Haines increases margin

Although the poll will not be officially declared for up to two weeks, the sitting member for Indi, Helen Haines, will retain the seat with an increased majority after Saturday's federal election.

As at yesterday, on a two party preferred basis, Dr Haines attracted 48,751 votes (58.7 per cent) against 34,301 (41.3 per cent) recorded for the Liberal candidate, Ross Lyman. This was a surprisingly high 7.1

(Liberal) 25,780 (-4.05 per cent); David Nadia (Labor) 7008 (-3.65 per cent); Beth Stevens (Pauline Hanson's One Nation) 4368 (+5.26 per cent - 1st time candidate); Liz Fisher (Nationals) 3230 (-5.56 per cent).

Interestingly, Dr Haines did not fare as well at the polling centres in the Upper Murray with Mr Lyman topping the first preference votes at two of the three booths and the One Nation candidate.

Lyman 47, Stevens 16 Dr Haines has thanked the electorate for placing its trust in her for another three years.

"It is a huge responsibility, one which I am proud and grateful to have," she said.

"I look forward to fighting for all of you, for integrity in politics, for action on climate change, for health care in our region.

Recovery funding brings big projects

Parklands Albury Wodonga has been successful with two Upper Murray project proposals through the Border Trust's 'Big Give' this year.

The Cudgewa Mural Trail project aims to bring people together to create a new place connecting people and landscape.

Parklands will support the local community to collaborate in the design and installation of an arts trail along 2.3kms of the High Country Rail Trail from Cudgewa township to Wabba Creek.

Local artists will be invited to develop artworks, images and stories for a number of murals to be printed on steel signs and installed along the trail.

Ros McKenzie, president of the Man from Snowy River Tourist Association (MFSRTA), believes the project will provide a boost to local business.

"It will create a new tourist attraction, at the same time displaying and promoting local talent and businesses impacted by the Black Summer bushfires" she said. The second project

will resource a Towong Recovery Ranger team to undertake landscape scale environmental works in the Upper Murray region. Lyn Coulston, secretary of the Upper Murray Landcare Network, welcomed Border Trust's

support for the project,. "Helping hands will certainly be a mental boost as well as an incentive to get started with important environmental restoration works," she said. Upper Murray Landcare Network, the team will tackle tasks such as weed control, fencing, and plantings in both public and private lands. The project will also provide opportunities for community participation, with plans for community planting days and establishing short walks to

Work begins on new bridge

Construction of a new Towong Bridge across the Murray River will start next month after the first stage of the project to remove the old structure was completed in early May.

The NSW and Victorian governments have provided \$10 million for the Towong Bridge replacement project which will provide the community with a safer, smoother and longer lasting new river crossing.

A Transport for NSW spokesperson said the bridge will provide the cross-border communities in the Towong area with a safer crossing for both motorists and pedestrians.

"This project involves removing a bridge which is at the end of its life and replacing it with a structure that provides the community with a safer and stronger bridge crossing for those needing reliable access to travel the region," the spokesperson said.

"The new bridge is designed to carry current and future traffic loads. It will provide a smoother crossing for light and heavy vehicles and allow a safer crossing for pedestrians accessing the area with a walkway included in the design.

"It also means less ongoing maintenance and disruption to the community due to closures when the old bridge required repairs."

Yackandandah company, Nelmac Pty Ltd, was awarded the contract to construct the new bridge on behalf of Transport for NSW, with work scheduled to start on Thursday 2 June. Work is expected to be completed in mid-2023.

The new 58-metrelong concrete bridge will be built on the same alignment and incorporates two traffic lanes and a pedestrian walkway.

With removal of the old bridge already complete, the spokesperson said Transport for NSW recognised there would be some traffic disruption during Stage 2 of the project and appreciated the community's patience and understanding towards achieving a new bridge with long-term benefits.

"We understand the impacts of the detours around the bridge and our team will work as quickly as possible to replace the crossing to minimise delays and any issues for the community," the spokesperson said.

Work will be carried out from 7am to 6pm weekdays and 8am to 1pm on Saturdays as required.

There will be no access to the site during the project. The size of the nearby campground has been reduced to accommodate the site compound.

Towong Road (NSW) and Towong Hill Road (Victoria) will be closed for the duration of the project.

Detours will be in place during work, with motorists advised to cross the Murray River via Bringenbrong Bridge to the south or Tintaldra Bridge to the north, adding about 20 minutes to journeys.

Funded by the Towong Community Bushfire Disaster Relief Fund Grant Program, the project brings opportunities for local talent to shine with up to ten murals to be printed onto steel signage and installed along the trail

Project hosts Parklands Albury Wodonga worked with the Man from Snowy River Tourist Association to develop the proposal, recognising that local people in the creative arts industry have been severely impacted by the bushfires and the pandemic.

Key to the project is community co-design, with the first steps involving the formation of a Mural Trail Working Group and the employment of a local facilitator to generate community conversations on the design of the new trail.

Mick Bogie's 'Reeds, Rushes and Weaving' installation on the Kiewa trail is an example of the proposed signage.

Ant Packer, Parkland's Community Ranger, sees the project as a way to bring people together connecting people, art, nature and heritage.

"We see the creative spirit of the Upper Murray driving, designing and delivering these works," she said.

A planning bee for the project will be held on Sunday 5 June from 1pm to 3pm Meet at the Cudgewa railway shelter opposite Cudgewa Hotel to discuss locations for the mural trail, railway station sign and picnic tables within the large crown land area.





Local cafes are gearing up for a reusable cup system.

Cafes go green with coffee

To celebrate the launch of a swap and go reusable coffee cup system in the Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) area anyone who signs up for the program will be shouted a free coffee at participating cafes next Wednesday.

The council has partnered with Green Caffeen to launch a 'swap and go' reusable coffee cup system that makes being eco-friendly a simple choice for coffee lovers.

Coffee drinkers simply signup via the Green Caffeen app, purchase their drinks at participating cafes and return their empty cup to the same cafe or any other participating cafe once the coffee is consumed. They then grab a fresh cup the next time they order.

As long as the cup is returned within 30 days, it's completely free to use, just pay for the coffee. The scheme is also free for participating cafes. Thirteen local cafes across the Snowy Valleys have already opted in, with numbers continuing

to grow. Cafes using the system have the reusable cups in stock and wash the cups between uses, so there are clean, green, reusable cups always ready for coffees to go. The official program launch will take place at Simply Wholesome in




