The grand old Corryong ANZ bank building will take on a new lease of life after being closed and empty for five years. Matt Spurgeon has

purchased the building and has registered the business name Upper Murray Providore.

Works will begin immediately to bring the building up to standard with a four-bedroom, two-bathroom Bed & Breakfast upstairs and 'foodie' venue downstairs with a commercial kitchen and shopfront.

Matt will be sourcing high quality products from the Snowy Mountains area and along the Murray River to feature in the providore. Partner, Tracey Fair, will be head cook and focused on creating products to sell in-store using locally grown fruit and vegetables as well as her 'Trace Elements Wellness' range of organic healthy products.

The mission statement for the new venture is to "provide old-fashioned, real food that nourishes the soul, with a focus on



sourcing from the Snowies to the Murray".

"We also hope that by providing a shop-front in Corryong it will encourage other local entrepreneurs in the cottage-industry space to establish in our area," Matt said. "If you produce it locally we will help you get it to customers via the Upper Murray Providore."

Both Matt and Tracey spent their formative years in the Upper Murray before moving to "the big smoke", however Corryong never left their hearts and they jumped at the opportunity to resurrect one of the most iconic buildings in the town.

"But it's not just about the building, it will be a celebration of the Upper Murray on every visit," Matt added. "We will provide a simple menu made fresh each day of opening, however we are not a café and will be primarily focused on showcasing local produce and producers with events and functions that are an uplifting, fun and social experience.

"There will always be gluten free and vegan options available and a healthy focus which is Tracey's passion.

"P a d d o c k - t o plate luncheons and dinners matched with wines sourced from Tumbarumba and beers from the Mitta Mitta and Tumut breweries will be a regular feature of the business."

Matt and Tracey have lots of ideas which will be introduced as the business evolves.

Renovations will begin immediately and all going well, they plan to have the doors open by the end of the year.

Local architect goes on tour

The founder of a new regional-based architectural firm has been recognised for her innovative work in the field with a coveted national award.

The Australian Institute of Architects (AIA) has announced that Sarah Lebner will join Ellen Buttrose, Tiffany Liew, Bradley Kerr and Edwina Brisbane on the 2023 Dulux Study Tour of Helsinki, Lisbon, Zurich and Venice Biennale.

Sarah returned to the area last year and started Cooee Architecture, a new regional practice based near Bringenbrong focusing on energyefficient and low-carbon homes.

Cooee practices throughout the Victorian High Country, NSW Snowy Mountains, ACT and surrounds.

Prior to relocating, Sarah was the Principal Architect at Light House Architecture and Science in Canberra.

She is also the author of 101 Things I Didn't Learn in Architecture School and was the recipient of the AIA's 2020 National Emerging Architect Prize.

The award recipients were recognised for their individual achievements and contribution to architectural practice,

education, design excellence and community involvement. It is one of the AIA's most coveted awards, celebrating the importance of experiencing architecture first-hand.

This year's study tour marks the return of the landmark event following the pandemic in what is its 15th year.

The jury was impressed by the depth of skill, talent, passion and the dedication to the architectural profession exhibited by all who submitted.

It highlighted the diverse backgrounds and interests of the candidates, noting a demonstration of a shifting dynamic within the next generation of the profession.

"I feel unbelievably honoured to be selected for the 2023 Dulux Study Tour," Sarah said. "As we take a whirlwind study tour

through Helsinki, Lisbon, Zurich and the Venice Architecture Biennale. I'll constantly be asking myself how my privilege of attending and spending time with other movers and shakers can be paid forward into my work in sustainable regional architecture, entrepreneurship in our industry and my work with young architects at My First Architecture Job.

Corryong police have spoken to a number of minors after the stone seat in the Corryong Memorial Garden was damaged last Saturday.





Power project bores on

Despite some setbacks. construction of Snowy 2.0 continues to make progress across multiple worksites.

At Lobs Hole, tunnel boring machine (TBM) Lady Eileen Hudson has completed excavation of the 2.7km main access tunnel and TBM Kirsten is almost finished excavating the adjacent 2.9km emergency, cable and ventilation tunnel (ECVT).

At Tantangara, the project team is currently conducting works to stabilise encountered soft ground and enable TBM Florence to restart excavating the headrace tunnel. It has tunnelled about

150 metres and is currently located at a depth of approximately 30 metres below ground.

A surface depression recently emerged in the ground above TBM Florence, which has temporarily delayed progress on this particular worksite. The depression is approximately nine (9) metres deep and continues to be monitored.

"Importantly, the integrity of the tunnel, which is supported by a concrete lining and steel ribs, has not been compromised and nor has the capacity of the TBM," a Snowy Hydro

spokesperson said. "The project team has paused the machine until about 10-15m of weak material in front of it is stabilised, prior to striking hard rock, when we expect normal tunnelling to resume."

Snowy 2.0 principal contractor Future Generation Joint Venture (FGJV) is drilling probe holes through the front of the excavation to understand the ground conditions immediately ahead of the TBM.

Grout is injected in front of the excavation to improve any weak zones and limit any water flows.

"This work is well underway from TBM Florence, with 20 grout holes drilled to date in the current location," the spokesperson said.

"FGJV is currently installing a slurry plant for the TBM that will mean the machine can switch from open excavation to a closed, pressurised mode. This will deliver stable excavation and efficient progress through the softer ground conditions, while enabling the TBM to switch back to open mode when in harder rock."

Stage two of the works to stabilise the ground in front and above the machine will involve ground improvement from the surface. Once the area is grouted, the depression will be backfilled and revegetated.

Hydro "Snowy has been responsibly operating the scheme in Kosciuszko National Park for decades and remains

committed to careful and safe management of this tunnelling challenge in a sensitive environment," the spokesperson added.

Snowy "The 2.0 workforce of more than 2,200 is continuing to achieve milestones across a range of work fronts as they build the huge pumped-hydro expansion of the Snowy Scheme. "At Lobs Hole, in

the main access tunnel, works are continuing on multiple drill and blast cross tunnels. These will link with the ECVT. where TBM Kirsten has tunnelled 2.8km and has reached the site of the underground power station cavern complex.

"This is a great milestone for Snowy Hydro as we now have access to the excavation site from both ends of the cavern, which will be one of the largest and deepest

in the world.

tunnel boring technology, just as the original Snowy Scheme developed rock bolting techniques that are still used throughout the world today. The machine will soon be modified to excavate the inclined pressure shaft on a steep

uphill angle. "Modifications include altering the levels of the TBM's tanks and equipment mechanical so they are level when travelling up the 25-degree incline, and converting the walkways on the machine's sides into steps and ladderways.'

Meanwhile, TBM Lady Eileen Hudson is being reassembled at the Talbingo adit with some new components including a cutterhead and shields. It will be launched into the mountain later this year to

excavate the 6km tailrace tunnel, which will feed into Talbingo Reservoir.

Excavation of intakes at Talbingo and Tantangara is advancing steadily, along with the giant surge shaft on the Marica plateau that is already excavated to a depth of more than 20m.

"Despite the ongoing challenges faced bv all large infrastructure projects. Snowy 2.0 continues to achieve progress across a large number of remote work fronts," the spokesperson said.

"Snowy Hydro remains fully committed to ensuring the local community and stakeholders are kept updated on this pumpedhydro mega project that will provide the National Electricity Market with 2,000 megawatts of on-demand generating capacity and a huge 175 hours of energy storage."

The autumn firewood collection season started Victoria across on Wednesday, March 1.

Firewood can only be collected from public land twice a year for domestic use from designated collection areas during autumn (1 March to 30 June) and spring (1 September to 30 November).

Fire Forest Management Victoria

(FFMVic) Hume Region Deputy Chief Fire Officer, Jarrod Hayse, said "Firewood collection areas are selected for a range of reasons including the availability of firewood, community safety, and to protect sites of cultural and environmental significance.

"Collection limits are in place to prevent stockpiling of firewood, which is important to

ensure there's enough firewood on public land for people who rely on it as their only source of heating."

"Limits include taking a maximum of two cubic metres per person per day and a maximum of 16 cubic metres per household per financial year.

"The felling of trees and cutting hollow logs firewood is also for

prohibited," Mr Hayse added.

The Conservation Regulator, FFMVic and Parks Victoria authorised officers conduct regular patrols of forest areas. Significant fines and penalties apply for people who illegally remove firewood from public land. A Myrtleford man was recently convicted and fined \$43,149 for illegally collecting firewood, destroying wildlife habitat and driving off road in the

Stanley State Forest. Firewood collected



Corn outstrips other silage

In his 75 years of farming in the Biggara Valley, Keith Whitsed says he has never seen a more impressive crop than the stand of corn currently being grown on the family property with his daughter Marie and son-in-law Dave Colbert.

Their first attempt at growing corn for fodder has exceeded their expectations but has also brought with it some unique issues.

"Before we could prepare the paddock for sewing we had to have power lines moved at a cost of around \$80,000," Marie said. Dealing with authorities on both sides of the border also had its problems but once they were sorted the work was done quickly."

The decision to grow their own corn crop was prompted by making best use of their centre pivot irrigation system and providing high quality fodder for their cattle.

"We planted five and a half hectares on December 1st and within five days it had germinated and was about a metre high after two weeks," Dave Colbert said. It is well over three metres now and almost ready to harvest.

"We estimate that we can grow two and half times the fodder in a quarter of the time compared to traditional crops and it is a highly efficient use of our water.

"In time we intend to increase the crop size to around ten hectares," he added.

Graham Martin of Agmate Rural Services in Corryong has been guiding them along the way and says corn is becoming increasingly popular as a fodder crop in the Upper Murray.

"The very high levels of starch and protein contained in corn helps cattle grow and thrive," he said. "It

provides high

quality and extremely healthy feed."

He explained that initial costs are high compared to traditional crops but this is offset by the high yield of corn.

"Contractors are used to plant and harvest the corn crops," Graham said.

The earth is ripped to a depth of around a metre and seeds are planted at 20cms then heavily fertilised.

"All up it costs around \$5000 per hectare to grow compared to around \$150 for other crops but the overall yield is around 24 tonnes per hectare as opposed to other types of silage," Graham said.

"The crop is grown over summer but because of the heavy rains late last year planting this season was delayed and we are looking at a late harvest.

"This has caused an infestation of grubs in the kernels and we are currently assessing methods to remedy this."




The Victorian government is delivering better schools across the North East with a maintenance program to improve facilities for primary and secondary students. Member for Northern

The Australian government must invest in roads, housing and community infrastructure across Indi in the next Budget, according to Federal Member for Indi, Helen Haines.

Dr Haines has released the Indi Budget Submission ahead of the 2022-23 Budget, making the case for investment in the region to unlock economic opportunities including \$7 million for an Integrated Community Centre in Corryong to deliver combined community, library, maternal child health, childcare and kindergarten services.

Working with local councils to identify funding priorities, she wants to ensure the needs of Indi are considered by the government as it prepares the budget.

"The submission puts our priorities front and centre and highlights urgent projects across the region that will deliver value to taxpayer and projects that will ensure North East Victoria thrives," Dr Haines said.

"Increased funding for roads is always a priority but after the flooding last year and extreme weather across the region, the need is more urgent than ever.

The submission also makes the case for funding to allow councils to address the housing availability crisis across the region. "The federal government says it is committed to addressing housing shortages and in Indi we have identified practical ways to help us create more housing that should be funded to promote further investment from other sources," Dr Haines said.

"We also need a Regional Housing Infrastructure Fund, which would invest in enabling infrastructure like sewerage, drainage and roads to accelerate the development of new housing across regional Australia.

"There is a wide range of priority projects identified across Indi which reflect the growing and changing needs of our communities.

Dr Haines recently met with mayors from across Indi in Wangaratta to discuss their priorities including housing issues and funding for roads and telecommunications.

"It was a pleasure to hold a roundtable meeting with representatives from the nine LGAs that make up the electorate of Indi," she said.

"It is an opportunity to discuss our common interest, shared experiences and also learn from each other. It means we ensure the way we work with the government is most effective and we have the most impact."

Club president and Chief Instructor, Heidi Walton, declared the day a huge success with five junior and four adult riders completing the day's activities.


"Today was about getting to know the riders and starting with the basics ahead of planning for future sessions," she said.



The State of Victoria and the Barengi Gadjin Land Council Aboriginal Corporation RNTBC (BGLC) (Indigenous Corporation Number 4395) (the Corporation) have entered into a Recognition and Settlement Agreement (the Agreement) under the Traditional Owner Settlement Act 2010 (Vic) (the Act). The Corporation is appointed by the **WJJWJ** People Traditional Owner Group as the Traditional Owner Group Entity. This Agreement between the State of Victoria and the Corporation commits the parties to an ongoing partnership, and includes obligations and benefits for both parties.

The Agreement under the Act recognises the **WJJWJ Peoples** as the Traditional Owner Group in the Agreement Area (see map below), and their rights to access and use the land and its natural resources in accordance with the terms of the Agreement.
