## Council supports next stage of recovery

Two and a half years on from the 2019-20 Black Summer fires, Towong Shire Council has announced that recent funding commitments from Bushfire Recovery Victoria (BRV) have given certainty to the continuation of support for the communities of the Upper Murray.

Towong mayor, Cr Andrew Whitehead, noted that the road to recovery is a long one and council has been working closely with the community to create a co-ordinated and well-managed recovery.

"From providing relief services in the immediate aftermath of the fires to the establishment of a dedicated recovery team, the focus has been on supporting our community to deliver clear and practical outcomes for their local area," he said.

## Cudgewa Streetscape



The Cudgewa Streetscape project is a priority of the Council Plan 2021 – 2025. It aims to revitalise the heart of Cudgewa while ensuring the heritage value and history of the township remains in place - central to this is the redevelopment of the Avenue of Honour.

Preparatory works for the Avenue of Honour will commence in mid-July with the removal of 12 hazardous elm trees. These trees were identified for removal following an independent assessment of their viability after the Black Summer fires.

Prior to the selection and planting of replacement trees a planning permit will need to be obtained and heritage values considered. Community members will be invited to share their ideas of species selection and planting configuration as part of the Cudgewa Streetscape consultation scheduled for the coming months.

Directly impacted residents will be contacted in advance of works commencing to ensure access to their property remains. We ask that community members who don't need to access the area avoid it during this time.

"As our communities move to the next stage of recovery, the way council provides support also needs to change," Cr Whitehead said.

Several newly created community development positions, with a dedicated focus on recovery and resilience, will join council's community and planning directorate, which includes community wellbeing and emergency management.

Priorities for the team will include facilitating the delivery of recovery services including social wellbeing, environmental recovery and rebuilding lost homes and sheds.

The team will also be supporting the key priorities identified in the Municipal Recovery Plan and community recovery committee plans, as well

as continuing to provide information and support to affected residents through the Upper Murray Recovery Hub.

Cr Whitehead added that as part of the transition to the next stage of recovery there would also be changes to the operations of the Upper Murray Recovery Hub.

"We have always known that the role of the hub would change as part of the recovery journey," he explained.

"From being a place to drop in and access information and services we have seen the hub become a place for community meetings, workshops and gatherings as well as a working space for federal, state and regional recovery agencies servicing the Upper Murray.

"We are changing

operations to meet these new needs while also maintaining a dedicated recovery presence."

From July, the Upper Murray Recovery Hub's operating hours will be Wednesday and Thursday from 10.00am to 3.30pm when council recovery staff will be onsite to address any community questions or needs.

Recovery staff will also continue to be available outside of these hours on an appointment basis.

Community use of meeting spaces will continue to be available seven days a week for both day and evening bookings.

## Saleyards Redevelopment



### Project Update

We are redeveloping the Corryong Saleyards to ensure it remains a crucial link in the livestock supply chain for the region.

This project will see the establishment of a 24 hour self-service weighbridge and truck wash to service agricultural businesses in the Upper Murray.

We have commenced the installation of the 24-hour Public Access Heavy Vehicle Weighbridge and later this year we will commence the construction of a new truck wash and the refurbishment of the existing truck wash.

Some initial works have been completed, which included the removal of non-native trees to allow for site redevelopment to enable heavy vehicle access. We will be planting replacement trees as part of the final landscaping of the site.

## Power bonus busts bills

Victorians can now claim a \$250 bonus if they look for a better energy deal on Victoria's Energy Compare website – a move that could save households up to \$580 each.

Driving down the cost of living right across the state, the Victorian government's new Power Saving Bonus is now open to all Victorian households.

"The new \$250 payment builds on the government's existing Power Saving Bonus program, previously available to eligible concession card holders – which has helped almost 400,000 Victorians look for a better energy deal and put money in their pockets," said premier, Daniel Andrews.

"Anyone who has previously claimed the Power Saving Bonus will be able to claim the new payment again, providing extra help to those who need it most."

Households can claim the \$250 payment by heading to the Victorian Energy Compare website and comparing their current energy bills to see if they can get a better deal.

The website is the only free and independent online energy price comparison service available to Victorian energy consumers.

Data shows that seven out of every 10 users can save money by switching energy offers, with typical annual savings of \$330 on energy bills in the first year of switching alone. Combined with the Power Saving Bonus, that means Victorian households could save up to \$580 a year.

While the quickest way to submit an application will be through the website, Victorians who do not have access to a computer or the internet can call the Victorian Energy Compare helpline

on 1800 000 832 or receive support from a community outreach partner.

The Power Saving Bonus is available for the next 12 months and there are no limits or caps on the number of households that can receive the once-off payment.

Other programs helping households and businesses to slash energy bills include Victorian Energy Upgrades, which provides upfront incentives for low-cost-to-free energy efficient products such as door and window sealing, efficient hot water and heating systems and in-home displays for real-time energy usage data.

Separately, Solar Victoria offers households and businesses discounted solar panels, batteries and efficient heating and cooling.

# Water price rises kept to a minimum

North East Water's prices will rise by less than inflation in 2022-23 as the water corporation works hard to keep customer bills affordable and at the same time invest in critical water and sewerage infrastructure.

Executive Corporate Services, Anthony Hernan, said average bills for residential customers would increase 4.6 per cent or approximately \$42.11 in 2022-23.

"Without the impact of inflation, the water volumetric price would have risen by just 0.45 per cent this year and the fixed charges for water and wastewater would have decreased by 2.03 per cent," he said.

Mr Hernan added that although North East Water continued to have one of the lowest average residential water bills in Australia, the corporation

recognised that some customers may need help with their bill.

"North East Water has a dedicated support team ready to help customers experiencing difficulty paying their bill, especially those who may be experiencing financial hardship for the first time," he said.

"We have a range of easy to access programs and support services that can ease the pressure and stress for customers having difficulty paying their bill.

"This includes help with concession card discounts, access to government relief and rebate schemes, payment extensions and payment plans and referral to financial counselling.

"Supporting customers who are having difficulty paying their bills is our priority, with help just a



phone call or email away."

North East Water's prices are regulated by the Essential Services Commission and were approved for an eight-year period from 2018 to 2026.

"Tariffs for 2022-23

will ensure the delivery of high quality water and sewerage services to 110,000 people across North East Water's 20,000 square kilometre service region which covers 39 towns," Mr Hernan said.

"They will also enable North East Water to invest in infrastructure including critical water and sewerage upgrades and also provide support to customers experiencing financial difficulty."

## Modernisation brings benefits

Safe driving rewards and licensing are among benefits being delivered to motorists across the state, with the transformation of VicRoads to streamline interactions for millions of Victorians.

The outcome of the 15-month VicRoads modernisation process included consultation with employees, unions, motorists groups and other stakeholders.

Following competitive and robust market engagement a consortium of Aware Super, Australian Retirement Trust and Macquarie Asset Management was selected to deliver the VicRoads modernisation process.

"The changes will bring benefits to individuals and businesses including upgraded customer service systems, better Custom Plates services and user-friendly registration and licensing," said Minister for Roads and Road Safety, Ben Carroll.

"The joint venture is

a 40-year partnership in which the government retains ownership of VicRoads, while generating \$7.9 billion in upfront proceeds for the state, which will be invested in the new Victorian Future Fund to help manage our pandemic debt.

"The government has also delivered on its commitment to protect the jobs of existing VicRoads employees, while creating up to 80 new jobs to oversee the partnership, support the IT modernisation process and bolster its road safety role."

"Continued ownership of VicRoads by the government will ensure control over regulation and policy, data and privacy provisions and pricing of essential fees, with information to remain secure and stored in Australia.

"The government will immediately deliver benefits for Victorian drivers through a package

that will slash licensing and online testing costs and reward safe driver behaviour."

Under the changes, learners and probationary licences as well as online testing services will be made free.

Aspiring drivers and riders will save up to \$51.40 in learner licensing and online testing fees, while probationary drivers will save up to \$133.30 in probationary license and online hazard perception testing fees.

Safe drivers who have not incurred demerit points or committed road safety offences in the three years prior to their licence expiring, will be rewarded with the reintroduction of a 25 per cent discount on their licence renewal.

The VicRoads Registration and Licensing business maintains registers of more than six million vehicle operators and five million driver licence holders, including cars, motorcycles, heavy vehicles and boats.

# Local house market holds firm

The recent auction of a Corryong property has defied the general market trend of holding prices as interest rates rise.

Matthew Cooper Real Estate offered 100 Harris Street at auction on June 25 and spirited bidding resulted in it being sold for well over the reserve price, at a final call of \$230,000.

Principal, Matt Cooper, said there had been moderate interest in the lead-up to the auction but an opening bid of \$180,000 indicated that prospective buyers were keen. Bids increased by increments of \$5000 until the reserve of \$210,000 was reached and two parties vied at \$2000 per bid until the final call.

“It shows that an auction is a powerful selling method and the result reflects the strong interest in the local market.”



# Movers and shakers head to the bush

If you’ve noticed more than a few newcomers in the area lately, you’re not alone.

According to the Regional Australia Institute (RAI), we are experiencing a 1-in-100-year migration event to the regions, the likes of that has not been seen in this country before.

“Regional migration is at a five-year high with the number of people moving to regional areas from our capital cities rising by 16.6 per cent in the March 2022 quarter,” said RAI CEO, Liz Ritchie.

“In conjunction with Commonwealth Bank, last week we released our latest Regional Movers Index which confirmed

“young” people are driving growth with millennials and gen-xers the biggest movers.”

The data showed millennials made up half of all movers nationally in the 12 months to March 2022.

“This age bracket (25-40 years) is a welcome addition in any area, as they often bring with them the business skills to drive the local economy, young children to join the local school and often immerse themselves in community and sporting events,” Ms Ritchie said.

While people are choosing to move more, regional people have also resumed moving to the capital cities. They comprised 4.6 per cent of

all migration during the quarter, a percentage not seen since pre-pandemic times.

“This should help to ease some pressures in regional housing markets and rental markets in particular,” Ms Ritchie said.

“We have also seen a significant milestone reached in this area, with our Job Vacancy Report showing a further record of 86,000 roles advertised across regional Australia in May.

“The annual growth rate in all but one region has hit double digits, ranging from 10 to 50 per cent.

“With the continued surge in popularity to the regions, coupled

with business confidence through job vacancies, we know we have a historic opportunity to help ‘rebalance the nation’ by paving the way for growth.

“Using our decade-long research, we know a national long-term approach is needed to guide regions and grow sustainably.

“It’s a movement that will create real change, that will build on collective action and encourage the societal shift that’s underway in our country to support regionalisation,” Ms Ritchie explained.

“Regional Australia must be the beneficiary of this transition and we are determined to ensure

it receives appropriate investment and support, to be positioned in its rightful place in the nation’s story.

“Regionalisation is about ensuring that a more equitable, balanced, sustainable, and prosperous future can emerge over the next few decades.

“It’s a bold and ambitious plan but it will mean that regional businesses and communities can more than just survive, they can thrive.”

The RAI will launch its National Regionalisation Framework at its National Summit – Rebalancing the Nation, in Canberra on 13-14 September, 2022.

# Climate mitigation will be a game changer

The North East Catchment Management Authority (NECMA) is undertaking a number of case studies, demonstrating how leading farmers from the region are managing the risks associated with climate change.

The Embedding Climate Adaptation in Agriculture (ECAA) project is working with local farmers to determine how the use of climate projections supports their farm management.

HVP Plantations released its Climate Commitment Statement in November 2021 and the company says the good story it tells is about its climate mitigation credentials and how it expects its Victorian operations to have met and continue to maintain net zero - that is, the annual increase in carbon captured by its plantation estate more than offsets emissions associated with growing and selling logs.

The climate statement will be followed by a detailed Climate Disclosure Report later in 2022.

HVP Plantations General Manager Forest Resources, Dr Tony O'Hara, is drafting the report.

There is a strong commitment from HVP Plantations' staff to net zero, that is reinforced by the strong stance on

climate change issues held by its main shareholders.

"We have worked through the full profile of issues, not just where we stand in terms of net zero but also climate adaptation, risk assessment and risk management," Dr O'Hara said.

"The climate disclosure report will be for the financial year ending June 2022 and is targeted for release in the last quarter of the year."

HVP Plantations estate is situated across Victoria, extending from Gippsland in the east to the border with South Australia in the west and with large plantations in north east Victoria. The total area of land managed by HVP equates to more than 240,000 ha. About 170,000 ha of this land is pine and eucalypt plantation.

Dr O'Hara said few companies were in the position of HVP, where emissions reduction programs could be supported within the company by capture of carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, clearly proving and demonstrating how it met net zero emissions.

"We are able to play a significant role in climate change mitigation," he said.

"We have supportive contractors who are keen to work with us to find reductions in

emissions arising from our operations.

"As a primary producer, we are clearly exposed to climate change. Our reason for being is growing trees in a natural environment and the very real changes in climate are a high risk issue for us.

"We need an active program around adaptation," he said.

Climate change mitigation also includes recognition of two major opportunities for HVP - the net carbon benefit of wood compared with other materials such as steel and concrete and potential changes to management of the estate that would incorporate the generation of renewable energy such as wind power.

"The value of what we produce will increase across the range," Dr O'Hara said.

"A game changer will be being able to sell everything we grow.

"There will be new products that use every part of the tree that we wish to sell, such as converting waste wood to products like bioplastics.

"We are also a large land manager and we are exploring opportunities for having wind farms on the windier parts of the estate. They can be set up to work well within plantations.

"Perhaps our slogan could be ... 'we're growing the wood for

future homes and once they're built we'll turn the lights on'."

Dr O'Hara said pulling the right data together had been imperative to HVP developing its climate disclosure report and being able to prove its net zero status.

"We've always had good data on how fast our trees grow but we didn't have good data on carbon and emissions," he said.

"The key issue about net zero is the change in sequestration, the total amount of carbon sequestered in the estate from one year to the next. That's what you're measuring.

"For every cubic metre of logs we sell, something between 25 and 30 per cent of the carbon in that log stays out of the atmosphere in wood products. That took a lot of work to understand and the calculations are being refined both nationally and internationally."

Dr O'Hara said HVP's operations in the north east were unique because every single tree on the estate could be sold locally to processing mills locally and southern NSW.


"We are a major contributor to timber processors in Benalla, Wangaratta, Tumberumba and Tumut, producing pulp and paper, plywood, MDF, panelling and truss timbers from lower grade as well as higher grade logs," he said.

"Products from these mills are used in timber frames for houses, wooden flooring, furniture panels, paper and packaging.

"No other part of the estate is like that, in a region where forestry and processing are such significant employers. It is a unique market and a very strong forestry market.

"Notwithstanding the losses from fires in 2019-20, it is still a very strong forestry market."

The 2019-20 bushfires impacted 6000ha of HVP's 45,000ha in north east

Victoria. In comparison, Forestry Corporation, which manages more than two million hectares of state forests in NSW had 40,000ha out of about 80,000ha lost or burnt by the fires.

"The fact so much of the plantation estate is close to large areas of native forest, interspersed with agriculture in various forms, makes it challenging to manage the fire risk," Dr O'Hara said.

"We are taking a much more landscape approach to fire prevention and suppression and all owners of land need to work together to manage that issue. There has been a ramp-up in exploring with other landholders on how we can work together. With climate change that challenge is going to become bigger and not smaller."

As part of adapting to climate change, HVP regularly re-examines its plantation management, particularly the establishment of new plantations with reference to the direction of possible fires and the inclusion of more or potentially wider fire breaks.

"When we replant areas, after either routine harvesting or bushfires, we explore issues around plantation design," Dr

O'Hara said.

"We may make the firebreaks around the plantation edge a bit wider, providing a bigger gap between a neighboring property and where our plantation starts. That's because the vast majority of fires will start outside a plantation rather than in it."

Dr O'Hara said this includes fires started by lightning, where it is "quite unusual" for lightning to start fire in a stand of plantation pine trees. Instead, he said it is more common in native stands which have a bigger pool of flammable material on the ground.

Dr O'Hara added that HVP Plantations' research and development was more focused on improving growth rates and tree resilience through genetics and silviculture instead of directly on the impact of climate change.

"Pinus radiata is an amazing species that will cope with a wide range of conditions and do well," he said.

"One focus of research is mycorrhizal fungi treatments used to treat seedlings in the nursery, as a way to improve resilience."

Dr O'Hara said another major area of emissions work for HVP is getting

better information on actual fuel usage for operations undertaken by contractors, enabling a better baseline from which to chart emission reductions.

"In the past we have used averages for fuel usage, which is by far and away the biggest emission component," he said.

"With regard to HVP's direct emissions, we need to carefully balance how we reduce emissions with other considerations. For example, reducing our fertiliser use would negatively impact on production and growth, so it's about balancing emissions reductions with other opportunities or looking at alternatives."

"One benefit of value being assigned to generating carbon credits and thus have an early cashflow in the life of a plantation is that it makes it more attractive to establish greenfield plantations - (new rather than replanted)," he said.

Dr O'Hara said the broader environmental credentials of wood, as well as reducing emissions, also supports the expansion of greenfield plantations, by making them more attractive to investors.

"This is not about converting entire landscapes to plantations - the economics simply do not support that - but there are significant economic and environmental benefits to increasing our wood supply that will underpin plantation expansion," he said.

"That will make it more attractive for farmers to put small stands on farms. They will see the financial and environmental value of it, with revenues providing welcome income diversification."

The ECAA project is supported by North East Catchment Management Authority, through funding from the Australian Government's National Landcare Program.

# Community encouraged to build on organics plan

Households are being encouraged to scrap together as Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) sets its eyes on an ambitious goal to divert all food scraps from landfill.

Eleven months on from the introduction of the kerbside Food Organics Garden Organics (FOGO) collection service, 1,200 tonnes of food and garden organics has been diverted from landfill.

To build on these positive results, the council has partnered with the Canberra Region Joint Organisation (CRJO) to roll out the Scrap Together community education campaign to help residents get the most out of their FOGO service.

Consisting of promotion across radio, print, web and socials, the success of the campaign will be measured by the results of bin audits

conducted before and after the program.

Key messages will include tips on reducing food scraps, how to combat bins smells and reminding people what can be recycled through the green FOGO bin.

Along with four other NSW councils in the CBJO, SVC has successfully received a share in an NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) grant of \$50,000 to participate in the community education program.

The program was first piloted in Forbes, Clarence Valley and Kempsey

Councils and resulted in an average of 10 per cent increase in food waste recovered for recycling.

The NSW government has allocated an additional \$69 million over the next five years to further expand FOGO services and support councils to meet new requirements under the government's Waste and Sustainable Materials Strategy 2041 to provide services to all NSW households by 2030.

# Don't go early on lodgement

The Australian Taxation Office (ATO) is advising taxpayers that they risk any refund being delayed or having their return adjusted if they lodge it before their income statement is marked as 'Tax ready'.

Assistant Commissioner, Tim Loh, explained the ATO sees more mistakes in early July as people rush to get their tax returns done.

"You can lodge now but you are punting with your tax return by risking delays to any refund you are owed," he said.

"If you forget to

include everything, you may end up answering questions from the tax office.

"We pre-fill some of the information in your tax return such as your wages, health insurance and interest from banks to help you to get it right the first time.

"Thanks to pre-fill, waiting a few extra weeks can make lodging your tax return online quicker and easier."

Taxpayers are more likely to have their return adjusted or experience a delay in the payment of any refund if they lodge

their return before all their income has been entered. Last July, more than 140,000 taxpayers had their 2020-21 tax return amended before the ATO issued their tax assessments.

Each year, from late July onwards, most information from employers, banks, government agencies and health funds will be automatically loaded into tax returns.

To check if pre-filled information is available and statements are 'tax ready' visit the ATO app or log into myGov.




