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New deadline brings mixed response

The decision by the Victorian government to bring forward the end of native forest logging to January 2024 has to the start of next year

been met with differing reactions.

The end date will be accelerated from 2030 through an additional \$200 million of measures announced in Tuesday's state budget.

President of Forestry Australia, Dr Michelle Freeman, said are dismayed by the announcement to stop native forest harvesting in Victoria at the end of the year, highlighting that the government has failed all Victorians in making this decision.

government's "The decision is flawed and rather than being based on science, it is a decision motivated by ideology only and a big step backwards for sustainability.

"There are very few production systems on the globe that offer stronger sustainability credentials than well managed native forests. In fact, we know that well managed native forests can actually provide superior biodiversity, fire and climate outcomes.

"Simply excluding harvesting from native forests does not guarantee biological diversity, particularly from the broader threats of wildfires, invasive species

climate change. Closing the native forest timber industry in Victoria will constrain the silvicultural and management options

for state forests. "We acknowledge that this decision disproportionately impact on the mental health, wellbeing and economies of regional communities that depend on this sector," Dr Freeman added.

Deputy Leader of The Nationals and Shadow Minister for Agriculture, Emma Kealy, said "The Andrews government has signed the final death warrant for Victoria's sustainable native timber industry and entire communities in the state's

"Despite promising a staged transition through to 2030, the brutal state budget confirms the industry will shut down totally on 1 January, 2024.

"The native timber industry represents a large segment of the state's overall timber industry, creating 2500 jobs and generating more than \$770 million in revenue each

"Labor's decision to fast-track its demise means that communities are being punished by government incompetence.

"In late 2019, the government promised a phased transition to a plantation-based supply, with the government now abandoning their plan.

"The government's decision is based on politics, not science or fact.

"Daniel Andrews and Labor are punishing regional communities to advance a radical green agenda that panders to inner-city Greens voters," Ms Kealy

On the other side of the coin, the Victorian National Parks Association (VNPA) said "After decades of campaigning to protect Victoria's native forests from state-funded native forest logging, we're elated to hear the Victorian government show leadership on this issue," said Executive Director, Matt Ruchel.

Power project marks another milestone

Despite recent news about time and cost blowouts, the Snowy 2.0 pumped-hydro mega project has achieved another important construction milestone, with a second tunnel excavation completed at Lobs Hole

The 2.93-kilometre emergency, cable and ventilation tunnel (ECVT) has been excavated and fully lined with 13,140 locally-manufactured concrete segments by tunnel boring machine (TBM) Kirsten.

This achievement follows the excavation of the adjacent main access tunnel (MAT), which was completed in October 2022.

Snowy Hydro CEO, Dennis Barnes, said Snowy 2.0 was continuing to make solid progress with around six kilometres of tunnelling by TBMs completed and drill and blast excavation of the power station cavern about to start.

"We are extremely pleased the ECVT excavation has been completed and the whole project team is excited to be moving into the next critical phase of construction," Mr Barnes said.

"Our huge power station cavern will be located about 800 metres underground and will be one of the largest and deepest in the world.

"We are also using drill and blast methods to construct cross passages linking the ECVT with the MAT.

"Meanwhile TBM Kirsten, which is setting a global standard in TBM technology, is being modified to carry out another very specific task - to excavate the inclined pressure shaft and line it with specially-designed and locally manufactured concrete segments.

"The shaft is 1.45km long and excavating a segment lined tunnel of this length at a very steep 47 per cent incline using an 11-metre diameter TBM is without precedent internationally," Mr Barnes added.

Modifications to Kirsten include altering the levels of the TBM's tanks and mechanical equipment so they remain horizontal when travelling up the incline, and converting the walkways into steps and ladderways.

Also being installed is a screw conveyor to extract excavated rock from the cutterhead to a sandwich conveyor system with face-to-face rubber belts that help constrain the crushed rock so that it can be transported down the steep slope without spillage.

Additional plant and equipment will also be installed in the ECVT tunnel to support the excavation activities including; an overhead crane, a conveyor transfer station, monorail manrider for personnel access and rack and pinion mechanism for plant access to the TBM.

The milestone has been offset by one of the TBM's being stuck underground since December 2022.

Mr Barnes has acknowledged that TBM Florence may be stuck for "weeks or months" longer.

He said significant efforts were being made to extricate the 2,000-tonne machine, which triggered a sinkhole when it struck

Sponsors sought for upcoming expo

An event designed to educate and assist small rural communities in North East Victoria to better deal with emergencies will be held in Corryong in October this year.

North

Emergency Expo is a biennial event that was originally created by a VICSES volunteer to show communities what information and resources are available to them before, during and after emergencies and to help them build resilience.

emergency services community day was developed after the volunteer identified the need for more information for rural communities who sometimes had no idea what was in their own backyard.

It was originally run by the SES until June 2020 when it changed hands to the North East Emergency Action Group Incorporated (NEEAG), a not-for-profit charity that

was created to maintain the running of the expos.

Initially, the first two expos only allowed rural communities with populations under 1,000 to host the event, however after public feedback this was altered to under 5,000 in 2020.

The expo goals are:-

- To show Corryong residents what information and resources are available to them throughout the North East and surrounds that could assist them with the preparation, response and recovery of emergencies;
- To be able to use this information and/or resources to assist them to build resilience and coping mechanisms for all past, present and future

- · To raise vital funds for the community to use for any emergency related projects and/or services within the community:
- · For locals to see the day set up for emergencies where they can get present information about emergencies that can aid their daily lives.
- opportunities for locals and those abroad with knowledge on where they can get information emergency related equipment; and
- Have visual displays on what services are available to them.

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Sought after genetics pump up price

A South Australian bull created a bidding frenzy in the sale barn at the recent 58th Herefords Australia National Sale to sell for the top price of \$75,000.

Held at the Wodonga Exhibition Centre, the sale was southern Australia's single biggest multi-vendor British bred offering with 53 vendors from NSW, Victoria, South Australia and Tasmania.

Drawing 149 registered buyers, the sale resulted in a total of 121 bulls selling under the hammer from the 160 offered for a clearance of 75 per cent, a top price of \$75,000, an average of \$11,917 and gross of \$1,442,000.

Celebrating 96 years of performance breeding, Ian and Anne Galloway, Cootharaba Herefords, Roma, Queensland, outbid a New England syndicate to secure Lot 55 Wild Bear Stranger S007 (AI) (H) for \$75,000.

The 22-month-old bull was offered by Ben and Katelin Davies, Wild Bear Herefords, Paris Creek, SA, and was a homebred bull by Wild Bear Powerhouse P010 and out of Wild Bear Angeline N005

Stranger weighed 856kgs, had a raw scan of 124square cms on the eye muscle area, 19mms of fat on the rump, 10mm on the rib and a scrotal circumference of 42cms.

Ian Galloway said the bull fitted the Cootharaba program as an outcross bloodline coupled with his thickness, muscle, skin type and eye pigment.



A local breeder paid \$28,000 for this 27-month-old bull.

He spotted Stranger in the ring the day before, liking his figures for eye muscle area and gestation length and the fact his grandsire, Glendan Park Empire E002, was purchased by Cootharaba in the past.

"We have been breeding stud cattle for just over 10 years now. It is my passion and it is very rewarding to have a day like this come along," Mr Davies said.

James and Melinda Higgins, Curracabark Herefords, Gloucester, NSW, returned to the sale after many years break to outlay \$60,000 for the second top price bull - Lot 163, Mawarra Valley S198 (AI) (PP), offered by the Sykes family, Mawarra Genetics, Longford, Victoria.

Sired by Sugarloaf Nowra N124, the bull ranked top three per cent for carcase weight at +75kgs, top one per cent for retail beef yield at +2.6 and top five per cent for 600-day weight.

Lot 195, a 27-month-

old bull Vice Admiral, weighing 1024kgs, was bought online by Andrew and Serena Klippel, Sugarloaf Creek Herefords at Towong for \$28,000.

Trovatello, said the sale
was well supported by
commercial producers
and buoyed by strong
seedstock support.

"We did expect a drop in clearance given the extra number of bulls," he said.

"We normally sell 105 bulls and this year we had 195 entered with 160 offered on the day.

"With the 75 per cent clearance the average is down but it is relative to the 2023 weaner steer prices of \$1500 as opposed to \$2300 last year.

"The average and clearance this year was expected as we sold 121 compared to last year 108 with a good spread of buyers from Queensland to South Australia and Tasmania.

"Repeat buyers from the Victorian high country and western Victoria were also active.

Selling agents were Elders and Nutrien Ag Solutions with the sale interfaced with AuctionsPlus.

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Report calls for council demerger

A University of Newcastle independent business case on the possible de-amalgamation of Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) has recommended that this should be done as soon as possible.

Report author and project lead, Professor Joseph Drew, consulted with representatives of key stakeholder groups, councillors and council in staff in mid-February 2023 and then returned to the region to share his draft

findings at community forums held in April.

The university team of three professors was tasked with the job of providing an evidence brief regarding the advantages and disadvantages of pursuing a de-amalgamation.

Their final report said that econometric evidence clearly demonstrates that there is no good reason to believe that significant economies of scale were ever possible for rural

y local governments.

"Econometric evidence is also at odds with the assumption that small local governments can't be financially sustainable. Indeed, our robust work indicates the opposite," it continued.

The report also found that efficiency has reduced since amalgamation.

"The choice is not an easy one, and either way the council will face some imposing challenges in the near future," Professor

Drew said in the report.

"It is the firm belief of the three internationally recognised professors who co-authored this report that the balance of evidence suggests that Snowy Valleys Council should be de-amalgamated

as quickly as possible.

"The empirical evidence is extremely compelling. Moreover, the continued risk posed to the mental and physical wellbeing of staff, representatives, and

the community - arising from the unsuitable configuration of the local government area - demands urgent redress.

The final report can be viewed online at council's website at www.svc.nsw. gov.au/deamalgamation-consideration.

Council will consider the report at its next ordinary meeting scheduled for 22 June, 2023.
