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Road damage reaches crisis point

VicRoads should pay for damage to cars caused by the current pothole epidemic, according to the Member for Benambra, Bill Tilley.

He said the state of our major roads is unprecedented during his 17 years in the Victorian Parliament.

At present VicRoads has a \$1580 threshold for property damage caused by its roads.

Last week Mr Tilley called on the Roads Minister to review that threshold and take immediate action on potholes and road failures across the district.

"Highways and major arterials under the guardianship of the state are failing and potholes are literally everywhere," Mr Tilley said.

"The damage to vehicles has been extensive and I think these circumstances demand the threshold be reviewed perhaps even dropped for the time being.

"People are calling, emailing and sending photos. One spent \$2800 on repairs and a pensioner had a \$561 bill and of course doesn't get to the threshold

for compensation. Another person had to hire a car after theirs was left undriveable."

Mr Tilley said a constituent travelling the Murray Valley Highway counted more than 60 "decent sized" potholes over a 70 kilometre stretch from Tallangatta to their home.

He added that the Victorian government cut \$150 million, about 25 per cent, from the state roads maintenance budget in May.

Mr Tilley said these roads are simply not safe.

"There are some signs in place to warn of the danger but the reality is that there will never be enough signs for the numbers of potholes we now have on our roads," he said.

"We all live here, we all know it's been wet but that's no excuse, it's been wet before.

"Motorists are suffering blow outs travelling at 100kmh, they're crossing lines to avoid potholes on the crest of a hill.

"I genuinely fear a serious accident will occur unless we get action," Mr Tilley said.

Council has no wriggle room to fund necessary road works

Towong Shire mayor, Cr Andrew Whitehead has told a federal inquiry into the roads network that his council was not in a position to move funds from one area to another when there are other priorities.

The Towong, Wangaratta and Wodonga councils gave evidence on Monday to the House of Representatives Standing Committee on Regional Development, Infrastructure and Transport which is investigating the implications of severe weather events on the national regional, rural and remote road network.

Cr Whitehead told the inquiry that "In a small rural council like Towong we're cut to the bone.

"We don't have the ability to move money

from one area to another just to help the road network when it's in such dire needs because the community actually needs the other things that we provide to them.

"We can't close the swimming pools or libraries to try to put more money into roads.

"They can't just go without. It's not right on small rural communities to not have those things, they should have the same opportunities that their metro counterparts have.

"The funding stream needs to actually look at different things apart from volume of traffic on roads," Cr Whitehead explained.

"If we talk about the Murray Valley Highway, the further away from Wodonga we get the worse the road gets."



This section of the Murray Valley Highway between Corryong and Towong was repaired earlier in the year but recent wet weather has caused even more extensive damage to the roadway. Its condition could have been worse if not for a couple of civic-minded locals who have taken it upon themselves to fill in potholes in Corryong and surrounds.

Writer impressed with our youth

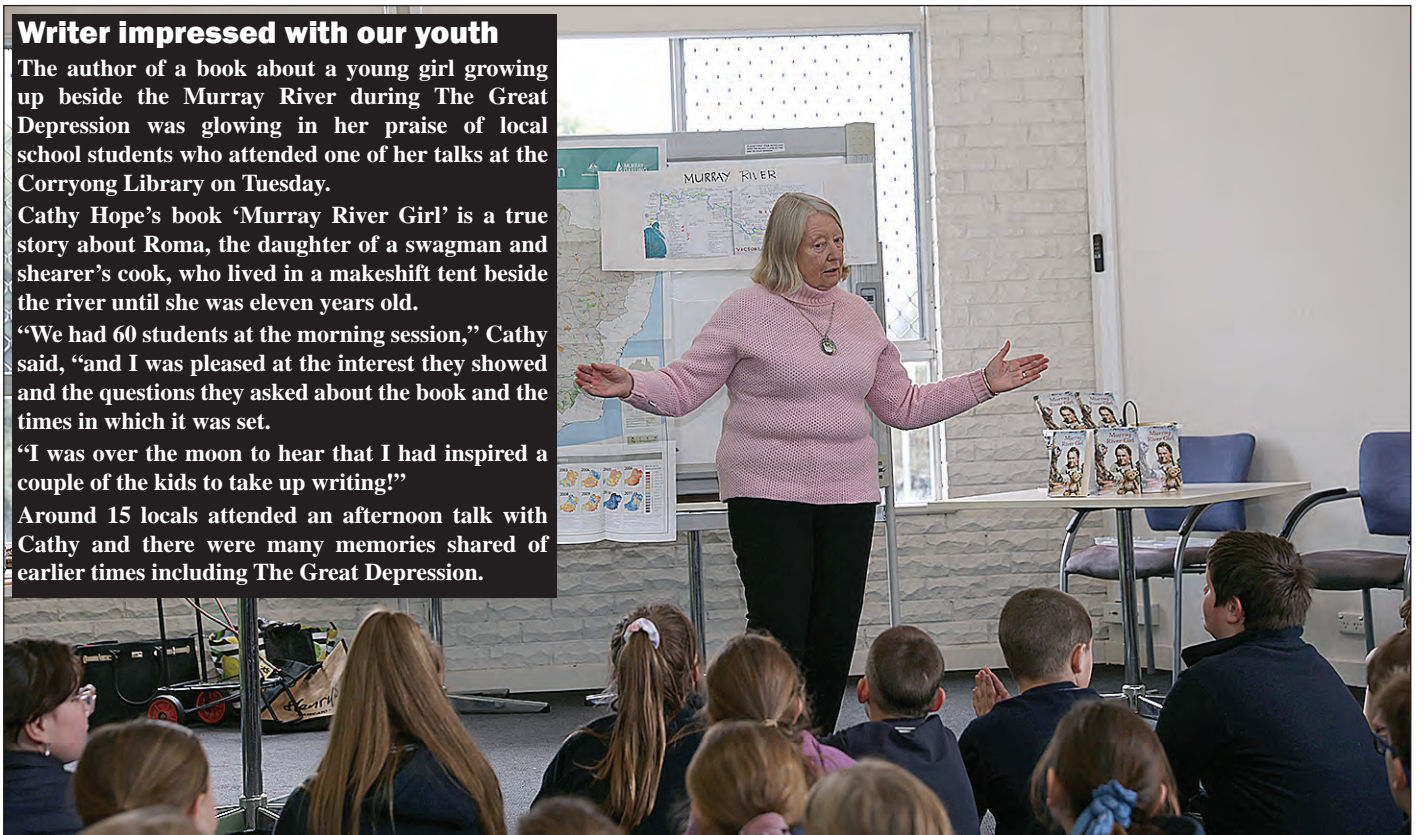
The author of a book about a young girl growing up beside the Murray River during The Great Depression was glowing in her praise of local school students who attended one of her talks at the Corryong Library on Tuesday.

Cathy Hope's book 'Murray River Girl' is a true story about Roma, the daughter of a swagman and shearer's cook, who lived in a makeshift tent beside the river until she was eleven years old.

"We had 60 students at the morning session," Cathy said, "and I was pleased at the interest they showed and the questions they asked about the book and the times in which it was set.

"I was over the moon to hear that I had inspired a couple of the kids to take up writing!"

Around 15 locals attended an afternoon talk with Cathy and there were many memories shared of earlier times including The Great Depression.



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New bridge will last a century

The much-anticipated official opening of the new Towong Bridge to traffic on Tuesday was celebrated by communities on both sides of the Murray River, with the first cars officially driving over it soon afterwards.

Transport for NSW Regional Director South, Sam Knight, said about 140 people gathered at the campground on the NSW side of the bridge for the community celebration.

She firstly thanked the community for its patience throughout the work, which started in April last year.

"It is wonderful to be able to deliver this brand new 58-metre long bridge that can carry more traffic and heavier loads, and will

require less maintenance," she said.

"Towong Bridge is an important link across the Murray River for local residents in the Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) LGA (NSW) and Towong Shire (Victoria) and so this bridge will benefit the freight and agricultural industries as well as tourists and local residents."

Corryong resident and special guest, John Whitehead, was seven years old when the old Towong Bridge was completed in 1938.

Speaking at the opening, Mr Whitehead remembered watching the progress of the original build almost every day on his way to school and

at weekends, and now at 92 said he has enjoyed visiting the new bridge site each week with his wife Maxine to oversee progress.

He has understandably lost count of the number of times he has crossed the bridge throughout his lifetime.

"I used to cross the river on horseback before the bridge was built," he said.

"Then I'd ride my pony across when it was half built – that was tricky – but my mother made sure we got to school each day no matter what and that meant we had to get across the river," Mr Whitehead said.

He also recalled coming home from local dances in the early hours of the morning in summer and stopping at the bridge to go "skinny dipping" to cool down.

"The old bridge was great for the communities in the area as it provided a very important river crossing but it was getting old and was struggling to handle the heavier loads of traffic going across it," he said.

"This new bridge is just fantastic. I'm pleased to say I saw the first bridge built.

"It's been great to be here for the opening of the second bridge but I think I'll probably miss the third one!"

Ham, said the bridge project is an excellent result.

"Snowy Valleys Council sends its congratulations to Transport NSW and to the contractor Neiman," she said.

"My gratitude to the locals who have had to detour for the past 14 months. This has been a big inconvenience to many. Their patience has been noted.

"Life will be easier for people who have had to add over a half an hour to their trip. This bridge is now here for at least another 100 years."

The NSW and Victorian governments funded the \$10 million project as part of the Border Bridge Maintenance Program.

It includes a two-metre-wide shared pathway along one side of the bridge to add to the community's connectivity.

The original bridge was finished in 1938 as a timber beam bridge across the Murray River between Bringenbrong and Towong.

Timber from the old bridge will be given to councils on both sides of the river to use in local projects to celebrate the old bridge.

Closure comes at a cost

It may not have rivalled the stunt of Francis de Groot who slashed the tape with a sword at the opening of the Sydney Harbour Bridge in 1932 but a local property owner made his own point at Tuesday's opening of the new Towong Bridge.

Towong Hill Road resident, Mark Auchinleck, had criticised Transport for NSW from the outset for not providing temporary vehicle access on the Victorian side of the border to landholders with property on both sides of

the river.

At the bridge opening, Mr Auchinleck distributed copies of an invoice he had sent to Transport for NSW to the media, claiming compensation for his property overseer having to travel an extra 14kms a day while Towong Hill Road was closed during construction.

He is claiming \$600 in compensation and an additional \$190 for impeding travel between property holdings on the Victorian side of the border.

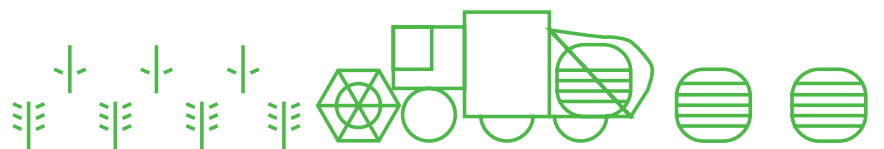
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Story of loss takes readers on an emotional journey

The book started off as a short story but Kim



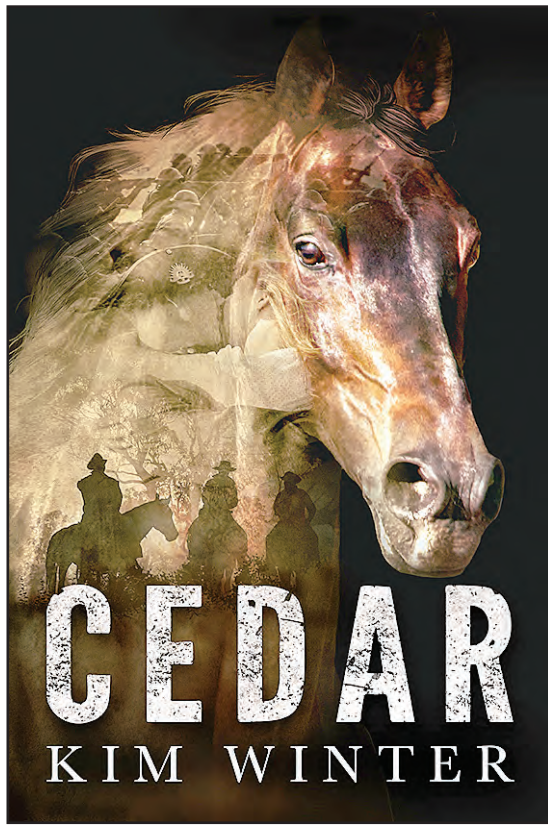
was encouraged to tell the whole story of Cedar and despite other diversions (“like running a full time business!”), she eventually found time to complete her novel.

Nariel woman, Joy Bennetts, will be one of 30 participants from the region who will participate in the Centenary of Legacy Torch Relay which will travel through the streets of Wodonga and Albury on Saturday 5th August.

The local torch bearers all have a connection to Legacy or the Australian Defence Force.

The relay commemorates Legacy Australia’s 100 years of service to the families of those veterans who have given so much to our country. It is a six-month campaign presented by Defence Health, having commenced just prior to Anzac Day this year on those very battlefields in Pozières in France where that first promise was made.

The relay will cover around 50,000kms across the globe, with 1500 torch bearers participating.

The ‘Legs for Legacy’s’ campaign goal is to raise \$1 million to help keep the Legacy Promise alive.

Goals race hots up

With two rounds of the home and away season to go, the contest for the *Corryong Courier* goalkicking award seems to be between Cudgewa sharpshooters Adam Prior, leading on 47 goals, from Blues' coach, Drew Cameron, on 38.

However, the bolter could be Bullioh marksman, Ash Murray, who sits third on the list with 35 majors from just four games, after booting 14 against Corryong on Saturday. Prior's 47 goals have come in nine games while Cameron has 38 from six.

Cudgewa hosts Bullioh this week in what could turn into a shootout between Murray and the Blues' flotilla of forwards.

The title could come down to the last round when Cudgewa takes on winless Corryong, providing the Blues' forwards with the opportunity to kick bags.

Bullioh plays Tumberumba whose defence will have to step up after Murray nailed eight goals against the Roos in round six to seal a four-point win. He missed the round eight rematch which was won by the Roos by two points.

How many goals Murray would kick against Corryong on Saturday became the only interest in a lacklustre match despite 39 goals being scored, as the Dogs went all-out attack in the second half.

They finished with eight goalkickers as the holes got bigger in the Dees' defence with Jesse Wellington posting five goals in the win.

Corryong was best served by Jake Burge and Ryan Murray who booted six goals between them and Pat Riley who amassed possessions around the ground.

In the other match, Cudgewa squashed any

hope Tumberumba had of an upset by racking up 22 goals to five after quarter time.

The onslaught was led by the usual suspects of Adam Prior and Drew Cameron who combined for half of their side's goals and the Bartel brothers who added another seven majors.

Josh Bartel was best afield closely followed by Darcy McKimmie while Connor Clayton and Fynn Debono were tireless for the Roos.

This week

Tumberumba sits two games behind Bullioh on the ladder and will come out all guns blazing against Corryong to boost their percentage in its quest to reel in the Dogs and claim the double chance in the finals.

The all-conquering Cudgewa is long odds-on to beat Bullioh, reducing the gap to four points; setting up a mouth-watering clash when the

Roos and Dogs meet in the last round.
