Almost 60 prominent judges, lawyers experts and leaders have signed an open letter to the Prime Minister, published in newspapers this week, calling on the government to establish a strong, effective and independent integrity commission.

The signatories include the Hon Mary Gaudron OC, former Judge of the High Court of Australia, the Hon Tony Fitzgerald AC QC, who led the Fitzgerald Inquiry that uncovered corruption in

public hearings when it is in the public interest to do so - powers which are contained in Dr Haines' Australian Federal Integrity Commission proposal but missing from the government's draft proposal.

Dr Haines said the government urgently needed to legislate an Australian National Integrity Commission as Australians have had enough of the lack of accountability in our politics.

"For the last two years I have been fighting to clean up our politics and create the culture of

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integrity that Australians deserve from their political representatives," she said.

"After decades as a nurse and midwife, one of the reasons I entered politics was to bring the standards I saw in my professional life, upheld by everyday people, into politics.

"I've introduced a bill into Parliament that will create a strong and independent Federal Integrity Commission," Dr Haines said.

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
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
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Integrity call can't be ignored

Cont. from page 1. "This commission will have the power to root out corruption, expose lies and hold our politicians to account," Dr Haines said.

"This bill has wide support but Scott Morrison has been dragging his feet.

"All we have seen is a dud exposure draft which has been roundly rubbished by almost everyone. At the same time, I have a strong and robust bill that has the support of many signatories to this letter. and I know it has support of MPs from every party in Parliament!

"The 59 civic leaders have told the government that time's up. Integrity can't wait. The calls can't be ignored any longer. "In 2018 the Prime Minister promised that

he would implement an integrity commission. The 8th of September 2021 will mark 1,000 days since he first made that promise but we are still waiting on him to act," Dr Haines said.

"Establishing an integrity commission is the one thing all sides of politics agreed to do in this 46th Parliament. With only two months until an election could be called, this is fast shaping up to be a broken election promise.

"I don't want to go to the next election without an integrity commission and neither does the Australian public."

Dr Haines said that the ABC's Australia Talks survey showed that 9 in 10 Australians believe the government should establish a federal corruption watchdog.

56 per ٠ cent believe Australian politicians are often corrupt

73 per cent think Australia is doing poorly in holding politicians to account

59 per cent disagree that politicians in Australia can generally be trusted to act in the interests of the people they represent

• 72 per cent disagree that politicians in Australia are usually held accountable for their actions.



Camping laws offer no protection

The government has been accused of leaving farmers out in the cold under new laws which allow camping on state-licensed river and water frontages.

"The government has failed to provide a single cent of new funding under the 2021/22 State Budget to monitor and enforce these new laws," claimed Shadow Minister for Environment and Climate Change, Bridget Vallence, in Parliament on Tuesday. "At Public Accounts

and Estimates Committee hearings, Minister for Lily Environment, D'Ambrosio also confirmed no funding or support for farmers

Member for Benambra, Bill Tilley, was in disbelief at the lack of planning and the confirmation that \$601 million has been cut from the DELWP budget.

THE MITTA VALLEY MOUNTAIN BIKE PARK

The Mitta Valley Mountain Bike Park received \$1.5 million as part of the Local Community Project Grants Round 2 which is funding local projects vital for community recovery in bushfire-affected regions.

Partnership supports pasture regeneration

In response to the need to help large areas across the Upper Murray impacted by last year's fires, Bushfire Recovery Victoria (BRV) has provided funding to AgBiz Assist via their charity AgBiz Care, to assist with the re-establishment of pastures for fire affected farmers and landholders.

The Re-Seeding Upper Murray Project, which covers all areas of Towong Shire burnt out in the 2020 bushfires, is being delivered by AgBiz Assist using the resources of Agriculture Victoria, Towong Shire Council, the Upper Murray Landcare Network and BRV.

Agbiz Assist has reached out to farmers and landholders through a survey and asked what pasture recovery support they need.

Applications are now open and being assessed with funds ranging from \$1,000 to \$3,000 per affected property, to be be allocated by way of vouchers that can be redeemed from any of the three Corryong rural supply traders. Alternatively, farmers can apply for a rebate on seed already purchased during autumn.

Under this collaborative partnership, a range of free information and training sessions, webinars and field days will continue to be rolled out by Agriculture Victoria and Upper Murray Landcare personnel to anyone who has an interest

in productive pastures. The practical application of this

application of this technical advice will not only offer the best possible outcomes tor successful management of newly established winter and spring sown pastues but will also provide pasture management benefits for the next seven to ten years. Topics ranging from

advice on selecting and preparating the

best paddocks and seed blends through to carbon markets and regenerative agriculture methods will play dual roles in supporting the recovery of farming communities while offsetting the looming impact of climate Machinery, change. fertiliser, labour and diesel costs are added to the thousands of dollars farmers invest in seed each season. Regional groups bounce back

Border Trust has announced its first round of funding to support the regeneration of local communities following the devastating bushfires of 2019-20. Four community organisations will share in funding of \$32,000 through the Border Trust Bushfire Relief Fund to support local communities affected by the fires in the local government areas of Towong, Alpine, Greater Hume and Snowy Valleys.

Locally, the following groups have been funded:-Cudgewa Cemetery Trust \$9,410 - seating and

Say hello to the storytellers

The mountains are alive with stories and this winter is the time to tell them, according to the Snowy Valleys Council (SVC).

Over the next three months, the awardwinning playwright Hannie Rayson (pictured) and ABC theatre-buff Michael Cathcart are moving to the region to help locals to unlock the great stories of their lives. Executive SVC Director Community and Corporate, Paul Holton, said the Hello Snowy Valleys! project is a perfect additional element to the region's Winter Bites Festival program.

"We are incredibly excited to be able to make this opportunity available to the residents of the Snowy Valleys," he said.

"Hannie and Michael will be on the hunt for great stories – be they funny, poignant, sad or uplifting. The pair will be helping each storyteller to craft their tale into a short, powerful performance.

"The duo will also be presenting Life Writing workshops over six Sunday afternoons, starting on June 20 where they'll help to identify resident's personal stories, develop powerful techniques for writing them down, and help in structuring the stories."

The workshops will

be spread across Batlow, Tumbarumba, Adelong and Tumut.

Hannie said "Most people know that they have a story to tell but they don't know how to start. The techniques which we've developed are simple, effective and deeply fulfilling."

Hello, Snowy Valleys! will culminate in the creation of a piece of live theatre about the Snowy Valleys – a tapestry of stories told by the people who live here. There will be three performances at the Batlow Literary Institute over the weekend of August 21.

The total cost of the workshop series is \$120 per participant which includes admission to all six workshops and refreshments.

Hannie began her professional life in community theatre at Theatre Works in 1980. Since then, her plays have been produced throughout Australia and internationally. She works in theatre, film and television and writes a column for The Age newspaper.

Her great passion is to hear the stories of Australia told by Australians.

"Hearing Aussies tell stories in our rich and colourful vernacular is one of life's great pleasures," she said.



"It's how I met Michael and why we fell in love. We both love this stuff." Michael Cathcart is an

award-winning historian, theatre director and ABC broadcaster. He is taking 10 weeks leave for the project. Their mission is to

create a piece of theatre about the Snowy Valleys a tapestry of stories told by the people who live here. This will be a celebration of local life, fuelled by struggle, resilience, wit

and tenderness. It is a story

told by farmers, butchers,

teachers, pickers, timber cutters – local people who are bearing witness to events great and small that have given this place its unique history.

Michael and Hannie are moving to the Snowy Valleys region for the duration of this project.

Council plans to build back better

Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) has adopted its Integrated Planning and Reporting (IP&R) suite of documents for 2021/22 including an overall budget of \$73 million.

This year's Operational Plan contains 112 Actions and a \$35.4 million Capital Works program which includes close to \$20 million in grant funding.

SVC mayor, Cr James Hayes, said following a challenging 2020, council remains focused on "building back better" and supporting communities to thrive.

"While it is a high priority for council to seek increased funding to cover costs, improve efficiencies and ensure we deliver responsible budgets, council believes that ensuring we have a high level of amenity in our local area reflects community desire and assists in attracting people to the region," Cr Hayes said.

"The 2021/22 budget reflects this belief. "We're investing a total of \$10.5 million in economic development projects including the civil works for Tumbarumba Snowy View Estate phase 3, building of itinerant worker accommodation at the Batlow Caravan Park and improvements and safety upgrades in the Tumut Aerodrome.

"We've also approved a \$13.6 million investment in support of our roads network ensuring it is able to support local visitor and industry needs and more than \$2 million for council buildings including the re-build of the Ournie Community Hall."

SVC CEO, Matthew Hyde, said council has a continued focus on long term sustainability in planning for the coming 12 months.

"We are improving our strategic planning and advocacy with state and federal governments for support with high priority projects to ensure the long-term economic future of the region," he said.

Key actions to be completed in 2021/22 include \$7.3 million in renewals and upgrades

wastewater facilities, delivery of the new FOGO service and processing plant, delivery of community events and programs including the Long Lunch in Khancoban and promotion of the Visit Snowy Valleys brand to attract more people to the region. Each year Council also reviews its Fees and Charges Schedule for the services it provides reflecting a user pays principle," Mr Hyde said. Some changes include increases in annual water access charges for potable and raw water and a harmonising of septage waste charges which will now see consistent minimum fees for all sullage dumping.

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Passion for bikes led to a dream career

When she was a young girl growing up on a Thougla farm, Rikki Dryden's main interest was horse riding but after moving to Melbourne for work as an 18-year-old she became obsessed with motorbikes.

Rikki had puttered around the family property on an old 'Postie' bike as a youngster but a rare sight for a country girl captivated her.

"When I first got to Melbourne I saw a chick riding a Yamaha 1000cc and thought 'how good is that?'," Rikki recalled.

"I reckon that'll suit me just fine." The inspirational

moment has led to a wealth of experience riding all types of machines from road bikes ranging from 600cc up to 1200cc plus motocross, enduro and adventure bikes.

Rikki's passion led to her working in the motorcycle industry which she says is not really a job. "To be able to work in an industry you love is seriously amazing!"

Rikki's impressive career background with Motorcycling Australia working her way up the

ranks from administrative staff to business development - has resulted in her selection for Sport Australia's 2021 Women Leaders in Sport (WLIS) Program.

She is among 160 participants undertaking a six-week course which aims to support and empower women in the sport workforce.

"I've been lucky to work in the motorcycle industry since 2005 when I started with the Phillip Island Grand Prix Circuit in events admin," she said. "Moving onto the Honda Riders Club in

Events Co-ordination, I got to travel the country riding some of our best race tracks.

"In this role I also worked to grow women's participation by holding female track day groups which were a great hit.

"After Honda I worked with the Australian Superbike Championship in Event Operations and was Race Secretary. After moving to Brisbane I worked with Champions Ride Days before starting my own business running motorcycle tours in Europe for five years.



Rikki Dryden is leading the way for female riders.

"When not working at major events I volunteer as Deputy Race Secretary for the MotoGP and World Superbikes.

"In the past I raced a little MX and Enduro and was a regular track day rider and now I'm an adventure rider," Rikki said.

"I now work with Motorcycling Australia in Rules & Technical which I've been loving, learning more about all disciplines."

Rikki is also an antibullying campaigner and raised awareness of the issue at the end of 2019

when she initiated an allfemale team ride across the Simpson Desert.

impacts across the valleys of north east Victoria.

At a series of workshops across the region earlier this year, dairy farmers embraced the opportunity to identify what should be the focus for their industry.

North East dairy farmer and Alpine Valleys Dairy Inc chair, Patrick Glass, said there had been a high level of participation at the workshop and the key priorities for the industry had come from the farmers themselves, not from consultants.

"The voice of farmers has not been diluted in any way in this final report," he said.

"It's now up to the farmers themselves to drive this and demand some answers or ensure more questions are asked.

"We don't want this to be a document to sit on the shelf because we will be the ones impacted by these changes."

Project convenor on behalf of Alpine Valleys Dairy Inc, Patten Bridge, said through their participation in project workshops, lear message they wanted to be on the front foot around the challenges and opportunities presented by the changing climate, as well as be part of developing relevant solutions.

The project's final report recommends Alpine Valleys Dairy Inc., set up by dairy farmers to:-

• maximise opportunities for the region's dairy industry, should ensure responsibility for climate change adaptation actions is shared among relevant shareholders;

• regularly communicate progress regarding climate change adaptation activity and outcomes to dairy communities; and

• ensure younger farmers have a strong ownership of the overall climate adaptation strategy and outcomes.

The report recommends 10 farmer-driven industry projects related to the five challenges and opportunities identified

Mr Bridge said the industry projects covered the main commercial imperative for dairy farmers seeking to create profitable and sustainable businesses.

"The breadth of projects underlines there is no one strategy or answer which will cover the adaptation requirements for the region," he said.

"It will be the responsibility of dairy farmers, particularly those coming into the industry, to drive the project's recommendations.

"It will be critical that this project remains a conduit for the farmer's voice."

Mr Bridge said the



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nominated projects should be a catalyst for partnerships between local dairy farmers and key stakeholders about how these farmer priorities might be addressed. They include North East Catchment Management Authority (CMA), Albury Wodonga Health, local government, Murrav Dairy, AgBiz Assist, Goulburn-Murray Water, local tertiary institutions, other agricultural industries. Agriculture Victoria and commercial service providers.



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
