

Budget draws mixed reaction

Federal Member for Indi, Helen Haines, has welcomed much needed cost of living relief in Tuesday's federal budget and a huge boost for the Flying Fruit Fly Circus

School on the Border. Dr Haines' key priorities in the Indi Budget Submission included cost of living relief, investment in regional housing, health care and regional



development.

the Budget, In the government has announced it will extend and expand the Energy Bill Relief Fund to provide an additional \$300 rebate to all households as well as a \$325 rebate for some eligible small businesses.

"So many people I speak with in Indi are under intense cost-ofliving pressure,"



I urged the government to think about sensible and direct measures they could take to ease that pressure. One suggestion was reducing power bills through a non-inflationary rebate.

"T welcome the government's decision to provide the \$300 rebate on Dr energy bills.



The budget also "Ahead of this budget includes power bill savings measures to make it easier to change to cheaper energy plans, reduce fees and charges and to ensure discounts are passed on to households.

"The budget has delivered \$7.3 million for the Flying Fruit Fly Circus School, the biggest funding boost in the organisation's 45-year history," Dr Haines said.

"I celebrate this significant investment in our region's talented young people and the border community should feel very proud about this recognition." Dr Haines expressed disappointment and concern that the budget delivered no increased funding for the Growing Regions Program and regional Precincts and Partnerships Program. "This just amplifies the blind spot that Labor has for the needs and aspirations of regional, and rural remote Australians," Dr Haines said.

New book revives war memories


launched in a joint project by the Upper Murray and Tumbarumba Historical Societies at the Corryong RSL Hall on Sunday June 2nd.

Thomas Cecil Davis was born in Tooma in 1874. He spent his already extensive list of childhood in Tumbarumba where his parents ran the Union Hotel. Later, Cecil was an apprentice to his uncle, Lew Thomson, in Corryong. Cecil became a talented saddler and operated a successful business in what is now Attree Park in Jardine street

When Australia called for volunteers to take part in the Anglo-Boer War in late 1899, Cecil Davis was one of many local men who already had the qualities and skills to pass the very demanding selection Davis left Australia on process and served for a year with the 3rd Victorian Contingent.

Australia's part in this war is an aspect of early Australian history that has largely faded from our national memory. However, the new book will help rectify this.

Cecil kept a daily

The Boer War Diary diary which has been of Cecil Davis will be treasured and preserved by his granddaughter, Rosemary Neil. The brief, pointed, entries describe very clearly the wartime experience.

Tumbarumba residents, Ron and Catherine Frew, have added to their local history publications by not only editing and publishing Cecil's words in full for the first time but by gathering background and explanatory material, letters from local soldiers and numerous photographs. Many of the photos (1900 originals) by Trooper Pink, an English Imperial Yeoman soldier, are also seen for the first time having been provided to the Frews by a colleague from earlier teaching days in Scotland.


In mid-May 1900 Cecil the Euryalus for South Africa as a member of the Bushmen's Corps. He was one of only three saddlers on board and had 250 saddles to prepare before they reached South Africa, as well as fix girdles, cruppers and buckles. While in South Africa

he wrote in his journal about his experiences and wrote letters home. Some letters appeared in the Corryong Courier and also mention David Garing, a fellow local and uncle to Muriel Lebner.

Cecil later returned to Corryong and married Jane Simpson. Cecil was an active member of the RSL and Masonic Lodge.

Below is an extract from a letter that appeared in this paper on October 4, 1900:-

> It commenced

about half-past 7am and talk about raining lead. that was a fool to it. I was just about in the centre of things. Tho balls were passing under me, splashing the dirt in my face; through my legs, but not one touched me. D. Garing had one through the stock of his gun. There were men shot and wounded all round me but it would be very hard to describe.

Our boys were talking and joking all the time. One chap asked our officer to go and ask the Boers to cease firing until he had something to eat, and a lot of such like remarks, and one was shot while

passing some remark, and, after a while, some began to sleep for they were very tired and hungry.

There were about 750 Boers against 270 of us. The worst sight was the dead horses and men, for the horse holders could not get them out of the road. They took the horses behind a large brick farmhouse, but it proved to be a hornet's nest, for inside were about 30 Boers, who commenced firing on the horses and horse holders. There must have been about 40 or 50 dead horses, and here and there a wounded or dead man, but we came off very lucky; ...

Graziers take the bull by the horns

A group of local beef producers has banded Corryong's butcher shop, with a focus on sourcing meat from local farms.

(UMB) is a communitydriven initiative that was born from the Upper Murray 2030 Plan with an emphaisis on 'value adding' to local production. The project was driven by Dan Whitehouse who

was closely involved with bushfire recovery support in the Upper Murray. A private company was

established by a number of local beef producers as shareholders with Ian Cesa, Ross de Clifford, Jayden Pierce and Dan Whitehouse acting as directors. Its mission is to brand

and market Upper Murray beef as the the best grassfed meat in Australia.

The group tested the waters by selling its meat online and then began supplying Corryong IGA supermarket. The positive response encouraged UMB to establish its new retail outlet which is trading as

Corryong Butchery. The search was then together to re-open on for a qualified butcher and the opportunity piqued the interest of Brad and Kelly Smith, who were in Upper Murray Beef Broome at the time while travelling.

> "The Upper Murray was somewhere we hadn't visited," Brad said, "but we love Victoria and have found Corryong to be very welcoming."

> Brad has been a qualified butcher for more than 30 years and he and Kelly intend to provide the community with "the best quality beef in the country" and also with a select range of pork and lamb products and monthly fresh fish. They are also exploring the option of sourcing chickens from local producers.

The meat is currently processed off-site but UMB will further develop the business with the addition of a mobile butchery within the next 12 months to meet its commitment to value adding for local producers; which is expected to create 15-20 jobs.

takes effect. The Corryong Butchery in Hanson Street is open six days a week

"The events aim to honour the lives and celebrate the memories of those we care for in our cemeteries," said Julie de Hennin, chair of the Talgarno Cemetery Trust,

The final event in the series will be held at the Talgarno Cemetery, Cemetery Road Talgarno on Sunday 26th May from

2.00pm to 4.00pm. The afternoon is free although donations to support the maintenance of the cemetery grounds will be appreciated.

"It is anticipated those interested, local residents, family and friends of those cremated or buried in Talgarno Cemetery may take this opportunity to visit the cemetery," Julie said.

It will include a guided tour of the cemetery, stories, the history of the cemetery, an opportunity to meet the current trust members and a Devonshire afternoon tea.


The cemetery was first gazetted in 1884 and surveyed in July 1885 in its current location. It was a heavily wooded block and there were already eight graves in the cemetery when the clearing began. Two of the first trust members are buried there.

A memorial wall was built in 1996 to inter ashes. In 2017 a grant was allocated to extend the wall and cover it with a shelter.

There are currently 101 recorded burials of which 70 have headstones and 20 urns with plaques in the memorial wall. It is believed that there are also a number of unmarked graves.

"The trust looks forward to welcoming visitors to the Talgarno Cemetery as we honour those who have contributed to the history of our community," Julie added.



Council favours demerger bill

Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) has welcomed the passing of the Local Government Amendment (De-amalgamations) Bill 2024 which provides a mechanism for the government to contribute to funding the costs of demergers incurred by councils.

SVC mayor, Cr Ian Chaffey said the new legislation provides certainty to council that the government can contribute to funding the costs of a de-amalgamation providing councils can make a compelling case.

"The new legislation

will increase the prospects of a de-amalgamation and will be taken into consideration with the development of council's implementation plan," Cr Chaffey said.

Under the new laws, councils seeking to deamalgamate must work in close consultation with their community to develop a robust business case for de-amalgamation. The business case should consider

the impacts of deamalgamation including financial ramifications, long -term strategic plans and the capacity of new councils to deliver services.

"It will still be incumbent upon council to demonstrate that two new councils would be financially sustainable in the longer term," Cr Chaffey said.

The Boundaries Commission has recently announced they will conduct public hearings regarding SVC's proposal for de-amalgamation this month.

Council has held community information sessions this week to provide updates on the deamalgamation proposal.




