Sporting Corryong Complex voted at a special meeting last week to purchase its gaming machines when the current agreement with Tabcorp Gaming Solutions (TGS) expires in August 2022.

The complex board's



preferred option was to purchase the machines outright and for the gaming license to be paid in interest-free instalments over seven years.

The motion to adopt the board's preferred option was carried unanimously at a special meeting, after the annual meeting.

School site to be assessed



The community wants the historic school buildings to be retained.

Plans to develop the former Corryong College junior campus site have progressed following an extensive consultation process which identified that the majority of people want it to be retained for community use.

In February 2020 the junior campus closed and since then, it has been used as the Upper Murray Community Recovery Hub.

The first stage of considering the future vision of the former school site was to identify the community's aspirations.

Commencing in February 2021, Bushfire Recovery Victoria (BRV) and the Corryong and Upper Murray Community Recovery Committees worked collaboratively to deliver a thorough community consultation process.

The team received an overwhelming 349 responses to a community survey. To complement the survey, five focus groups also ran concurrently.

A community workshop in February 2022 validated the data that emerged from the survey and focus groups.

Consultation activities included:-

• A comprehensive survey to determine community connection to the historical school building and identify community aspirations for the future of the site

- Focus groups targeting high-interest community cohorts to dive deeper into community aspirations
- A community workshop to test outcomes from the first two consultation activities and ensure analysis outcomes genuinely reflected community sentiment.

In the community survey, youth recreation was categorised under community recreation space, which came through as a clear priority.

Many responses highlighted that there needed to be a space for youth activities like sporting facilities, pump bike track, parks, skate park.

More than 90 per cent of survey respondents indicated that the historic building should be retained, respectfully restored and used for community benefit. When asked what part of the site should be retained, respondents answered:-

- The historically significant building (64%)
- The oval area (44%)
 The buildings along
 Hanson Street frontage
 (31%)
 - All buildings (28%)

Following presentation of the consultation report from BRV, Towong Council resolved to support further investigation, consultation and business planning into possible future uses of the site and committed to:-

- Securing a tenancy lease for the former Corryong primary school site until 30 June, 2025
- Undertaking a detailed condition assessment of the former Corryong primary school building (heritage building)
- Developing a business case and creating a masterplan for the former Corryong primary school site based on the outcomes of the community consultation report
- Tabling the community consultation report and recommended next steps with the Victorian government via the Department of Education and Training

Council is currently preparing documentation to undertake the condition assessment and business case/master plan.

BUSHFIRE RECOVERY GRANTS FOR COMMUNITY FACILITIES

Twenty-five Victorian community organisations in bushfire-affected areas will share in more than \$1 million to build, upgrade or repair important local facilities.

The Bushfire Recovery Grants for Community Facilities were established to make community facilities safer, better and more welcoming to everyone.

Previous recipients of Community Facilities grants include:

- \$45,000 to upgrade playgrounds at the Edi
 Upper Hall and the Whitfield Recreation Reserve
- \$50,000 for an accessible restroom at Wangaratta Kennel and Obedience Dog Club
- \$50,000 for a storage facility for the Rotary Club of Mitchell River
- \$50,000 to build a dedicated bushfire storage facility to house firefighting and fire prevention equipment at Tamboon Inlet
- \$50,000 to purchase a tractor and mower for the Walwa Golf Club

- \$50,000 for playground upgrades at the Tambo Upper Community Hall
- \$50,000 to upgrade to an accessible restroom at the Tintaldra Recreation Reserve
- \$49,975 to install an energy system including solar panels and battery storage at the Corryong Historic Machinery Club
- \$49,307 for repair works to the Tallangatta Sports Centre
- \$48,637 for building renovations at the Cudgewa Hall
- \$50,000 for building renovations for the Corryong Opportunity Shop
- \$50,000 for stage two of works on the start of the trail at Big Hill Mountain Bike Park.
- \$50,000 for upgrades to the Myrtleford Community Hall.
- \$50,000 to replace the Mongan's Bridge Caravan park playground.
- \$45,000 to upgrade the kitchen and bathroom facilities at the Lucknow Memorial Hall.

- \$40,017 to upgrade the facilities at the Myrrhee Hall.
- \$35,024 for the Omeo and District Agricultural and Pastoral Society to upgrade their community meeting facilities.
- \$35,000 to build a skate ramp at Harrietville Recreation Reserve.
- \$33,586 to resurface the netball court at the Lakes Entrance Football and Netball club.
- \$32,000 for the Rotary Club of Bright to replace the fence around their waterslide.

Bushfire Recovery Grants for Community Facilities are still available and close 30 June 2022. Grants up to \$50,000 are available for community groups seeking to build, upgrade, or repair local facilities. 
Six Aboriginal organisations and social enterprises will share in \$2.4 million to help strengthen Aboriginal communities' resilience against natural disasters.




Bringenbrong The brigade also officially received its new Category 1 Grassland Fire Tanker to add to the Khancoban Township Cat 1 and Cat 7.

Communities can share in the power

Community-owned energy retailer, Indigo Power, has launched its second crowd-sourced investment offer as they move to the next exciting stage of growth.

The share offer will be the first time community members have the chance to buy shares in the company after the first offer, in May 2020, sold out in under three days.

The company is now seeking expressions of interest from potential investors, prior to the completion of the share offer in June.

Indigo Power was named one of Australia's greenest electricity providers in Greenpeace Australia's green energy guide and funds used from the share offer will be used to invest in a marketing program able to reach new customers.

A successful share offer will allow the company to pursue clean energy projects across North East Victoria and Southern New South Wales.

Feasibility studies are currently underway for a pumped hydro facility in the Upper Murray and on the replication of the Yackandandah community battery in towns across the

Indigo Power will also soon begin supplying clean energy to electric vehicle drivers, with the first Indigo Power-operated EV charging station.

Indigo Managing Director, Ben McGowan, said it was great to be able to come back to the community with the share offer after many missed out in 2020.

"This share offer was always a part of our long term plans but we know that many people have been waiting for a long time for the opportunity," he said.

"We have made significant progress, thanks to our first 280 shareholders. We've launched our energy sharing software, our flagship power storage project, the 'Yack01' community-scale battery, is now supplying

electricity every evening to our customers in Yackandandah Community Energy Hub and, with our community partners, we're currently delivering innovative projects that build energy resilience into bushfire affected communities

"We will use the funds raised through the offer to drive renewable energy-focused projects around the region and to

continue to improve our electricity retail offer," Mr McGowan said.

We are full of optimismfor the future."

The investment offer is being run via the crowd investment platform Birchal and Indigo Power is now accepting expressions of interest from potential investors via the platform up until June 6, 2022.

There is also authentic evidence from local historian, John Whitehead, who remembers the tree in the school yard at Towong which was used to mark the end of the very early races along the side of the road between Corryong and Towong before the present racecourse was laid out in 1923.

This tree was named Black Mag's Tree (pictured) and John has photographs which attest to its historical significance. A plaque at the site marks the 125th anniversary of the establishment of the Shire of Towong, which was unveiled by indigenous elder, Eddie Kneebone, in

In 1882 the first Hume Plate was won by John Whitehead's grandfather's horse, Wabba. Sadly, this speedy galloper was burnt to death in a stable fire the following year.

More recently, in 1970, the president of the Towong Turf Club, Tom Waters, reported that the club had enjoyed a very successful year with a capacity field of 12 horses in the Cup. He added that Towong had been granted an extra day for the following year, making five meetings. This was something of a coup, because of 28 extra days applied for in Victoria, only five were granted.

Now there is a rule that no more than 10 horses can make up a field at Towong and the committee fought tooth and nail to retain just two meetings until the second one was axed several years ago.

"What a shame it is that small country race clubs like Towong are no longer encouraged to conduct multiple meetings

a year, when they are such popular and important community events," Dixie observed.

people still Many remember the hugely successful Centenary Gold Cup meeting of 1971, when a crowd of more than 2,500 cheered on the local horse, Moab, to win the Cup. The the course was swarming with visiting dignitaries and at least one Rolls Royce wa sighted in the car park!

Later that night the Tooma Hall rocked with 600 dancers at the Aftermath Ball. The entrance fee was "seven bucks a stallion and fillies free agistment".

Stories such as these are what brings a book to life and Honor and Dixie are keen to include as many such poignant, interesting and humorous details from the past as possible.

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
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Snowy drives safety message home


"The Snowy Hydro Young Driver Program delivers learning exercises and activities that give our local kids the skills and knowledge to help keep them safe on our unique and at times, challenging, mountain roads," Mr Broad said.

"These young and inexperienced drivers gain so much from the program - it's really valuable and we at Snowy Hydro are proud to play a part in ensuring greater safety on the roads where we live and work."

The program covered topics such as correct seating position and the importance of understanding the difference between vehicles with anti-lock brake systems (ABS) and vehicles without ABS.

Students were taught when to fit snow chains on their vehicles while travelling in snow and ice conditions. They were also shown the correct way to use and fit snow chains on a vehicle.

The activities and exercises provided useful and practical knowledge to assist the students when behind the wheel. Topics included driver attitudes and the effects of distractions when driving

Other practical skills were also discussed including how to understand correct and incorrect tyre pressure on their vehicles.
