They have been deployed at points of significant change, upheaval and opportunity and this is one of those moments," Dr Haines said. Her plan would involve

Her plan would involve government funding for 200 agricultural extension officers across 20 regional

centres.

It has been costed by the Parliamentary Budget Office at \$33 million a year over four years.

"Many farmers I speak to across Indi tell me they want to play a part in reducing our national emissions and are looking to becoming climate

neutral themselves," Dr Haines said. "They talk to me

about the challenges in navigating carbon measurement, auditing and certification and they express genuine concern about the integrity of carbon credits.

"There is also great

concern within the farming community about how they will be affected by the government's Safeguard Mechanism, with too much reliance on the agricultural sector to offset emissions in other sectors.

"My plan is a way to start providing answers, action and a way forward for farmers and for government to truly support them."

Dr Haines has taken the plan to the government and hopes to see it funded in the upcoming budget.

"I have discussed this idea with Agriculture Minister, Murray Watt, several times and I am confident he is listening," she said.

"His comments to the Farmers for Climate Action event last week show he does understand the challenges the sector faces.

"I have a practical plan and I am saying to the government 'pick this up and run with it'. This is the way to get the best technology, products and practices in the hands of our farmers.

"It's an invitation and if Minister Watt is serious about partnering with farmers, he will fund this network in the Budget."

Quiet achiever has driven change

A long time, behind-the-scenes contributor to the Upper Murray Historical Society and Man From Snowy River Museum in Corryong has been recognised for her work with Life Membership.

Marita Albert has been a society member since 2006 and has held the position of Project Officer and Publicity Officer for most of that time.

With a sound knowledge of museum policies and procedures and relevant qualifications, she has endeavored to pass on her expertise to other members by organising conservators to visit and talk with them. She has also advocated the need for suitable materials to be used as well as appropriate colouring, lighting, cleaning and storage options, and many other aspects associated with museum operations.

Marita has been instrumental in applying for grants, an arduous and time consuming task. She worked diligently with others during the 2010-11 extension of the museum including establishment of the war room and renovations to the kitchen and other rooms.

Grants for equipment and a security system have been successful and recently a grant for landscaping and disability access was received.

Marita has also organised the bush festival performance since its inception bringing large numbers to the museum during the event and has also been involved with planning and organising various activities and pamphlets.

In addition, she has been responsible for the majority of technology changes particularly over the past decade inluding internet access, website development, Facebook access, security system installation and provision of office equipment.

She has also overseen the museum's digitisation project and represented the society at regional level and at state conferences.

Much of the work Marita has done has been behind the scenes but without her contribution, knowledge and support the society would not have achieved nearly as much as it has.



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How a health board works

Questions have been raised in the community in recent times about the role of and composition of the Corryong Health Service Board.

In particular, is being 'local' an important characteristic for membership of a hospital board in a rural area?

Boards play an essential role in guiding Victoria's health services on behalf of the Minister for Health and they have to act within defined legal and financial requirements.

Corryong Health CEO, Dominic Sandilands, said that the Targeting Zero Report (October 2016) was a review supporting the Victorian hospital system to eliminate avoidable harm and strengthen quality of care. "The report repeatedly

described the need for stronger independence for board directors, particularly for rural and regional boards," Mr Sandilands said.

"Recommendations related to independence included introducing board tenure, ensuring boards have an independent clinical (non-executive) director and that all boards have at least one director that is not local."

The Victorian Department of Health and Human Services Director Toolkit (2008) highlights that it is ideal for a public hospital board to have a mixture of local and nonlocal membership for the same reasons as diversity, with multiple studies demonstrating benefits including:-

• Diversity of thought • Increased independence

• Enhanced innovation, creativity and problem solving

 Enhanced external relations through engagement to a wider range of stakeholders
Improved human

resources and financial performance "However, the reason for the importance of local board membership is

often misunderstood." Mr

Sandilands explained. "The role of a director from the local community on the board is not to represent the community, as consultation and

as consultation and B awareness is a duty for the whole board, including non-local directors. "Corryong Health also

has a Community Health Advisory Group (CHAG) which is a representative community group. This group is a sub-committee of the board as distinct from the board itself.

"Boards are governance bodies, not representative bodies. As such, it would be inappropriate to recruit based only on location. "Nevertheless, just

"Nevertheless, just as with the diverse perspectives, a local can often have a familiarity with key issues in the community that an outsider may not fully appreciate.

"Another key advantage for local members is the ability to commit to further roles and functions held by the health service due to reduced travel."

Road repairs don't

stand up to scrutiny

The Liberal Member for Northern Victoria, Wendy Lovell, has continued her campaign for better regional roads by calling on the Victorian government to ensure their road maintenance program delivers workmanship of the highest standard.

Speaking during the adjournment debate in State Parliament, Ms Lovell said there was evidence that the current repairs being completed to Victoria's damaged roads were of poor quality and called on Minister for Roads and Road Safety, Melissa Horne, to order a review of the current maintenance program. In her contribution, Ms Lovell said there were many examples of road repairs lasting only a few hours, especially with the use of premix breaking up as soon as a large vehicle drives over it.

She said she was recently contacted by a constituent experienced in road construction expressing concerns about the standard of the work being carried out to repair our damaged roads and informing that most work sites do not even use the correct equipment to ensure the repairs are of a high standard. Ms Lovell said only a review of the current maintenance program will ensure dangerous roads are repaired properly.

"A chronic lack of funding over many years and now a poor repair program is proof that regional Victorian roads are not and never have been a priority.

"The practice of not properly repairing damaged roads results in regional Victorian roads remaining dangerous for prolonged periods and I call on the Minister to order a review of the current road maintenance program."

Farmers warn roads need cash

The Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) says regional roads won't be able to cope with future severe weather events if they are not maintained to a basic standard.

The VFF argues that a lack of road maintenance funding exacerbated damage caused by recent flooding.

VFF President, Emma

Germano, said farmers were frustrated that governments continue to neglect road maintenance.

"Enhancing the resilience of the road network to deal with extreme weather events is important but it can only be achieved by ensuring there is regular maintenance to keep them at an acceptable standard.," she said.

"Maintenance funding keeps going backwards and worryingly Victorians keep risking their lives on dodgy and dangerous roads."

roads." The VFF has also supported calls by the newly formed Rural Roads Alliance for a \$5.5 billion emergency funding package in the upcoming federal budget.

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Obituary:- Stephen Jeffries Likeable larrikin worked hard and played hard

Stephen was born on August 23rd, 1954 and adopted at the age of four by Frank and Pat Jeffries, becoming a brother to Paul

Known as Stevo or Sheepy for the majority of his life, he enjoyed his early years on the family farm at Mt Alfred particularly tending to the dogs, cats, sheep and chooks.

He went to the Mt Alfred Primary School attending prior to Champagnat College in

Wangaratta as a boarder. This is where he acquired the nickname Sheepy. At lambing time there were always a few 'poddys' or orphans that Stevo and Paul hand fed. They also claimed any lambs that the ewes had later.

Stevo had one ewe called 'Seaweed' who lived until 13, having twins a couple of times, so by the time he got to Wangaratta he owned a little flock. His fellow students soon christened him with the sobriquet 'Sheepy'.

However he and school weren't a match made in heaven and he returned to the farm a few years later. The brothers worked

with their father Frank until he died in 1977, then worked together firstly leasing some land and buying a block together in 1982.

divided the They land up later that decade operating separately but still working together with bigger jobs such as shearing. Like many, there was a

need for off-farm income. Stevo planted pine trees and did fencing and stock work and roustabouting for other farmers.

Stevo was very good at many sports. At school he could always jump his own height winning that event often.

That ability certainly helped him in football

starting as a speedy and clever wingman with Border-Walwa in 1971. Over the years he played as a high-flying full forward, kicking 12 goals out of 15 at Tumbarumba once before eventually spending time as a fullback where he could punch the ball further than some could kick it.

He won a club best and fairest award and was a member of the team that broke the Pies' premiership drought in 1984.

He also represented the Upper Murray League on many occasions. Ben Byatt, who often coached the team, loved him even picking him to play for the league when he was only playing reserves with Border-Walwa.

He played many other sports including basketball where his spring heels were an advantage. He also tried his hand at golf and tennis but they were probably lower on his preferred list of activities.

Darts was a game he always loved and he certainly should have been good at it as the back of the family's lounge room door would attest. He also played cricket and indoor bowls.

In particular, Stevo loved his fishing and the bardi grub hunts plus sinker making that went with it.

Stevo met his future wife Wendy in 1985 at the Lankey's Creek B&S Ball and they quickly became an item. They were inseparable on weekends and travelled to local football and cricket matches as well as playing darts during the week.

They purchased their first home in Walwa and Stevo painstakingly renovated it to the best of his ability. In May 1986, they married in Melbourne.

Not long after this Matthew, Sarah and Peter (PJ) arrived.

To say that Stevo was proud of them would be a massive understatement. He supported them in everything they did.

children The were traction at Albury Base for two weeks and Stevo spent the entire time there with him. He occupied his time by painting the children's ward windows with paintings of cartoon characters.

PJ then spent some time in the Walwa Bush Nursing Centre so Stevo could go back to work (after he had decorated the windows there as well!).

The family later moved to Corryong where it was much easier for them. Matt and Sarah would stay at school with Wendy while Stevo would look after PJ as before, although it was a bit easier because he was attending pre-school by then.

Although Stevo and Wendy would later separate, they remained very good friends and enjoyed catching up with the kids when they came back to town.

Stevo was very proud of the children's career choices and prospective partners. attending weddings and seeing them achieve their dreams.

Almost nine years ago he and Wendy welcomed their first grandchild Rylan into the world and after that Lillie, Halle and Jasper.

Wendy recalled that last Christmas she, Sarah and PJ were going to catch up at Matt's in Bendigo and she asked Stevo if he wanted to come. His answer was "No thanks, I'll spend it with the other orphans in Corryong" meaning his mate Dobby Jordon and the rest of his fishing crew. Stevo was a unique

character and his sons remember some memorable moments along the journey.

Matt said he "lived hard, worked hard and played harder. He was a jack of all trades, master of none.

"He was one of the most hard-working men you would meet. He just loved to stay busy. He worked throughout the Upper Murray and there would be not much ground Dad didn't walk over in the district." "Dad introduced me to football and for me it was love at first go. My first game in 1993 was against Cudgie and Mum only let me play because Dad was umpiring. This continued right throughout my junior career. Dad umpired and the fox soon disappeared! I played, never getting a free kick but giving away a lot! for as long as I have known and he loved to "I got sick of it and one share tomatoes, corn and day I gave him a mouth plenty of other things. full. The game stopped instantly and I was given a to part with his rockmelons red card. I still remember or watermelons, these Dad's face; he had a smirk. The car ride home that were his pride and joy.



night was no fun. It took me a week to speak to him again.

"T also had the opportunity to play senior football with Dad in 2003. I would have been 16 and Dad 48 and we played a few games together that year. I was lucky enough to play multiple sports with him.

"Dad was the type of person that everyone knows and remembers. Friendly, fun, caring. A person that always looked after the people he cared about. Dad will be missed.'

PJ also has fond memories of Stevo.

"Whether you know him as Dad, Stevo or Sheepy, I am sure we will all remember him as a hard-working bloke that loved a good story," he said.

"These stories would be heard across the Upper Murray whether at the local footy and cricket, on a farm or in a shearing shed.

"In my early years, Dad and I got to spend most of our days together. Mum had returned to teaching so Dad and I would head off to work on the 4-wheeler. I'd sit in a milk crate on the front while Dad would do his thing on the farm.

"He was full of surprises and would often bring home animals for us kids - rabbits, hares and but I think having a good a fox he really liked. His fishing hole on a property plan was to domesticate it and walk it down the street. He was so excited to be the first person to do it. "However, Mum was

"He wasn't as willing

"Before Matt and moved away from Corryong we were lucky enough to play cricket with Dad.

"I recall one game Dad was filling in and by this stage his sporting ability had passed him by. He thought he might as well keep wicket.

"Matt bowled the first over which was going well, as was Dad until the batsmen missed the ball which smacked Dad straight in the chest. Someone yelled out, 'You've got gloves for a reason Sheepy!'. He got up and got on with it without a fuss.

"Then came the second over of the innings which I was bowling and you wouldn't read about it but Dad forgot to use his gloves again. This time he ended flat on his back but there was a little bit of compassion amongst the laughter as someone once again yelled out 'Sheepy you've got gloves for a reason!'

"Dad was a pretty simple man and there weren't many things that had to be spot on. A couple of his necessities were a shirt with pockets for his smokes, cakes with sprinkles to meet his criteria and if you were to take him fishing, it had to

New alliance champions regional Australia

More than 30 CEOs from the most influential peak bodies in the country joined forces in Canberra on Tuesday, for the historic launch of the National Alliance for Regionalisation.

Established by the Regional Australia Institute (RAI), CEO Liz Ritchie says this new Alliance is the first of its kind in this country, spanning business, health, education, infrastructure and environment. It aims to better position the regions to reach their potential. "It's no secret regional kids are still behind their metro-counterparts school," she said. "Employers are struggling to get staff yet migration levels are significantly lower in regions. Towns are crying out for doctors, but kids in the country are less likely to finish high school.

"The Alliance will advance the targets within the Ambition and advocate for the policy priorities needed to create a fairer, more prosperous, more balanced regional Australia. "The launch marks a significant milestone for the nine million people living in our regions. "This powerful cohort of leading peak bodies and for-purpose organisations will work to help bring the RAI's Regionalisation Ambition 2032 to life," Ms Ritchie said. "By viewing these

critical issues through the collective lens of the Alliance, we will progress solutions that have hampered growth in regional Australia for decades
