Ambulance wait riles community Following the revel-



Microgrid gives excellent return

The purpose of this article is to correct some misinformation that was contained in a letter to the editor in the June 9th edition of the *Corryong Courier*.

The conclusion of the letter, contained in the heading, is that the "microgrid" described by the writer was a "poor return on investment."

Unfortunately, the "grapevine" from which the writer has obtained his/her information is working exactly as grapevines usually do, which is to say that different parts of story get conflated, some get exaggerated and important details get lost, resulting in an understanding that is far from the truth.

So, let's take this opportunity to clarify for everyone in the community, what is really happening.

There are few different moving parts, so it is understandable that they might be conflated.

"Upgrading 50 homes to a micro-grid."

There will be no upgrading 50 homes to a micro-grid. This statement conflates two elements of two different, multi-element programs going on.

Mondo Energy
Solutions and the
Department of Envioronment, Land, Water and
Planning (DELWP) are
running a program to
install solar and battery
systems on up to 50 homes

in Corryong as part of a broader project to improve the disaster resilience of three fire affected communities - Corryong, Omeo and Mallacoota.

At present, there has been significant interest from households that have signed up for this program. The purpose of this program is to prepare Corryong better for the future establishment of a microgrid to provide energy resilience in the case of an emergency.

"Connected to a microgrid with a battery at the Corryong Recreation Reserve."

There will be a battery at the Corryong Recreation Reserve. However, it has no connection to the homes that might receive solar and battery systems from the Mondo and DELWP program mentioned above.

The battery at the reserve is part of the Upper Murray Energy Resilience and Reliability Project (UMERRP) being carried out through a bushfire recovery grant to Upper Murray Inc. (UMI) from Bushfire Recovery Victoria (BRV) and Regional Development Victoria (RDV).

It is one of three being installed under this grant. There are others at Corryong Health and Walwa Bush Nursing Centre.

These batteries are one

of three different elements of this project, that also includes distributed energy resources at locations deemed critical in the event of an emergency.

"Reportedly at a cost of \$4M or \$80,000 per home."

It is not clear where the \$4M figure comes from. The Mondo/DELWP program has never publicly announced the amount of funding specifically for Corryong. They have only announced the total amount being spent across the aforementioned three fire affected communities, some of which will go towards the installation of solar and batteries on the homes that have signed up.

UMERRP The mentioned above has grants totalling \$2.9 million dollars. None of the grant money for the UMERRP project is being spent on any of the 50 homes mentioned in the letter. All of it will be spent, as the name of the project suggests, on improving the resilience and reliability of the energy available to facilities and services that are essential during an emergency.

The Events Centre at the Corryong Recreation Reserve is a 'place of last resort' and the battery going there will contribute to its energy security during a future emergency. The same applies to Corryong Health, Walwa Bush Nursing Centre

and all of the 25 other community facilities and essential services where more reliable energy systems are being installed.

"We are doing this in the name of #NetZero Carbon."

There are three goals to these projects that supersede any discussion of carbon emissions reduction, let alone "NetZero carbon."

First is the specific goal of hardening the electricity and communications infrastructure across the Upper Murray so that

there is some functionality when the next emergency situation comes.

We all saw the devastating consequences of the 2020 bushfires. We want to be better prepared next time.

Further, a major goal of these projects is to improve the reliability of electricity in normal times

In our investigation in preparation for applying for grants we discovered that, in the five years leading up to the end of 2018, Corryong township experienced an average of 36 unplanned outages per year, or about three per month, with each one causing untold disruption to normal life for both residents and businesses.

The infrastructure being installed as part of these projects will go a long way towards eliminating these outages.

Finally and perhaps most importantly to some of the facilities receiving these distributed energy resources, there will be substantial savings in energy costs.

Based on current estimates of consumption

at these facilities and estimates of cost savings based on other similar projects, we should expect energy savings of more than \$400,000 annually.

These savings results in \$400,000 per year that is available for further investment in the Upper Murray, rather than any profits being transferred to the accounts of offshore investors.

At the rate of \$400,000 per year, estimated at 2019 electricity rates (!), expenditure of \$2.9 million produces an excellent return on investment!

Council announces special rate variation

From 1 July 2022 Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) has announced it will implement a Special Rate Variation.

At its June 2022 meeting, council resolved to increase rating income for 2022-23 by 15.7 per

In May 2022 IPART approved a new and

permanent Special Rate Variation (SRV) of 35.95 per cent (inclusive of the rate peg) introduced over two years in 2022-23 and 2023-24. The increased rating level at the completion of 2023-24 will then remain permanently and be the amount subject to any future increases.

The approved purpose of the SRV is to:-

• Continue delivering existing service levels, as outlined in the 2022-23 Delivery Program and Operational Plan

• Manage a range of financial impacts (e.g. maintenance of grantfunded new assets and natural disasters) • Ensure long-term financial sustainability

Detailed information relating to the operational and long-term budgets, projects, services and actions council will be completing during 2022-23 is contained within its Integrated Planning and Reporting suite of documents which was

also adopted at the June council meeting.

More funding goes to bushfire recovery

across remote, rural and regional Australia will share in \$776,583 in grants thanks to FRRR's Strengthening Rural Communities (SRC) program.

These projects are initiatives grassroots by organisations led by local people that will strengthen their communities and have direct benefits for those living in them.

In this round of funding, 26 of the projects receiving funding support ongoing recovery from the 2019/20 Black Summer bushfires.

These initiatives, which will share \$444,552, include a grant of \$24,000 to the Country Fire Authority (CFA) Corryong Brigade.

The funding will be used to modernise the kitchen to improve the capacity of the brigade to support bushfire recovery and preparedness.

There are also 41 being funded projects through the Small & Vital stream of the SRC program, which will share in a total of \$332,031.

Jill Karena, Place Portfolio Lead at FRRR, said that a noticeable trend emerged in this latest



round of applications.

"Interestingly, saw a strong interest for community gardens in this round," she said.

"With the cost of living rising on top of the food shortages that are happening as a result of the pandemic and natural disasters like drought and floods, there are growing concerns in rural areas about food security and the lack of access to nutritious, affordable food.

"This is why flexible

programs like SRC are crucial. The funding from this program can be used where community leaders see the greatest need.

"Our climate and our are rapidly economy evolving and these grants can be used to support a broad range of community-led, grassroots initiatives that are helping to address very current issues in real time," Ms Karena said.

The SRC program is collaboratively supported by many generous donors, which are acknowledged on FRRR's website.

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
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Supplier adds another string to the bow

Energy will be sourced from the Bango wind farm.

Snowy Hydro is again expanding its renewable energy portfolio, signing a contract to purchase power and renewables certificates from a new CWP Renewables wind farm development in New South Wales.

The deal with the Uungula wind farm near Wellington is the 12th for Snowy Hydro, a leader in clean energy and Australia's renewable energy transition.

Managing Director and CEO, Paul Broad, said the agreement to purchase 200 megawatts of Uungula's output for a 15-year term supported Snowy Hydro's commitment to providing affordable, reliable and clean energy to its commercial and industrial customers.

"Renewables are the future and by combining our contracted wind and solar projects with our ondemand hydro assets we can provide 'firm', secure, low-emissions energy to the market, while keeping the lights on," Mr Broad said.

"This new deal with CWP Renewables is targeted to start in 2026 after construction of Uungula is completed

renewables.

"At 414 megawatts, Uungula will be our largest wind farm to date and provide enough clean electricity to power more than 200,000 homes," Mr Willoughby said.

"It's great to have Snowy Hydro on-board as a foundation offtaker for the project, which in turn helps us continue to develop our pipeline of renewable projects."

CWP Renewables currently operates and owns 650MW of

renewable energy assets in the National Electricity Market and has another 5GW of wind, storage and farming projects in its near-medium term development portfolio.

Snowy Hydro already partners with CWP Renewables through an offtake agreement for power from its Bango wind farm, north of Yass.

"We are pleased to be working again with CWP Renewables and growing our clean energy business," Mr Broad said.

"This partnership is another example of Snowy Hydro securing greater investment in renewables across Australia, which is a win-win for everyone."

Uungula Wind Farm has received development approval and construction is planned to start this year, supporting more than 260 jobs

Know where your firewood comes from

The Conservation Regulator and Parks Victoria are urging people purchasing firewood this winter to think before they buy by asking some key questions, to help stop illegal firewood operators.

Each year Victorians are caught out unintentionally buying illegally sourced firewood which can lead to the loss of important wildlife habitat such as hollow logs and dead trees.

Firewood is often sold on social media websites, at roadside stalls and by word of mouth and it can be difficult for customers to know where firewood for sale comes from, so before buying check the following information:-

• Where does your wood come from? Your firewood seller should be able to provide the details of where the wood they are supplying is sourced from. This includes a wholesale supplier, commercial wood lot or private land with the permission of the landowner.

- Can I get a receipt?
 Your firewood seller should provide a tax receipt with a business name and ABN listed.
- Why is the wood so cheap? If you're buying firewood through social

media websites and the firewood seems cheap, ask your supplier why.

The Conservation Regulator targets those suspected of unlawfully collecting and selling firewood from public land. The community can play a key role by reporting any suspicious behaviour to DELWP on 136 186.

Parks Victoria Senior Manager Enforcement and Regulatory Services, Mark Breguet, said "The illegal removal and sale of firewood from parks and reserves causes impacts that last for generations.

"It is critical for the protection of these areas and the species that rely upon timber for habitat, that purchasers of firewood ensure it is legally sourced."

Offenders found guilty of cutting or taking away more than two cubic metres of fallen or felled trees from Crown land face a maximum penalty of \$9,087 and/or one year imprisonment. Individuals may also face an additional fine of up to \$9,087 for destruction of wildlife habitat, while vehicles and equipment such as chainsaws and trailers may also be seized and forfeited upon conviction.

Management, Coastcare groups and Aboriginal groups to support the important work they do in protecting and restoring our land and environment.

This funding will be delivered through Catchment Victoria's Management Authorities (CMAs) including North East demonstrating the important environmental outcomes that be achieved through collaboration between CMAs, environmental groups, local communities, and the government.

North East CMA Chief Executive Officer, Katie Warner, said the Victorian Landcare Grants aimed to fund projects that addressed local, regional and state land and environment priorities.

Ms Warner said they also aimed to sustain Landcare and other environmental volunteer groups and networks by

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Safety training included for cultural burning

Twelve Traditional Owners from the Duduroa Dhargal and Bangerang Aboriginal Corporations completed an extensive fire training course this month, aimed at giving them enhanced skills in wildfire suppression and controlled fuel reduction burns.

The training helps
Traditional Owners
meet insurance and
administrative requirements for undertaking
cultural burning.

"Cultural burning has been carried out by our people for a long, long time," Duduroa Dhargal senior elder, Uncle Phil Murray, said.

"We use burning for lots of different reasons – like increasing food resources, protecting our sacred cultural sites, cleaning up and removing weeds and reducing forest fuel loads to maintain the safety of our people during the months when the risk of bushfire is increased".

Uncle Phil said many private landholders are supportive of cultural burns to increase the health of their land and reduce fire risk and interest in using cultural burns on public land is also increasing.

"The amount of red tape and administration we need to do now – we've previously been unable to get the insurance required to carry out these burns on public and private land," he explained.

"This training we're doing will give us the same formal skills as a trained volunteer firefighter and this helps us to meet the insurance requirements."

Cultural burning has been gaining traction as a tool to help government, local authorities and private landholders deal with the threat of bushfire under a rapidly changing climate.

Bangerang senior elder, Uncle Darren Atkinson, said it involved burning off the bush during spring and autumn when the fuels are slightly damper and the weather is cooler.

"The small scale of the burns keeps the fires from getting really big and getting out of control, so they're really low-risk," Uncle Darren said.

"We really see cultural burning as an ideal way of helping the government to protect public land where our cultural sites are positioned close to human settlements and support habitat for threatened species.

The training course was supported by the North East Catchment Management Authority and Trust for Nature through funding from the Australian government.



Rough as guts roads send costs skyrocketing

Transport operators have exposed the toll of regional Victoria's crumbling road network, with recent reports revealing rough roads are

making it harder to hire truck drivers and sending the cost of vehicle repairs skyrocketing.

"Transport operators who have been involved in the industry for decades say road quality is dragging down retention of drivers who don't want to drive a road network that's as rough as guts," said Shadow Minister for Roads, Steph Ryan

"Regional Victorian motorists are also demanding answers after media reports last week exposed the Victorian government's secret, systematic raid of a public trust fund intended to be invested back into road safety.

"When the Better Roads Victoria trust account was established a third was required to be put back into regional Victoria but murky reporting by the government left serious questions about where millions of dollars have ended up.

"Country roads are

a mess of dangerous potholes and hazards, risking the lives of country Victorian drivers every single day," Ms Ryan said.
