

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Haines walks the tricky path

Australian leaders with both recipients recognised for building connection, respect and trust at a local, national and in the case of Minister Wong, global level, to deliver positive outcomes.

Dr Haines has been awarded the 2022 Emerging McKinnon Political Leader of the Year award for her commitment to integrity in politics and her dedication to serving her electorate and connecting her constituency to her national policy work, as demonstrated through the Beechworth Principles and subsequent consensus building over time.

The panel recognised Dr Haines' considerable impact as a "communitydriven" and collaborative leader on the national stage.

Member Selection Panel, Chancellor of Macquarie University and former senior public servant, Dr Martin Parkinson AC PSM, said "Helen wasn't the only one to have made integrity an issue but what was truly outstanding was the way in which she gradually built support across her community and across the broader parliamentary community.

"Politics is the art of the possible and that's something that you can be dismissive of but what she did was to find a way to walk a path through all the competing groups and ended up with a policy position that everybody could come in behind.

"Helen did something unusual in that she engaged her local community on the integrity principles. It showed proper grassroots democracy.

"She took up an issue that for many people was probably distant - and gave them a mechanism whereby they contribute." could

Minister Wong has been awarded the 2022 McKinnon Political Leader of the Year for her swift and demonstrable progress in re-setting Australia's foreign policy agenda and in working respectfully to enhance important bilateral relationships in a challenging geopolitical environment.

The selection panel recognised her strong transition from the Shadow Ministry to her role as Minister for Foreign Affairs over the course of 2022, as her "listen first, talk second" approach helped to restore Australia's diplomatic relationships and standing as a nation in the region.

The McKinnon Prize in Political Leadership is a non-partisan and independent award that recognises outstanding Australian political leadership each year. It is a collaboration between the Susan McKinnon and the Foundation University of Melbourne.

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
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School elections concluded

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Pest control nues CO rogra wild dog body parts were

The Victorian government's fox and wild dog bounty has resumed for 2023.

Agriculture Victoria Biosecurity Officers will again operate monthly collection centres across the state from March until October.

Agriculture Victoria Manager, Biosecurity Wishart, said Jason participants could submit entire fox scalps for a \$10 reward and/or entire wild dog body parts for a \$120 reward at specified collection centres during collection scheduled times

"I urge participants to refresh their knowledge of the bounty terms and conditions to ensure their bounty submissions are accepted," Mr Wishart

said. The Fox and Wild Dog Bounty program received \$6.7 million in the Victorian government's 2020-21 Budget and will

continue until 2024. Since the program was introduced in 2011, more than a million fox scalps and close to 4,630 wild dog body parts have been manage the damage they collected in Victoria.

"In 2022 alone, some 82,558 fox scalps and 384

collected," Mr Wishart said. "Foxes and wild dogs require ongoing management by all land managers and Agriculture Victoria encourages an

integrated approach using a range of management practices. "The bounty offers incentive for community participation in fox and wild dog management but other techniques also are important to effectively

> cause. Foxes and wild dogs prey on livestock,

especially lambs and sheep, inflicting significant economic and production loss to Victoria's livestock sector. They also have an impact on native wildlife. are

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Obituary:- Patsy Barber *Fun lover always made family and friends welcome*

Patsy was born on March 17th, 1928. It was her grandfather who suggested her name should be Patsy because she was born on St Patrick's Day.

Patsy was the fifth of six children to Percy and Hilda Whitehead of Khancoban. Her siblings were all long lived - Clive 99, Zenda 95, Alvia 97, Bruce 78 and Johnny 90.

Her early childhood was spent on the family farm called 'Coolangatta' at Khancoban. The Snowy Mountains Authority bought out the family farm to enable the formation of the Khancoban Dam in the 1960s.

Her schooling began at the tiny Khancoban school where in her early years there were only two girls. As well as other domestic duties at school, the crabby teacher made the two girls sweep the floor before the start of classes every day. Patsy and her friend were

not happy as the boys in the school did nothing! At the age of 11, Patsy and brothers' Bruce and

Johnny, along with their mother, lived in Corryong during the week to attend school. They stayed in their Aunt Mag's house in Wheeler Street but returned to the farm on weekends.

Patsy's childhood stories include riding horses up into Bunroy to check cattle with her father. She was an excellent horse woman and would often ride her horse, crossing the Swampy and Indi rivers, to visit her sister Alvie in Biggara. She loved visiting her sisters and delighted in playing with

their children. Patsy left school after completing Grade 8 and went to work at Hobbs Haberdashery in Corryong. At the age of 17 she went to Melbourne to live with her Aunt Fan. She worked at Rockmans



on Collins Street for about 12 months before returning to Corryong.

One day after WWII Patsy saw her brother Bruce Whitehead out the front of Hobbs talking with Bill Barber. She asked Bruce if he had any war ration coupons as she wanted to buy lingerie. Bruce didn't have any but Bill offered his. Patsy, who enjoyed being a bit of a flirt, said "Thanks I'll dance at your wedding for that!"

Little did they know then but after meeting up again that year, falling in love and following a twoyear courtship they would dance together at their own wedding!

They married on March 27th, 1948 and built a cement brick home that is still standing next to the Cudgewa tennis courts.

Their two eldest children Colleen and Lyle were born while living there. Bill applied for and was granted a Soldier Settlers block at the Cudgewa North turnoff. Initially they lived in the tin hut on the property. It was freezing in winter and boiling hot in summer. Life was very busy without any 'mod cons'. Their third child Lesley was born while they lived in the hut.

They soon built the farm house and moved in before Christmas 1953, just before Russell was born. Kerryn and Barry followed several years later.

The dairy was on one side of the road and the house on the other. It became a drop-n point for friends, neighbours and passersby. Patsy was a hard worker and toiled tirelessly on the farm including helping Bill milking cows, feeding poddys and pigs, as well as maintaining a spotless household and bringing up six children. Patsy was a wonderful mother and loved and cared for her children unconditionally. The children were always well clothed with Patsy's sewing skills coming to the fore especially the beautiful smocked dresses she made for the girls.

It wasn't all hard work - Bill and Patsy knew how to have fun. They often attended old time dances around the district. They would take the children and when it became bed time, the six kids would be relegated to the bed in the back of the station wagon and encouraged to go to sleep!

Patsy and Bill were were renowned for their hospitality and the large kitchen table always had plenty of extra guests as well as six children. Many a long night of a few drinks or a friendly game of cards was enjoyed. It was not unusual for Patsy and her friends or family members to stay up most of the night playing Euchre, 500, Pontoon and especially Canasta.

Patsy also loved playing the piano. She had learnt to play by ear as a child and everyone loved her honky tonk style tunes. Her favourite was 'In the Mood'.

Although Patsy and Bill did not travel much with six kids and daily milking on a dairy farm, they regularly hosted friends, extended family and relatives as well as friends of the children. They always had someone ctaving

staying. They also hosted exchange students. Lyle sometimes brought home teachers from his boarding school to let them see that his stories were true. Weeknights and weekends were spent ferrying children to their numerous sporting activities.

Patsy loved all her grandchildren and great grandchildren dearly. When Colleen returned to Corryong to live, Patsy assisted her in bringing up Barry and Nicci. She had a great relationship with Kerryn's daughter Chantelle as well as visiting or getting visits from all her other children and grandchildren.

Patsy was well known for her legendary cooking

skills, especially as the 'Queen of Pavs' and for her sponges, slices and biscuits. Luckily her skills were passed down to her daughters. Patsy's cakes graced the canteen of the Federal Football Club ladies, The Corryong Bowls Club, Church of England catering, street stalls and many special occasions.


After visiting she would never let her guests go without loading them up with her delicious treats. Her family also grew up with her potted steak, lathering it on toast or sandwiches. It was one thing people outside the family were not so sure about!

As the children grew older and began to leave home, Patsy joined Colleen for a few seasons picking tobacco at Tooma. When that job folded she went to work for Benny and Shirley Byatt at the Tintaldra Hotel. After starting as a housemaid helping with the ironing, she soon progressed to chef and barmaid as well as taking over when they wanted a break. She also worked closely with Alf and Maija Wilson doing the same when they bought the hotel.

The love of gardening followed Patsy and Bill when they moved into Corryong in 1981. They remodelled Patsy's parents' house and Bill concreted plenty of garden beds for Patsy's flowers including her fish pond that she treasured. She embraced the comments of passersby, who said how neat and colourful her gardens were.

Up until a couple of years ago Patsy was still getting out mowing her lawns and trying to do her lawn edges, as well as pruning and weeding.

Patsy loved her sport and played competitive tennis well into her 40s at Cudgewa and around the district. After moving into Corryong, she began regular early morning walks with her sister Zenda down to the aerodrome and back. At this stage she said she was too young for bowls but with Zenda and Alvia's insistence she took it up and soon became a club champion and regular pennant player around the North East.

She also competed at the Bowls Centre in Darebin and down the river as far as Moama. The three sisters enjoyed many trips away and interstate with the Corryong Bowls Club. Her bowling mantra was "take more green!".

Patsy had a few vices as well. Much to Bill's disdain she smoked cigarettes for more than 60 years and was a lover of the pokies. She and her good friend Daphne Reiners would go down to the club every Sunday afternoon. The club president once remarked that the new carpet on the floor was paid for with Patsy's losses!

As well as playing sport she loved watching sport on TV. Of course winter and the AFL season was her favourite time as she loved Richmond. She was also an avid follower of Essendon and enjoyed the Sydney Swans because they were Federal's colours. Sport on TV kept her going as she enjoyed the cricket, loved tennis in summer and filled in the gaps with watching figure skating and ballroom dancing. The TV was always on for Olympic Games and Commonwealth Games.

Over the years she also enjoyed the occasional punt and loved the spring racing carnival and races on TV. For many years Patsy and a group of friends made an annual pilgrimage to Oaks Day at the Flemington Spring

Carnival where they had a wow of a time until June lost her purse! That's another story.

Everyone knew not to disturb Patsy from 4:30pm to 5:00pm weekdays so that she could watch the Bold and the Beautiful. She had to learn to tape the shows in case she missed an episode.

After Bill died, Patsy travelled annually for some time to visit her flowergirl, niece Larraine in Queensland and son Russell who's trucking business was based in Rockhampton. This was a good way to escape the fogs and chills of winter in Corryong.

Patsy and Larraine developed a special bond and of course Russell loved having her stay, enjoying her cooking and housework.

Patsy was a great driver and the family had many cars over the years. The little blue Camry went everywhere including many trips to see Lesley and family in Echuca where the big family Christmas was a regular event. As Patsy got older her main drives were down past the aerodrome to Mitzi Paton's for her weekly haircut or perm. During the Man from Snowy River Festival she knew all the back roads to miss the traffic and crowds!

Patsy was a very resilient lady. Her hard work on the farm held her in good stead in her later years. She suffered grief having her youngest son die at age 12, her husband Bill in 2005, then her eldest daughter in 2013. She watched her siblings pass on until she was the only one left.

In her later years Patsy had many health battles but she mostly met them with courage and determination.

She adored her six children, 14 grandchildren, 21 great grandchildren and four great great grandchildren.



Obituary:- Iona June Albert *Laughter and a love of life made her many friends*

June was born on July 19th, 1931 at Munderoo (NSW), near Tumbarumba, hence there were often references to 'wood grubs' when talking of her early years.

She was named Iona June Schintler but never used her first name and was always known as June. Her parents were Douglas and Hazel Schintler (nee Surtees) and it would be another eight years before June's brother Len was born.

By the time WWII broke out, Doug was in partnership as Schintler and Greenhill Butchers in Hanson Street in Corryong and as a young girl, June had fond memories of riding her pushbike around town delivering meat orders, with strict instructions to collect the ration cards, which it was her job to collate.

She also spent hours with the Eastlake girls, Joyce and Phyllis, whose father ran the garage near the butcher's shop and she also became involved in Red Cross along with her mother, a connection she continued heavily for the next 60 years.

June was responsible for her brother Len's love of horses and taught him



how to ride. At one stage he refused to carry his saddle when she told him to and so he ran behind her with the whip so he didn't have to carry it.

Over the early years the Schintler family moved homes a couple of times in Corryong and at one stage share farmed at Parish Lane. There they needed to finish milking early before the townspeople woke up and started using the limited electricity. June was involved with the Girl Guides as a leader in her younger years and then later she joined the local Trefoil Group, for those that had previously been in Girl Guides. (Jack called them the Tinfoil ladies because they were all silver haired!).

Weekend trips around Victoria were enjoyed visiting the other Trefoil groups for Friendship Days over the years, with many lasting friendships being enjoyed.

When Greg, Kate and Jack started school and then took up sport and family activities June became very involved in all the committees required to run these events.

She also enjoyed many trips around Australia with Andy and friends and family. Merimbula was an annual visit with family, and Darwin was another favourite.

She was always welcoming of relatives and visitors, opening her home and spoiling them. Schintler and Fuller relatives and Hunt and Campbell families have many fond memories of staying with Auntie June and Uncle Andy either up the bush or at their home and enjoying many farm activities, some more risky than others.

June would try anything. She once riding attempted Jack's motorbike but unfortunately she wasn't sure how to stop it and ended up halfway up the loading ramp at the yards, squawking the whole way with laughter, before finally stopping. When one of her grandsons received his first motorbike she was offered a turn and almost crashed before remembering how to stop, laughing all the time.

June loved having visitors and meeting new people and accepted everybody for who they were.

She laughed out loud, enjoyed life, participated where she could and enjoyed a cold beer on the verandah in the hot weather.

She loved travelling and music and her grandchildren.

She spent a lot of her life looking after others and being fully involved in her community.




