Merger talks focus around junior options

Speculation has been rife over the last week about the Federal and Corryong Football Netball Clubs holding talks regarding a merger, given the parlous state of both of their football playing lists.

The Swans were in grave danger of folding prior to the 2022 season because of a lack of playing numbers but managed to rustle up sufficient footballers at the eleventh hour to start the season.

Corryong has also struggled to put enough players on the field this season and only had 15 starters against Bullioh on Saturday, after forfeiting the reserves and under 14s.

Numbers across all three grades for both clubs have fluctuated during the season and players have had to double up from the reserves on several occasions.

Driver airlifted to hospital

A Corryong man injured in a single vehicle accident in the early hours of Saturday morning was fortunate that a passerby happened upon the scene and called emergency services.

The 27-year-old man lost control of his sedan on the Cudgewa Valley Road approximately 100 metres south of the intersection with the Murray Valley Highway at around 2.15am in the morning.

The vehicle rolled several times before coming to rest. It was noticed by another driver a short time later and Corryong police were notified.

They located the accident site at around 2.30am and the man was conveyed by ambulance to the Albury Base Hospital. He was later transferred by air to the Royal Melbourne Hospital for treatment for spinal and shoulder injuries and is now in a stable condition.





Learning centre opens its doors



A free learning hub for university and higher education students is open in Corryong to support locals who are studying

remotely.

Students enrolled in a degree at any Australian university or higher education provider can register via the Country Universities Centre (CUC) Ovens Murray website www.cucovensmurray. edu.au for free access to the learning and study space in Boundary Street, with wraparound support to help them succeed in their studies.

Registration provides access to high-speed internet, computers, printers and video conferencing facilities, as well as on-site learning support.

Sophie Greenhill has been appointed as the Education Co-ordinator for the Corryong site and she is there to support students currently studying or looking to kickstart their learning journey.

"Students have access to our dedicated learning and study spaces created to support local students to succeed in their studies," she said.

"As a registered student, you receive wraparound support from myself and academic support from Celeste Oliver, our Learning Skills Advisor.

"The other great thing about CUC is you will have access to reliable high-speed internet, dual screen computers and printing facilities with after-hours access so you can study when it suits you.

"This type of support in our local community will contribute to successful outcomes for local students and will build a sustainable local workforce for our community," Ms Greenhill said.

In Corryong, on average, 11 percent of 25-34-year-olds hold degrees, compared to the metropolitan average of 44 percent. The CUC is working to address the divide by providing quality access to higher education opportunities for regional people and communities.

"If qualified people remain in the region, it creates less need to attract people from outside the area, leading to a direct benefit on local businesses, education and health facilities," Ms Greenhill added.

One of the first students to register with the CUC in Corryong was Maddi Miller who is currently completing her Bachelor of Nursing through CSU Albury/Wodonga.

"During exam period I was able to use the centre for a quiet space to prepare for and complete my exams," she said.

"Having something like the CUC in Corryong very useful as a student because it gives me confidence to use a mixed mode of on-campus and online study knowing that I have the support when I am not on campus."

CUC Ovens Murray Centre Manager, Mark van Bergen, said the site in Corryong means that local students will be able to earn a degree without leaving home but still have access to campus-like facilities and academic support.

"Having a dedicated space to study with reliable internet and printers means you can get away from any distractions at home and really focus on your study," he explained.

"We have great people on site to support your learning and wellbeing, and you get to meet other students who are on the same journey as you, managing remote study.

"You can use it as little or as often as you like - whether you just pop in at exam times, use it for printing or when you've run out of internet data.

"Even students who are studying away can use the CUC when they're home visiting family and friends," Mr van Bergen added.

Registered students can access the CUC when it suits them, with secure swipe-card access from 7am to midnight, seven days a week. The CUC is currently located in the Corryong Innovation Space at 6 Boundary Street, Corryong.


The Swans faced further upheaval when they were forced to appoint a new coach in Ash Tyrell following the resignation of Matt Jones.

Land carers invited to apply for soil grants

Community groups in the North East with ideas to increase awareness and adoption of land management practices that improve and protect the region's soils have until August 1st to apply for two grants of up to \$7,500 each to deliver their programs.

The North East Soil **Health Community Grants** are allocated through the Securing North East

Soils Through Knowledge Exchange project that supports community groups undertake activities that increase awareness and adoption of land management practices to improve soil health.

The four-year project is supported by North East Catchment Management Authority (CMA), through funding from the Australian government.

North East CMA Project Officer, Sam Gitahi, said the nominated projects should promote community awareness as well as adoption of farm management practices that improve soil condition, focusing on reducing soil acidity and hillslope and gully erosion.

"Acid soils are a major cause of land degradation and threaten the productivity of agricultural soils in North East Victoria," Mr Gitahi said.

"Nearly half of the five million hectares of Victorian land affected by very acidic topsoil - which is indicated by low soil pH - are found in the north east region.



Farmers want to halt riverside camping

Federation (VFF) has written to the Victorian Minister for Environment and Climate Action, Lily D 'Ambrosio, calling for an immediate suspension of the rules that allow camping on riverside farmland due to the biosecurity risks posed by both Lumpy Skin Disease (LSD) and Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD).

VFF President, Emma Germano, said both diseases pose a very real risk to the agriculture industry and the Victorian government must take swift action to prevent disaster.

"Control measures at our international borders do not go far enough and we need the government to step up and protect our livestock and farm businesses," Ms Germano said.

"Uncontrolled public to farmland presents the most serious risk to farm biosecurity and we believe it's a no brainer to suspend the



rules that allow camping on riverside farmland."

"We can't leave

Ms Germano added the strict biosecurity measures

in place at farms designed to keep out disease could be rendered useless if

Safety campaign targets farm families

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) Making our Farms Safer Project (MOFS) is aiming to boost public awareness and highlight the on-farm risks for children through a new safety campaign.

VFF President, Emma Germano, said the launch of the campaign coincides with National Farm Safety Week 2022 and will see a dedicated safety guidebook launched for farming families.

"The Australian agriculture industry sadly represents the highest proportion of accidents causing death in any workplace, with children tragically making up one quarter of these numbers," she said.

"We need to do all we can as an industry to ensure no-one has to endure the heartbreak, pain, loss and emptiness that losing a child to a preventable onfarm accident results in.

The campaign is driven by findings of a 2021 coronial inquiry which revealed in the period from 1 January, 2016 to 21 December, 2021 seven Victorian children died using farm machinery.

The free forums are an opportunity for recreational fishers and boaters to come together, learn more about what is being done to improve their much-loved pastimes and share ideas on what could make them even better.

VFA CEO, Travis said forums Dowling, at Albert Park, Ballarat, Torquay, Nagambie and St Leonards had been a great success in recent months and staff from Fisheries Better Boating Victoria were looking forward to the next four.

"We are excited to continue these forums at local clubs, to catch up with fishers and boaters and discuss ways we can improve their experience on the water," Mr Dowling said.

"Our team has been busy delivering the Victorian government's \$35 million Go Fishing Victoria plan which has removed commercial net fishing from Port Phillip Bay and the Gippsland Lakes, made launching a boat and parking your trailer free and stocked a record 10 million fish last season, more than any other state in Australia.

"We are overseeing the biggest boat ramp construction program in the state's history and continuing to invest fishing licence fees into worthwhile projects.

"Each forum will hour-long presentations covering these topics and more including better access, ramp upgrades, fish cleaning tables, science and research, enforcement, education and more.



"With subject matter attending, experts participants will get answers to all those questions that are debated with mates while in the boat or by a river somewhere," he added.

"These forums are a great opportunity to suggest a project that will make a difference to your local water."
