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The timber mill at Corryong will close by September year once the existing log stock is milled

It will be the end of an era for Walkers Sawmill after 87 years of operation under three generations of the family. Current owner, Graham

Walker, was in Corryong on Friday to announce the closure of the mill to its 21 employees.

In a Letter to the Editor (page 3), Mr Walkers said "It's the hardest decision I have ever made but it was the right decision for our employees.

"On April 20, I received a letter from Minister Gayle Tierney regarding our participation in the opt-out scheme to hand back our 2024 saw log license. The letter dated the 15th of April gave us 15 days to accept the offer and it was important for me to consider the long term employees who could receive the maximum redundancy from the Victorian government,

"If we were to continue business as usual, we had no certainty of saw log quantity from VicForests as they are still embroiled in battle with 'Friends of the Forest' and court injunctions and they had only guaranteed 55% of our 19,000m3 allocation "Should I have chosen

"Should I have chosen this path to continue, the employees would only get their entitlements from our company once June 2024 came and log supplies had dried up."

Mr Walker laid the blame for the mill closure squarely at the feet of the Victorian government.

"The decision to end native forest logging is ripping small communities like Corryong apart," he said.

"Our business has been supporting wages since 1965 and the flow-on effect to all our suppliers will be felt heavily as over \$4.5-5m per year was going into the economy and supporting other businesses."

Towong mayor, Cr Andrew Whitehead, said that because of Corryong's low population and remoteness the loss of a job there had a far greater impact than in larger towns and cities.

"It would be the eqivalent of six to eight jobs being scrapped in Albury Wodonga," he said.

"The state government's changing of the ability for them (Walkers) to source their hardwood logs was going to make it hard for them to keep going.

"It will be important to find new roles for the workers beacuse a lot of them have lived in Corryong for their whole lives."

Mr Walker said he hoped that another use could be made of the mill site after he had invested a significant amount of money in solar power in 2019.

The mill's key pallet contract ends in June and remnant wood is expected to be processed by September.



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# Bridge works move to final stages



The Towong Bridge project recently reached a significant milestone iwhen the five deck slabs on the new structure were poured, providing a concrete surface across the full length of the bridge.

Transport for NSW's construction of the new Towong Bridge over the River started

on 2 June, 2022 and is progressing towards completion in mid-2023.

The project team has started work on the kerbs down each side of the bridge, to which the steel crash rails will be attached.

A two-metre wide shared pathway along one side of the bridge is also included in the next stage of work. This feature will add to the community's connectivity between the campground on the New South Wales side and Towong in Victoria.

Remediation of the campground area and finishing the approach roads to the bridge on both sides of the border will be included in the final stages of the project which is expected to be completed in late June/early July 2023, weather permitting.

Work on the approach roads will require changes to pedestrian access around the work zone while this part of the project is carried out. Signage will be in place advising of these changes.

#### Emergency response times improving

Paramedics responding faster on average to the most ill people seriously in the Hume Region, incorporating the Towong

Shire, after record demand for ambulances eased between January and March this year.

Ambulance Victoria Hume Regional Director, Narelle Capp, ambulance performance thanks to improved reduced demand and fewer staff furloughed due to Covid-19.

"January to March saw ambulances called to 92,413 Code 1 cases across Victoria, which provided some welcome relief to our hard-working paramedics who faced rising demand during the pandemic," Ms Capp said.

"That's 7,825 or 7.8 per cent fewer 'lights and sirens' cases compared to the previous quarter which was the busiest in our history with more than 100,000 cases.

"We thank community for helping us relieve pressure on our paramedics and the health system by saving Triple Zero (000) for emergencies."

Member for Benambra, Bill Tilley, said "I take some comfort from the fact that ambulance response times have come down from the previous quarter - a bit over two minutes for Indigo Shire and more than three minutes for Towong.

"However, I take no joy from the fact Towong continues to have the poorest response times in the state, the wait on average still being almost 27 minutes and Indigo remains in the bottom 10.

"The elephant in the room in all of this is Wodonga.

"Ambulances Chiltern, Beechworth, Tallangatta and even as far away as Corryong are being dragged into Wodonga to meet the demand from Triple-0 calls and to support those ambulances sitting at Emergency at either Albury or Wodonga waiting for a bed for their patient."

"Wodonga has just two ambulances on deck for the majority of the day and it's proving to be not enough.

"A peak period shift added to that would help reduce the demand on these rural ambos," Mr Tilley added.

"I want to work with the Minister and will again seek to speak with her directly about the potential for another ambulance and perhaps some localised rostering that might be better suited to our region."

In the Hume Region, performance against the 15-minute target improved in Towong, Mansfield, Strathbogie, Indigo, Wangaratta. Moira. Benalla, Wodonga. Mitchell, Murrindindi and Greater Shepparton Local Government Areas (LGAs).

Ms Capp said along with reduced demand, a drop in staff furloughed due to Covid-19 at Ambulance Victoria and across the entire health system, made a real difference.

"This helped speed up the handover of patients at hospitals and allowed to us get back on the road quicker to attend more lifethreating emergencies," Ms Capp said.



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# Snowy review brings a reset

Snowy Hydro is working towards resetting the delivery timeline and budget for the Snowy 2.0 project with its principal contractor, Future Generation Joint Venture (FGJV), as part of an ongoing project review.

"The reset will ensure this critically important clean energy infrastructure project is placed on a robust and sustainable footing for FGJV to progress the schedule in a realistic and productive manner," Snowy Hydro CEO, Dennis Barnes, said.

While significant progress has been achieved, there are delays to the project's schedule and likely cost impacts beyond the contingency allowed, which remain under review.

There are four broad factors contributing to schedule delays and likely

cost increases:-

- the mobilisation and resourcing implications of the Covid-19 pandemic;
- the effect of global supply chain disruption and inflation impacting the cost and availability of a skilled workforce, materials and shipping;
- a number of design elements requiring more time to complete due to their technically complex nature, with the final design now being more expensive to construct; and

• the impact of variable site and geological conditions, with the most impactful being the soft ground encountered that is delaying tunnel boring machine (TBM) Florence's progress at Tantangara.

Snowy Hydro anticipates that the timeline for full commercial



operation is delayed by a further 12 to 24 months from the current publicly released dates of the first power being supplied from June 2027 to December 2027 (now June 2028 to December 2028) and the commercial operation of

all units from December 2028 (now December 2029).

"Since joining Snowy Hydro earlier this year I have focused on ensuring our major projects are placed on a realistic and sustainable footing, while maintaining construction progress," Mr Barnes said.

"I am committed to being transparent about our progress and how we are proactively managing the inevitable issues and challenges that arise in a complex project like this."

### Closing town's mill is best course of action

I came to Corryong last Friday to announce to the employees that our sawmill will close once the existing log stock is milled.

The gloomy sky over our log stack showed how I was feeling as I delivered the bad news.

It was the hardest decision I have ever made but it was the right decision for our employees and the dark sky mirrored the sombre mood of the staff.

On April 20, I received a letter from Minister Gayle Tierney regarding our participation in the opt-out scheme to hand back our 2024 sawlog license. The letter, dated the 15th of April, gave us 15 days to accept the offer and it was important for me to consider the long term employees who could receive the maximum redundancy from the Victorian government, have indicated

that each employee will receive four weeks pay for every year of service. (We still have not seen this in writing but it has been widely reported).

If we were to continue business as usual, we had no certainty of sawlog quantity from VicForests as they are still embroiled in battle with 'Friends of the Forest' and court injunctions and they had only guaranteed 55 per cent of our 19,000m<sup>3</sup> allocation.

Should I have chosen this path to continue, the employees would only get their entitlements from our company once June 2024 came and log supplies had dried up.

The decision to end native forest logging is ripping small communities like Corryong apart and our business has been supporting wages since 1965. The flow-on affect to all our suppliers will

be felt heavily as over \$4.5-5m per year was going into the economy and supporting other businesses.

When I invested in our solar system in 2019, I believed I was investing in a sustainable future using renewable energy only to find that four years later our existence was terminated by a weak and uninformed government.

For Walkers Sawmill it's an end of an era of some 87 years and three generations in our family. Dad (Max) would be doing somersaults in his grave if he knew that Labor and the Greens had destroyed the industry that had engulfed his life of 96 years.

To the townsfolk of Corryong and surrounding districts, I sincerely apologise for my decision to close the mill. I can't imagine what the effect will be when the loss of wages spent in town takes

er effect.

The sawmill has employed hundreds of workers over the years and I remember the early days of when farmers were employed to support their incomes.

Some of the names synonymous with the sawmill that I remember are the Stockwells, McNamaras, Mildens, Sheas, Smith, Nankervis, Cox, Dumbrell, De Witt, Whitehead, Mangelsdorf, Green, Faci, Fulford and Williams.

We've have had three generations of Williams and at least six Cranes from the one family, as well as Wilkinsons involved in our logging. Many friendships have been forged over the years.

Supplying quality hardwood pallets to the same customer for 58 years is a record to be proud of.

My other concern is

where the local builders and farmers will source their hardwood for renovations or the Towong Shire for their needs to repair bridges etc.

To all our past and current employees, I thank you for your service and commitment to Spot Pallet Supplies and Walkers Sawmill.

To those people who voted Labor and Greens, I hope you truly realise what damage you have done to these small communities and the businesses that have put food on the table for so many.

We need more education in schools starting from kindergarten, teaching kids that native forestry is sustainable and that cutting down trees is the right way to manage forests - they are invigorated and thrive after a logging coupe has been regenerated.

# Former sailor made an impact

week's Day service brought back memories Boyformer Corryong 'Choc' Scout, Maurice Thompson, of meeting local identity, Dave Christie, following WWII.

The war was over and we of the carefree Corryong Scout group decided to take on the challenge of hiking to Geehi. Our understanding of this exercise naturally entailed camping for two or three nights, so pup tents and sleeping gear were a significant part of what we carried on our backs.

We had arranged to have our local cream truck driver give us all a lift to Khancoban Valley's end, which he willingly did on a Saturday morning. Although it was later in the day than we had planned, we set off to join the trail but first, we had to go through a set of slip-rails from the farm of Mr Herb Barlee and from there on, follow the well-used bush trail.

We were a very enthusiastic bunch of lads as we stepped out at a walking pace in single file but our calculations indicated that we would have to camp somewhere about halfway to our destination. As the sun was going down, we pulled to a halt to set up camp. Naturally, we selected the most open ground for our tents and cooking fires and that position was perfectly in the middle of the track.

Those who had jokes or stories to tell found willing listeners as they squatted on the hard ground but they were also the first to feel the earth vibrating through their boots. That feeling led to startled looks all around as one scout mentioned an earthquake. Shortly after this, there was a loud pounding sound which seemed to be coming from the direction of Geehi and getting closer.

The latter became the signal for everyone to take cover and this they did. Some sought protection behind rocks but the majority hastily made their way up trees.

A long line of enormous packhorses, carrying empty pack bags,

charged into the firelight as though they had no respect for anything. Tents were knocked over and campfires were almost entirely extinguished, leaving the campsite in a complete mess.

We set to work straightening everything up and had everything looking reasonable when suddenly there was the sound of something more approaching through the bush. Everyone went for cover again.

Those up the trees had a splendid view of what amazed us. Just a single large horse with a rider in the saddle. That rider had a hat on, his whip over his shoulder and his chin almost touching his chest. He looked neither to the left nor right as his horse marched smartly through the middle of our camp.

Everyone who had sought safety in the trees had a very good view of the rider and all of them agreed that the person on the horse was sound asleep! Only a few had some idea of who that person was.

His name was Dave Christie and he was about the same age as myself but not quite so lucky. He was from a broken family and he, with his older sister. had been hired to work at Khancoban Station, where there were plans to train some of their own thoroughbred horses on a private training track. Unfortunately, that plan fell through.

Dave's sister married Gordon Mcallum and Dave found work further up the valley with the pack teams. I believe that on the day that we encountered him he had loaded up and taken a large consignment of building materials to Geehi very early in the

The rest of the day had been spent using the largest of the horses to dredge rocks out of the river for building. As he had to feed himself, I was told it was usually rabbits or fish.

It is believed that Dave, prior to his moving from the East Malvern area in Melbourne to Corryong, had been a top student and military cadet at Caulfield Technical College.

It is understandable that after moving to Tallangatta, he enlisted in the Albury Citizens Military 8/13th Armoured Division.

A year later, at the age of 17, he enlisted in the Australian Navy and within a short time, was seeing active service in Korea on a destrover. He had been found to be a well-respected and very handy marksman.

The next ship that he was assigned to was a frigate named Shoalhaven). The crew believed they were going to Korea but on the way, they were turned into the Indian Ocean and headed for Montebello., most beautiful archipelago and Australia's jewel in the Indian Ocean.

It was later found the British had applied to the government Canadian for the use of their far north frozen region for testing their first atomic bomb. Australia's Prime Minister, Robert Menzies, was swift to volunteer Australia to test all of Britain's nuclear weapons. There appeared to be no reservations made.

The nuclear bomb was mounted in an old British frigate, HMS Magpie, which was anchored among the islands.

"Most of the crews of both the Shoalhaven and Murchison were out on the upper deck, very scantily dressed in underwear or shorts and it was believed that any fallout from the bomb would be swept by prevailing winds to the far south," Dave recalled.

"We were anchored directly North.

"We all turned our backs when ordered to and then within several minutes the 'all clear' was given. That is when all that black ash started raining down on us.

At first, it was thought that the ash was from our own chimney but we soon realised it was most certainly not the case. Our boilers were not working.

"We had never been advised of the danger we face from nuclear fallout." Dave said.

# An open letter to Treasurer Jim Chalmers regarding the Budget

Dear Dr Chalmers,

There's a crisis in our country you can fix in your first budget, at no extra cost.

With the stroke of a pen you could help secure the future of critical regional news services, using money already allocated in the budget.

All you need to do is allocate a fairer percentage of the federal government's advertising budget to local and regional news services, rather than spending almost all of it with corporate capital city media and foreign-owned digital platforms (which don't produce any content or employ any journalists).

This can be achieved by simply adopting the Victorian Govt policy that mandates a weekly full page government advertisement in every regional and community paper.

Local and regional newspapers connect more than 80% of the country, but they get almost 0% of the government advertising spend.

In an era where false news spreads faster on social media than the truth does, trusted local news services reach more regional Australians than any other medium.

And unlike other media, every government dollar spent with a local newspaper is also an investment in regional journalism jobs.

This shouldn't be controversial.

A recent parliamentary inquiry recommended that a minimum of 20% of government print advertising should be placed with regional news services. A recent study conducted by Deakin University recommended the same thing. In fact, the Minister for Communications, Michelle Rowland, has been advocating for more regional newspaper advertising for many years.

We know there may be bigger budget issues, but this small policy change would be a simple and fair solution to a growing problem for regional Australia.

A policy that ensures weekly federal government advertising is placed in regional newspapers would be great news for the country.

And it won't cost you a cent.
