Haines increases margin

Although the poll will not be officially declared for up to two weeks, the sitting member for Indi, Helen Haines, will retain the seat with an increased majority after Saturday's federal election.

As at yesterday, on a two party preferred basis, Dr Haines attracted 48,751 votes (58.7 per cent) against 34,301 (41.3 per cent) recorded for the Liberal candidate, Ross Lyman. This was a surprisingly high 7.1 per cent swing for the incumbent.

The first preference tallies for the major candidates were:- Helen Haines (Independent) 34,019 (+8.61 per cent swing); Ross Lyman

(Liberal) 25,780 (-4.05 per cent); David Nadia (Labor) 7008 (-3.65 per cent); Beth Stevens (Pauline Hanson's One Nation) 4368 (+5.26 per cent - 1st time candidate); Liz Fisher (Nationals) 3230 (-5.56 per cent).

Interestingly, Dr Haines did not fare as well at the polling centres in the Upper Murray with Mr Lyman topping the first preference votes at two of the three booths and the One Nation candidate, Beth Stevens, also polled strongly.

Lyman 47, Stevens 16
Dr Haines has thanked the electorate for placing its trust in her for another three years.

"It is a huge responsibility, one which I am proud and grateful to have," she said.

"I look forward to fighting for all of you, for integrity in politics, for action on climate change, for health care in our region.

"All over Indi, people tell me how important it is to them that we have a robust federal integrity commission.

"It's what I fought for in the last parliament and what I will continue to fight for in this parliament. The incoming government promised to deliver a federal integrity commission by Christmas.

"If they are going to deliver this in just six months, my bill is the best place to start. I've already spoken to Prime Minister Albanese about this and I look forward to ensuring this is done properly.

Recovery funding brings big projects

Parklands Albury Wodonga has been successful with two Upper Murray project proposals through the Border Trust's 'Big Give' this year.

The Cudgewa Mural Trail project aims to bring people together to create a new place connecting people and landscape.

Parklands will support the local community to collaborate in the design and installation of an arts trail along 2.3kms of the High Country Rail Trail from Cudgewa township to Wabba Creek.

Local artists will be invited to develop artworks, images and stories for a number of murals to be printed on steel signs and installed along the trail.

Ros McKenzie, president of the Man from Snowy River Tourist

Association (MFSRTA), believes the project will provide a boost to local business.

"It will create a new tourist attraction, at the same time displaying and promoting local talent and businesses impacted by the Black Summer bushfires" she said.

The second project will resource a Towong Recovery Ranger team to undertake landscape scale environmental works in the Upper Murray region.

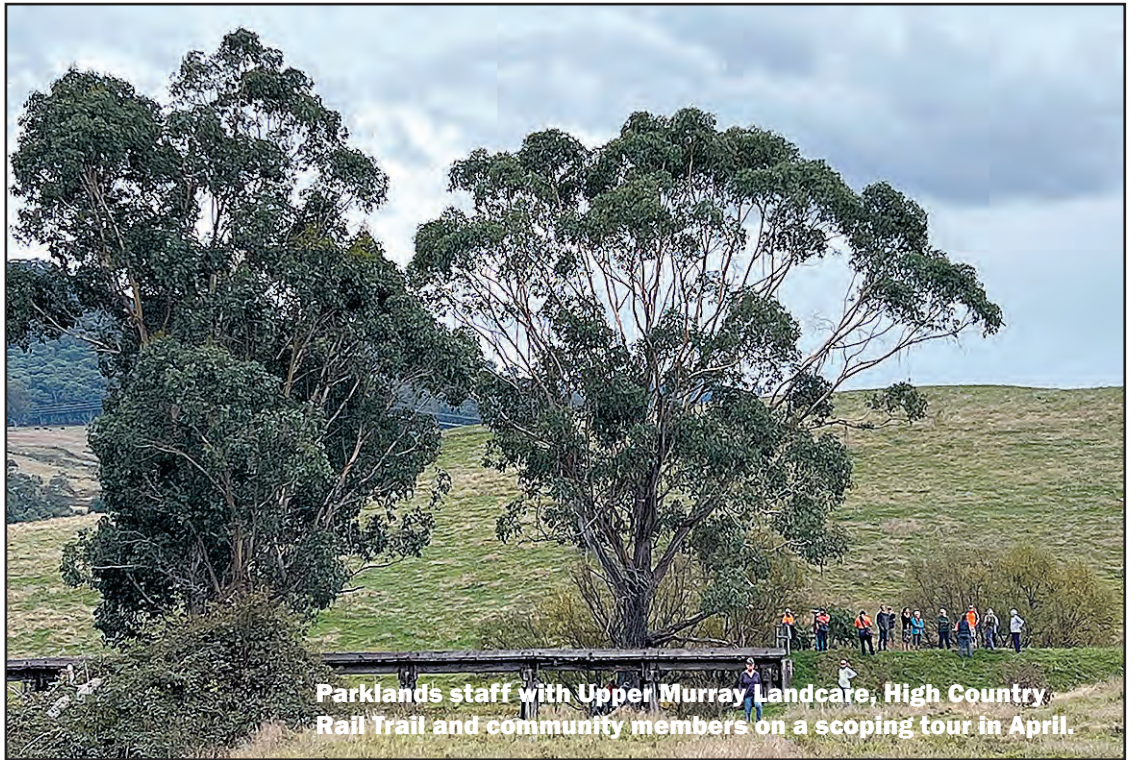
Lyn Coulston, secretary of the Upper Murray Landcare Network, welcomed Border Trust's support for the project.

"Helping hands will certainly be a mental boost as well as an incentive to get started with important environmental restoration works," she said.

Working with the Upper Murray Landcare Network, the team will tackle tasks such as weed control, fencing, and plantings in both public and private lands. The project will also provide opportunities for community participation, with plans for community planting days and establishing short walks to historic trestle bridges.

Both projects will be funded through the Towong Community Bushfire Disaster Relief Fund Grant Program, which has been established in response to the 2019/2020 bushfires which devastated the region.

Work begins on new bridge

Construction of a new Towong Bridge across the Murray River will start next month after the first stage of the project to remove the old structure was completed in early May.

The NSW and Victorian governments have provided \$10 million for the Towong Bridge replacement project which will provide the community with a safer, smoother and longer lasting new river crossing.

A Transport for NSW spokesperson said the bridge will provide the cross-border communities in the Towong area with a safer crossing for both motorists and pedestrians.

"This project involves removing a bridge which is at the end of its life and replacing it with a structure that provides the community with a safer and stronger bridge crossing for those needing reliable access to travel the region," the spokesperson said.

"The new bridge is designed to carry current and future traffic loads. It will provide a smoother

crossing for light and heavy vehicles and allow a safer crossing for pedestrians accessing the area with a walkway included in the design.

"It also means less ongoing maintenance and disruption to the community due to closures when the old bridge required repairs."

Yackandandah company, Nelmac Pty Ltd, was awarded the contract to construct the new bridge on behalf of Transport for NSW, with work scheduled to start on Thursday 2 June. Work is expected to be completed in mid-2023.

The new 58-metre-long concrete bridge will be built on the same alignment and incorporates two traffic lanes and a pedestrian walkway.

With removal of the old bridge already complete, the spokesperson said Transport for NSW recognised there would be some traffic disruption during Stage 2 of the project and appreciated the community's patience and understanding towards

achieving a new bridge with long-term benefits.

"We understand the impacts of the detours around the bridge and our team will work as quickly as possible to replace the crossing to minimise delays and any issues for the community," the spokesperson said.

Work will be carried out from 7am to 6pm weekdays and 8am to 1pm on Saturdays as required.

There will be no access to the site during the project. The size of the nearby campground has been reduced to accommodate the site compound.

Towong Road (NSW) and Towong Hill Road (Victoria) will be closed for the duration of the project.

Detours will be in place during work, with motorists advised to cross the Murray River via Bringenbrong Bridge to the south or Tintaldra Bridge to the north, adding about 20 minutes to journeys.

Mural project relies on local input

A new Mural Trail project aims to showcase the works of the local creative community along 2.3kms of the High Country Rail Trail, from Cudgewa township to Wabba Creek.

Funded by the Towong Community Bushfire Disaster Relief Fund Grant Program, the project brings opportunities for local talent to shine with up to ten murals to be printed onto steel signage and installed along the trail.

Project hosts Parklands Albury Wodonga worked with the Man from Snowy River Tourist Association to develop the proposal, recognising that local people in the creative arts industry have been severely impacted by the bushfires and the pandemic.

Key to the project is community co-design, with the first steps involving the formation of a Mural Trail Working Group and the employment of a local facilitator to generate community conversations on the design of the new trail.

Ant Packer, Parkland's Community Ranger, sees the project as a way to bring people together connecting people, art, nature and heritage.

"We see the creative spirit of the Upper Murray driving, designing and delivering these works," she said.

A planning bee for the project will be held on Sunday 5 June from 1pm to 3pm Meet at the Cudgewa railway shelter opposite Cudgewa Hotel to discuss locations for the mural trail, railway station sign and picnic tables within the large crown land area.

This planning session will also mark out locations for a Beetoomba railway station sign and historic trestle bridge trails. There will also be a Cudgewa Mural Trail Storytelling Gathering on Monday 20 June from 5pm to 6.30pm. Help create a new story for Cudgewa!

Join the project team around the table at Cudgewa Hotel to share ideas and finger food. Tell

your story or suggest what stories and artwork could be about for the Cudgewa Mural Trail.

Project Update

We've been working closely with community to deliver a more functional and vibrant Corryong CBD.

Maximising parking space and dedicated bike lanes were identified as key areas for further consideration during the initial consultation process in early 2021 and were also the focus of this phase of consultation.

Recent discussions with stakeholders and business owners, feedback through our survey and the 'Meet the Project Manager' sessions have shown strong community support for angled parking and for bike access to be supported through the widening of footpaths as opposed to a dedicated bike lane.

Other themes included:

- Lighting and power in the arcade to support events
- Additional street furniture
- Inclusion of motorbike parking
- Landscaping, trees and the management of planter boxes
- Finding alternatives to raised markers and slippery surfaces to address safety concerns

This feedback will be incorporated into the final plans over the coming months.

We anticipate these works will commence in late spring and will provide further advice on start dates in the months ahead.

Cafes go green with coffee

To celebrate the launch of a swap and go reusable coffee cup system in the Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) area anyone who signs up for the program will be shouted a free coffee at participating cafes next Wednesday.

The council has partnered with Green Caffeen to launch a 'swap and go' reusable coffee cup system that makes being eco-friendly a simple choice for coffee lovers.

Coffee drinkers simply sign up via the Green Caffeen app, purchase their drinks at participating cafes and return their empty cup to the same cafe or any other participating cafe once the coffee is consumed. They then grab a fresh cup the next time they order.

As long as the cup is returned within 30 days, it's completely free to use, just pay for the coffee. The scheme is also free for

participating cafes.

Thirteen local cafes across the Snowy Valleys have already opted in, with numbers continuing to grow.

Cafes using the system have the reusable cups in stock and wash the cups between uses, so there are clean, green, reusable cups always ready for coffees to go. The official program launch will take place at Simply Wholesome in Tumut on Wednesday 1 June.

Kitchen, Riverside Cafe, K&T's Cafe, Tumut River Brewing Co and the Coffee Pedaler.

They will all be serving free coffee to Green Caffeen app users during the launch.

Virtual fences rein in deer on roads

New deer fencing is proving successful in a joint program to reduce the risk to motorists in north east Victoria as part of a joint program between the Forest Fire Management Victoria (FFMVic) and Regional Roads Victoria (RRV).

Two new virtual fences - which have been installed along the Mount Buller Road, near Sawmill Settlement and The Great Alpine Road, near Harrierville - are activated by car headlights to deter deer and other native wildlife from crossing roads at night.

"We know deer and other native wildlife can cause a significant risk to motorists, so we are pleased that this trial project is proving successful," said David Pasztaleniec, FFMVic Hume Planning Manager - Invasive Species.

"The virtual fence is activated by car headlights, and the device emits an ultrasonic sound and flashes a blue light into the vegetation beside the road.

"The audible and visual disturbance deters deer and other wildlife from crossing the road, which

reduces the potential for collisions with vehicles," Mr Pasztaleniec said.

RRV Regional Director Hume, Steve Bowmaker, said "Our number one priority is the safety of the community, so we are pleased that this project is being carried out in two key locations where deer are known to frequent.

"The virtual fences run along a four kilometre stretch of both roads and were selected based on evidence from the community and stakeholders where deer are known to cross.

"Initial results show a decrease in reports of collisions between animals and vehicles at both locations" Mr Bowmaker said.

The project is being delivered by FFMVic, in partnership with RRV, and is funded through the Victorian Deer Control Strategy.

Grants maximise hunting benefits

The Victorian government is supporting innovative new projects to promote safe, responsible and sustainable hunting through a new grant program.

Minister for

Agriculture, Mary-Anne Thomas, has announced that grants are available through the \$5.3 million Sustainable Hunting Action Plan 2021-2024 (SHAP) to fund a range of activities, which will

maximise the benefits of hunting for the environment, economy, regional communities and hunters.

Eligible projects could include regional game food events, habitat

restoration, conservation projects, hunter education or research.

Individual grants of up to \$80,000 are now available to enhance game habitats, increase knowledge of game species and grow the industry.

"These grants will support projects that promote safe, responsible and sustainable hunting," Ms Thomas said.

"We're looking for opportunities to boost regional events, habitat restoration projects and education programs through this grant program.

"More than 55,000 licenced game hunters make a significant contribution to Victoria's economy through a range of hunting purchases including equipment, accommodation, meals and fuel.

"The government's Sustainable Hunting Action Plan supports licenced game hunters to increase the popularity of hunting, improve animal welfare, undertake research and increase the role of traditional owners in managing the land where hunting takes place," Ms Thomas added.

The Sustainable Hunting Grants are now open for applications until 24 June. Information is available from djpr.vic.gov.au/hunting-grants.
