Residents and visitors to the Upper Murray are now enjoying improved mobile phone coverage and connectivity, with the recent construction of three new Telstra mobile base stations in the region.

Two towers have been built at Koetong and Burrowye and a new smallcell base station has been

Cudgewa under the federal government's Mobile Black Spot Program.

Telstra Regional General Manager, Jenny Gray, said these mobile base stations will create new Telstra 4G coverage and help reduce mobile coverage black spots.

"We know the community's been looking

site and I'm pleased to say we've completed construction and been able to bring these sites on-air," Ms Gray said.

"Each day across Australia we have about 20 million devices using our mobile network, making about 60 million phone calls, sending 40 million SMS and using about 8.6 million Gigabytes of mobile data.

"Co-investment programs such as this, where carriers like Telstra and the government work together to share the cost in bringing new coverage in regional and rural locations are really important in helping improve connectivity outcomes.

"We know important that is today and these new sites not only help reduce mobile black spots in this area but also improve capacity and 4G coverage and provide additional triple zero connectivity.

"Building these new sites, in partnership with the government, shows we are committed to delivering infrastructure and upgrades to boost throughout this area,.

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
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Speakers shine light on 'the black dog'



The third annual 'Corryong Spirit' event next month will shine a light into the darkness of grief and the guest speakers include former AFL footballer Justin Koschitzke and Rev Tim Costello, one of Australia's most respected community leaders.

Justin Koschitzke's name is etched in the annals of Australian Football League (AFL) history. The #2 draft

pick's storied career with St Kilda is marked by determination, teamwork, and resilience, navigating the extreme highs and lows and being able to slowly transition his elite sporting careeer into his current role as a mental health speaker.

Raised on a farm at Brocklesby, Justin has spent his life immersed in the world of agriculture, facing the same challenges and celebrating the

same triumphs as his fellow farmers. His deep connection to the farming community drives his mission to support and uplift those who are often overlooked and underserved.

In recent years, Justin has dedicated himself to being a mental health advocate, focusing on the unique struggles faced by rural communities. He has seen the devastating impact of natural disasters, through his own farming community, leading to the loss of livestock, property.

These experiences have only strengthened his resolve to make a difference.

Justin's talks are rooted in empathy and understanding.

He doesn't just speak about mental health, he lives it. Having navigated his own mental health challenges, Justin brings a level of authenticity and relatability that resonates deeply with his audience.

He understands the pride and resilience of rural communities and he knows the importance of addressing mental health in a way that respects these values.

His goal is to help rural communities to find strength in their shared experiences, offering practical advice and creating a space for open and honest conversation about mental health and to provide the tools needed to build a more resilient future.

Rev Tim Costello AO is one of Australia's most respected community leaders and a sought after voice on social justice issues, leadership and ethics.

Tim is currently the Executive Director of Micah Australia which works to raise awareness and support for overseas Aid and Development. He is also Director of Ethical Voice through which he speaks in many contexts.

For 13 years until October 2016, Tim was Chief Executive of World Vision Australia (WVA).

Other positions Tim currently holds are Senior Advisor for the Centre for Public Christianity, Chair of the Community Council of Australia; Chief Advocate of the Thriving Communities Partnership. In 2021 he was appointed by Monash University as Chair of Peninsula Campus Community Advisory Committee.

Tim is a spokesperson for the Alliance for Gambling Reform, which campaigns for law reform to prevent harm from poker machine gambling.

In 2006 Tim was named

Victoria's Australian of the Year; in June 2005 was made an Officer of the Order of Australia (AO); in 2004, was named Victorian of the Year; and in 1997 was named as one of Australia's 100 National

Living Treasures

He has also written several books about mental health and gambling issues.

'Corryong Spirit' is an opportunity to acknowledge those whose lives were lost in our community and come together to reflect on our own hardships that we have endured.

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
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Alliance prepares for fire season

The Softwoods Working Group has engaged major stakeholders to develop a strategy to safeguard the softwood forestry industry in the Muray Region Hub ahead of the upcoming bushfire season.

A \$13M forestry funding package from the NSW government is aimed at protecting essential timber supplies in the region and will support key fire prevention, detection and response initiatives.

The funding package was developed through consultation with local communities, forestry industry groups and government agencies.

"It's absolutely critical that we get all the stakeholders involved to understand what we have, where our risks are and where are the vital assets that need protecting" said Carlie Porteous, SWG Executive Officer.

"The infrastructure and assets that were considered by the group involved both physical capital expenditures and digital infrastructure such as IT integration and communications, with a focus on securing much of it by the beginning of the fire season."

In the Black Summer bushfires in 2019-20, six bushfires in Victoria and NSW merged near Jingellic, forming a huge blaze covering 632,315 hectares (1,532,484 acres).

"The funding initiative is key to enhancing the region's overall safety and resilience," said Peter Crowe, SWG Chair, added that.

"By investing in critical fire prevention and response infrastructure, the project aims to protect not only the forestry industry but also the homes, livelihoods and well-being of the people living in the Murray region"

During the meeting, stakeholders discussed various critical aspects, including the current state of play and the region's fire risks related to fuel load, terrain and the location of essential assets such as future wood supply, mills, orchards and critical infrastructure. They also evaluated the existing infrastructure, its locations and the human resources available to operate it, identifying gaps and prioritising new infrastructure needs.

(The Murray Region Forestry Hub takes in about 3.5million hectares in the area east of the



Hume Freeway; west of the Great Dividing Range, south of Gundagai and taking in the plantations of NE Victoria down to Lake Eildon. Key forestry towns in the NSW part of the hub are Tumut, Batlow, Tumbarumba, Gundagai and Adelong. In the Victorian Hub area the main centres for the industry are Corryong, Tallangatta, Myrtleford and Wangaratta).

Corryong CBD Update

Last week, we had two crews working on Stages 3 and 5. Stage 3, located between the IGA and WAW Bank, commenced with the demolition of the footpath and kerb, as well as drainage pit work in preparation for pouring concrete. We completed electrical conduit installation in Stage 3, replaced the fascia and installed downpipes in front of the café. Additionally, the footpath concrete for Stage 5 was poured, and the planting for Stage 2 began.

This week we will continue to have two crews working along Hanson St in Stage 3 and 5. These works include replacing awning posts and footings for the IGA building verandah, building drainage pits, and prepping for kerb placement in Stage 3 and saw-cutting ashlar patten for the footpath in front of Memorial Hall. These saw cuts are made to relieve pressure from the concrete to prevent it from cracking.

To ensure the safety of community members and site workers temporary fences will be installed around work areas.

Obituary:- Marjorie Rose Carkeek

Matriarch enriched her family and community

Marj was born Margaret Rose Ritchie and had her name changed to Marjorie later, after she was adopted. She was born in Mortlake on June 18th, 1934 to parents David and Queenie Richie (nee Perkins) who had migrated from England with their families.

Marj's sister Muriel was born in 1936 and another sister Lillian Joyce was born in 1937. In 1938 her mother, then only 20, walked out on the family as she couldn't cope. Marj, aged three and Muriel, aged two, were placed in St Luke's Toddlers' Home in Bendigo. The baby, Lilian Joyce, was adopted into the Kerr family at Kerang. Mari's father decided to join the army and paid part of his wages to support the girls at St Luke's.

Life in St Luke's was frugal, particularly with the general wartime restrictions. While the children were well fed, love and hugs were as scarce as hen's teeth... non-existent. Marj and Muriel stayed there until April 1941.

Marj remembers the adoption process being nothing short of drafting animals for sale, the children being displayed on one side of the glass wall and the prospective parents parading on the other side of a glass wall making remarks. Marj said it was horrible and made her feel very judged.

Marj was adopted into the Stephens family at Yarrawalla at aged six and Muriel was left at Saint Luke's for a short time and then went to the Leo family at Kangaroo Flat.

The Stephens couple were approaching 50 years old and already had a son of their own Keith, who was nine years older than Marj. Marj's name was changed from Margaret to Marjorie at that time, a name which she never liked but learnt to tolerate.

She attended school at Yarrawalla South Primary but school was difficult because she was 'that girl from the home who was living at the Stephens. The teacher, Mrs O'Brien, once asked her to take a letter to the post box on the corner, which was a few minutes' walk. Marj was none the wiser but while she was away, Mrs O'Brien gathered all the other students together and told them that they had to treat Marj better and not to make a thing of how she was dressed. Her best friend from school only told her this about this 10 years ago!

After Marj finished school, the family moved off the farm into Pyramid Hill. She found life in a small town very different to life on the farm. She wasn't used to mixing with other young people but soon learned. She played tennis and went to school camps and dances.

Her first job was at a garage where she served petrol and did office work. After a few months there, she applied for and got a job in the office of the butter factory, which she really enjoyed. She stayed there until she started nursing at age of 17 at Northern District School of Nursing in Bendigo.

In July 1954 she travelled to Cudgewa, where her brother Keith was the Methodist minister, to support her sister-in-law Betty looking after their two children, Helen and Bill, while a third child Joan was born.

That is where she met her future husband Bill at church.

Marj returned to Pyramid Hill and the couple continued to meet as often as they could. Marj moved to nurse at Yackandandah Bush Nursing Hospital so they could be closer.

Bill and Marj became engaged in 1954 and married in 1955. They lived with Bill's parents for four years and in this time, had their first two children Dianne and Peter.

They then bought a house in Cudgewa township which was home for 10 years. In that time, they had six more children - Bronwyn, twins Sue and Annette, Ian, John and Andrew.

In 1969 they purchased the family farm and moved from the township onto the property. Apart from the enormous chores Marj had with family, attending to all their needs and making many of their clothes, over time Marj also made wedding dresses and bridesmaids' dresses for the family as she was a skilled seamstress.

There were always children's friends and acquaintances coming and going, never without a warm greeting, a cuppa and food and a genuine interest in their activities.

Marj and Bill were very committed to community work of all types, attending working bees and cooking for fundraisers. In 1987 Marj was a major force in organising the centenary of the local church.

During this time Marj's thoughts were always wondering about her real family. In 1977 the three sisters - Marj, Muriel and Joyce - got together for the first time in 40 years since Marj went into St Luke's orphanage.

After endeavouring to connect with her mother for many decades, in 1980 she was fortunate to locate her. Her mother's first words were "When I left you at St Lukes at three years old, you said I'll be back Mum. And although it has taken you over 40 years you are here."

Those two hours were the only time Marj had with her birth mother between three years of age and her mother's passing.

In 1988 Marj and Bill made the decision to move to the Goulburn Valley to be closer to family, as seven of their children had already relocated there seeking better opportunities for dairying and family which proved to be very fruitful one.

During their 22 years on that farm they increased its size and cow numbers, which Marj was very proud of. She was very good at doing the farm books.

Marj enjoyed babysitting her grandchildren and joining in their schooling and sporting activities. Bill and her also joined the local Probus club and church family and got involved in any activities that promoted dairy and agriculture.

The couple retired into Numurkah in 2009 after selling the farm. Marj enjoyed reading at Pioneer Lodge and doing meals-on-wheels which she did for many years.

The Carkeek family Christmases and annual Good Friday events were favourite times of the year when the large family got together, something Marj and Bill enjoyed greatly.

They also enjoyed

their holidays together and although the trips were few, they were enjoyable and covered all the Australian states.

Marj and Bill's family grew from eight children to 21 grandchildren and 26 great grandchildren, aged from nine months to nearly 21 years. Marj was very proud of all of their achievements and worked hard to encourage and support them in every way.

Barber goes for gold

Australian javelin thrower, Kelsey-Lee Barber, who spent some of her formative years in Corryong, is focused on adding an Olympic gold medal in Paris to go with the bronze she won in Tokyo in 2020.

It was her family's relocation to Australia in her teenage years that put the then Kelsey-Lee Roberts on her athletics pathway.

She arrived from South Africa during the Sydney Olympics in 2000 and lived in Corryong where her uncle and aunt owned a dairy farm.

She competed in athletics at the Corryong College carnival and progressed in the discus events through the zone and regional carnivals.

After moving from Corryong to Canberra in 2007, Barber took athletics

more seriously, switched to the javelin and started training with a coach.

At her last four major championships - Commonwealth Games, Olympics and two World Championships, Kelsey-Lee has a stunning record of winning three gold, a silver and two bronze medals

In 2023, she competed on her 10th Australian

team at her fifth world championships in Budapest but was unable to make history by winning a third consecutive world

In June, the 32-year-old athlete revealed that she had been battling an elbow issue in the lead-up to Paris but she is now set to compete in the qualifying heats which start on Wednesday August 8th.

A general election for Towong Shire Council will be held in October 2024. To be able to vote in the election, you must be enrolled by the close of roll at 4 pm on Wednesday 7 August 2024. Two categories of voters can be enrolled to vote in the Towong Shire Council election: State-enrolled voters and Council-enrolled voters.

State-enrolled voters Am I enrolled to vote?

You are automatically enrolled for this election if:

- you will be 18 years of age or over on Saturday 26 October 2024 and
- you live in Towong Shire and you are on the State electoral roll for your current address.

You need to enrol if:

- you are an Australian citizen aged 18 or over on Saturday 26 October 2024 and
- you live in Towong Shire and you are not on the State electoral roll or
- you have lived at your current residential address within Towong Shire Council for at least a month and have not yet updated your enrolment details, including any changes to your postal address.

How do I enrol?

You can enrol online at vec.vic.gov.au

You can also download an enrolment form from the website.

All enrolment applications must be received by the Victorian Electoral Commission by the close of roll at 4 pm on Wednesday 7 August 2024.

How can I check my State enrolment?

You can check your enrolment details online at vec.vic.gov.au at any time, or call 131 832.

Council-enrolled voters Am I enrolled to vote?

To be a Council-enrolled voter, you must be:

- 18 years of age or over on Saturday 26 October 2024 and
- not a State-enrolled voter within Towong Shire.

New rules mean you are no longer automatically enrolled if you are a non-resident property owner (e.g. a landlord or a business owner that pays rates). If you are a non-resident property owner within Towong Shire, you need to apply to enrol if you wish to vote in the Towong Shire Council election.

Who else can enrol & vote?

You may also apply to enrol if:

- you have purchased a rateable property within Towong Shire since the last election but you are a not a resident of Towong Shire, or
- you are not an Australian citizen and you live in, and pay rates for, a property within Towong Shire, or
- you pay rates on a property you occupy within Towong Shire and have no other voting entitlement within Towong Shire, for example you are a shop tenant and pay rates to the Council for your tenancy, and you have no other voting entitlement within Towona Shire, or
- you are a director or company secretary of a corporation within Towong Shire that pays rates to Towong Shire Council and you have no other voting entitlement within

How do I apply to be a Council-enrolled voter?

If you meet any of the above criteria and wish to enrol, contact Towong Shire Council on 02 6071 5100 for a council enrolment form. Council enrolment forms must be received by the Council by the close of roll at

4 pm on Wednesday 7 August 2024.

How can I check if I am Council-enrolled?

You can check your enrolment details by contacting the Council on 02 6071 5100.

Thinking about standing for election?

To nominate as a candidate for Towong Shire Council, you

- be an Australian citizen and enrolled on the voters' roll for Towong Shire Council and
- be eligible to become a councillor and
- have completed the mandatory candidate training provided by Local Government Victoria before lodging your nomination with the Election Manager.




