerns, the marking of the 5.4m parking bays has been altered to indicate a 600mm manoeuvring space with 4.8m for parking. This is the inner of the two lines painted in Stage 1 late last week. This does not move the parked cars and the traffic any further apart, however.

Council also resolved to apply to decrease the speed limit in the CBD block to 40km/h.

Finally, council resolved to develop a plan to increase the number of parking spaces available across the CBD. The Streetscape project will decrease the parking in Hanson Street by 18 angled spaces. In the lower section of the Wheeler Street carpark, two carparks available for general use have been converted for EV charging with three more to be occupied by the new toilet block. It is unclear to me whether the new parking plan aims to provide extra spaces compared to the current street layout or just to replace some of the 23 lost to the Streetscape.

While council seems determined to continue with its plans in the CBD, we may still have a chance of influencing their plans for the western end of Hanson Street. There has been some concern about plans to cut the double traffic lanes in the divided section of the street back to a single lane in each direction. This seems like a very poor idea, particularly when the new bypass will direct heavy trucks to merge and diverge from the highway halfway along this section.

In addition, council's 2030 plan shows an intention to reduce the speed limit along the entire length of the Murray

Valley Highway through town to 40km/h. It is this sort of insidious reduction which has seen journey times to Wodonga steadily increase over recent decades so that a trip which once took 1¼ hours now takes 1½. This places an extra burden of fatigue on the drive and entrenches our community's isolation.

If you would like to send a message to Towong Council that you are unhappy with these plans, David at the Post Office has kindly offered to host another petition on these matters. I have learnt from my mistakes, it's only one signature for both issues. Other venues may be advised through social media. I will need to submit this petition to council by February 19th to meet the deadline for its next meeting.

In closing, I would like to make it clear that I am not opposed to the projects currently being undertaken by council. However, I feel that some of the compromises being made to the community's interests in the pursuit of grant revenue are disturbing and need to be scrutinised and challenged.

Emergency issues cleared up

The Municipal Emergency Management Plan Committee (MEMPC) members are writing in response to the article published on February 1st in the *Corryong Courier* regarding recent discussions on emergency procedures and relief centres in Corryong.

We aim to clarify any inaccuracies in the report by outlining our emergency management arrangements.

In late November, the MEMPC received a letter from the Chair of the Corryong CRC. This

letter was brought forth for consideration at our December meeting. The concerns highlighted in the letter were thoroughly discussed during this meeting, and a response was provided.

The article mentions "evacuation / relief centres" but for clarity, we will use the term Emergency Relief Centre(s) in line with the State Emergency Management Plan (SEMP) and the Towong Municipal Emergency Management Plan (MEMPC) 2023-2026, which outlines relief arrangements for the Towong Shire. It has been available on the council's website for several years. Adopting an all-hazards approach, this plan incorporates strategically positioned Emergency Relief Centre sites throughout the local government area.

The plan communicates the following information: "During an emergency, careful consideration must be given to the prevailing circumstances and number of people needing assistance when selecting an Emergency Relief Centre site or sites. The Incident Controller, in consultation with the Municipal Emergency Response Co-ordinator [VICPOL] and the Municipal Recovery Manager [Council], will determine the need for, and appropriate location of, Emergency Relief Centres.

Once an Emergency Relief Centre site has been decided the Municipal Recovery Manager will arrange to prepare the site for use. The Incident Controller will arrange for appropriate communications through the ICC to inform communities, the public and other agencies."

During emergencies, Emergency Relief Centres, activated by the Incident Controller, offer

immediate services to affected individuals. It's important to note that the primary relief centre site for the Corryong township has changed since the Black Summer Bushfires of 2019-2020, and this information is detailed in the MEMPC 2023-2026 (section 5.10).

The responsibility falls on the Incident Controller, through the Public Information Unit of an Incident Control Centre, to notify the community about opening an emergency relief centre. This notification typically occurs through channels like the Vic Emergency App and website, designated emergency radio broadcasters, SMS alerts in certain situations and other media outlets like social media, TV and noticeboards. Support agencies to the control agency, such as the council, aid in disseminating these notifications through available communication channels.

Your report highlighted concerns about the perceived inadequacy of addressing community concerns regarding emergency relief centres. The MEMPC is actively collaborating with member agencies to develop a comprehensive communication package to disseminate information about relief arrangements through various channels including local publications, social media, printed flyers and other means.

Community spirit has been key to hall success

This is the second part of a history of the Corryong & District Memorial by local author John Murphy in the lead up to a celebration of the revitalised facility next week.

Its Genesis In 1958, the Athenaeum Hall site was completely cleared except for the front concrete steps leading up to the main entrance and prepared for the construction of the present edifice, the Corryong & District Public Memorial Hall.

The shift of focus by the Snowy Mountains Hydro-electric Authority to the western side of the mountain range brought huge changes to both Khancoban and Corryong. In the interim the showing of movies was relocated to the Presbyterian Hall which became known as the Valley Theatre.

When plans were approved this building was the biggest single community hall (in floor area) in rural Victoria. Not bad for a small country town but also a mammoth project for our community. The hall also boasted the biggest movie screen outside the Melbourne Metropolitan area at that time. Another innovation was the sound-proof 'Crying Room' but some of the locals were puzzled as to whether it had been installed for the children

or the parents!

The bricks were locally manufactured by Ron Duell with the clay quarry and brick kiln situated on the edge of Parish Lane below the present-day aerodrome. They were fired to give the same colour and texture to blend in with the adjoining RSL Hall on Donaldson Street, completed in 1955.

The alpine ash hardwood timber flooring was also locally sourced from Mt Pinnibar and the Six Mile logging tenements on 'The Gib' and all gifted by Julia Hale, private owner of the Myrree Timber Mill, Nariel. This was a considerable donation by any measure consuming 5½ miles (8.9 km) of narrow-width (3.25 inches or 8 cm) dressed tongue and groove board; and deserving of continued recognition.

Where possible much of the labour and skilled work was donated by Returned Servicemen, their families, friends and other interested community members. Funding for the project was raised through loans, donations and community events and of course the loans portion had to be repaid. The estimated cost of the project was £30,000, the bulk of this lent by the State Savings Bank of Victoria. The whole community immediately

chipped in organising numerous activities to reduce this loan.

After many unanticipated hiccups – the major one being that the new roof leaked(!) – the Corryong & District Public Memorial Hall was officially opened on the 1st of May, 1959. This event was delayed as other events had already been scheduled.

It was a busy time ahead! The opening was celebrated by an inaugural Ball, the first of many grand balls in the new venue to come. It was through these events that many local romances blossomed.

However, the first event was the 'Valley Queen Competition' which was held prior to the official opening on the 17th April 1959. Leading up to this occasion a number of young women from the district held various and numerous events to raise money towards the hall. The contestants were Beverley Hamilton, Judith Bryceson, Joan Boardman, Pam Roberts and Mavis Wilson. The winner by a country mile was Joan Boardman who raised an incredible £2417/11/5 out of a total raised from all contestants of £6487/6/2. However the efforts of all the girls were greatly appreciated. 1300 people attended the evening and an extra £540 was raised

on the night. The bad news was there was still £15,000 owing!

The Dramatic Club presented their new play on the 7th & 8th of May. The Corryong community had a strong drama club and their locally produced pantomimes were big events that continued well into the 1960s. It was a time when frustrated thespians could tramp the boards, hog the limelight and demonstrate their variable acting abilities. It was also a time when locals could laugh at other locals and get away with

it. The 22nd of May marked the first Church of England Debutante Ball in the new building and it proved a sensation with no effort spared on the dresses.

All the other activities that had previously been conducted in the Old Athenaeum gradually resumed with the first movie showing in the new 'Civic Picture Theatre' being scheduled for the 16th of September, 1959. Can you remember the movies? A Kiss Before Dying & Desert Sands.

Take two steps to a marine licence

As the local Vicroads agency, the Corryong Neighbourhood Centre (CNC) has clarified the process for getting a marine licence, particularly for those who have recently completed or are planning to undertake a marine

safety course in Corryong. As stated on the certificate of attainment participants receive at the course, the certificate is not a marine licence - it is recognition that they have passed the knowledge test and are now qualified to apply for a licence. "You can, of course, complete the entire marine licence process including sitting the knowledge test at the CNC at any time," said co-ordinator, Sara Jenkins. "It is much the same process as getting a learner's permit, it requires some prior study to prepare for the test, about an hour of your time and costs \$46.80 (plus the five-year licence fee). However, generally after completing an external course, you would

need to physically go to Vicroads in Wodonga to get your marine licence." To ensure the benefits of being able to do the course locally are maximised, the CNC has made an arrangement with Vicroads to enable the application process to be completed in Corryong. While this is still a trial and there may be some changes in the future, the current process is attend the CNC with around 45 mins to spare during opening hours (Mon-Thur 9am to 5pm).
 • Bring the following:-
 - Your certificate of attainment from the marine safety course
 - Two forms of ID, including 1 photo ID and either a birth certificate or passport
 - Proof of residence


(eg bank statement, utility bill)
 - Glasses or contacts if you wear them to see clearly. Participants will then be given a Licence Application form to complete, have an eye test and their documents copied. The cost of a five-year marine licence is \$199 (or \$224.50 with PWC endorsement), which can be paid at the CNC by cash or card. The CNC cannot process shorter duration marine licences. The CNC cannot issue a temporary licence on the day but your documents will be emailed to Vicroads Wodonga, which will process the application and send the licence out by mail in approximately two weeks.
