The race is on to ensure the Corryong football ground is available to host the round 4 clash between Corryong and Bullfish on May 18th. The Demons have played away in the first three rounds to allow the oval time to recover from the effects of the Man From Snowy River Bush Festival in mid-April. The league is confident that the oval will be ready for play next week and forecast rain over the next few days will only help the cause.

Message delivered at public hearing

A federal government review has heard that poor telecommunications in regional communities can jeopardise lives and impact on people's livelihoods.

Federal Member for Indi, Helen Haines, hosted the Regional Telecommunications Review in Benalla last Friday

which was attended by more than 50 people, many of whom spoke about the challenges they face.

The review is held every three years to investigate equitable access to telecommunications services across regional, rural and remote Australia.

"This was an opportunity for people

across Indi to tell the federal government directly about the challenges they face because of poor phone and internet services - and they face real challenges," Dr Haines said.

Many locals said they were fed up with having to head outside to answer the phone because of poor reception, even though they live in the middle of a major regional town.

A farmer from Tarrawangee expressed frustration that he can't make the most of the latest agricultural technologies to monitor his crops and livestock because of poor and unreliable internet.

A couple from Earlston

detailed how inconsistent phone coverage is impacting the ability of the local community, including the CFA, to communicate during emergencies.

Dr Haines said that these stories and many others show that good regional telecommunications are essential for our safety and our livelihoods.

"Poor telecommunications are a barrier to prosperity and create significant challenges for our communities in times of emergency," Dr Haines said.

"The federal government has a

responsibility to ensure regional communities have access to stable, affordable, high-speed telecommunications.

"One message I heard loud and clear was the need for more generators and batteries to provide backup to mobile phone towers when the power goes out."

The review committee will present its final report to the Minister for Communications, Michelle Rowland, later this year.


Volunteers rewarded

Dr Haines said that 20 volunteer groups in Indi had been awarded a share of \$66,225 in the grants funding.
Locally, three groups have been successful in obtaining funding:-
• Corryong FoodShare Services - \$5000 for Fuel Vouchers
• Corryong and Upper Murray Agricultural and Pastoral Show Society - \$4948 to purchase small tech equipment and office supplies
• Cudgewa Football Netball Club - \$3545 for responsible service of alcohol and food safety

All applicants were assessed by a panel of community leaders and the successful applications were recommended to the government for funding.
Each successful group received a personal phone call from Dr Haines to share the good news.
"There are so many extraordinary volunteers across Indi who work tirelessly to make their communities safe, vibrant and fun places to live," she said.
"These grants will go a long way in assisting volunteers to continue their vital work in supporting

Funding row puts lives at risk

Rural Councils Victoria (RCV) is calling on the state and federal governments to work together to ensure rural and regional roads are safe for passenger and freight vehicles.

The call comes following news reports that the federal government is considering massive cuts in its funding model for "nationally significant" roads.

It wants to introduce a funding model for those road projects that is a 50:50 federal/state contribution, down from 80 per cent paid by the federal government in recent years, leaving the cash-strapped state to fill the gap.

"Rural Victorians shouldn't pay the price for governments fighting," said RCV chair, Cr Mary-Ann Brown.

"RCV calls on both state and federal governments to work together to find solutions to this problem.

"We don't care how government works out the funding - we care about maintaining critical infrastructure that keeps our state moving.

"As it stands now there is not enough money coming from either government to adequately maintain roads and ensure they are fit for future growth.

"We want to ensure that the potential billions of dollars in cuts don't have a flow-on effect for road maintenance across rural and regional Victoria.

"We all know that the state government is facing massive budget pressures and the decision, if followed through, would only make those pressures more intense.

"Following floods and other climate events across the state in recent years, rural and regional roads are in a shocking condition.

"If the federal funding model means that the state has to put more into

particular road projects, we are concerned that those funds will come from essential maintenance and repairs in rural and regional areas.

"Lives and livelihoods are at stake here," Cr Brown stressed.

"Despite our smaller population, more than half of all Victoria's road fatalities occur in rural and regional areas, making regional people more than four times more likely to die on their roads than those living in capital cities.

"In addition, rural and regional Victoria produces a third of the state's exports and the regional road network is the link holding these economies together.

"When rural road links break down, so do rural businesses, adding thousands of dollars in fleet maintenance and overheads.



Careless burnoffs could be costly

As fire restrictions ease around the state, EPA Victoria is warning landholders that what they toss into the flames while burning off this autumn could be costly for the environment and their hip pocket.

EPA Northeast Regional Manager, Ben Kneebone, says many waste items create toxic smoke and residue as they burn.

“Burning farm waste like silage wrap, old tyres and chemical drums sends smoke and other residue into the atmosphere, waterways and soil,” Mr Kneebone said.

“Don’t let a routine burnoff turn into something that contaminates your land or neighbouring properties. Send any waste to an appropriately permitted facility.”

There’s a handy publication dealing with waste disposal and recycling on the EPA website at epa.vic.gov.au/about-epa/publications/iwrg641-1

If you are burning fallen trees or other natural wood, make sure they are as dry as possible to limit the volume of smoke and farmers should make sure they have any relevant council or CFA permits.

Timber from buildings, furniture or other manufactured products are not safe to burn because they have probably been chemically treated and would be considered waste.

EPA can fine offenders more than \$9,000 for burning anything other than vegetation-sourced matter like timber and crop stubble.

“Farmers understand how important a clean environment is to their livelihood and their community,” Mr Kneebone said.

“By thinking twice about what goes onto the pile when burning off, you can protect the environment from contamination of the soil, water and air around your farm and your neighbours,” he said.

“You can also protect yourself from a hefty fine, which EPA would consider if we find evidence on illegal matter getting burned.”

Wild dog program controls hybrid animals

The North East Wild Dog Action Group has been petitioning for wild dog control and 3km Livestock Protection Buffer (LPB) to continue as is (see image below).

The opposing argument by pro-dingo activists is debatable, with many believing the dingo is native to Australia and questions are being raised.

What is a dingo? What is a wild dog? What is a hybrid dog? And why is the wild dog control program important or not necessary at all? I write this article to convey our view on these topics of conversation.

Evidence supports the dingo came to Australia around 3,348 and 3,081 years ago, based on direct dating of dingo bones (<https://www.nature.com/articles/s41598-018-28324-x>) landing as a small gene pool. While they integrated quite well into the then ecosystem and aboriginal culture, they are not part of Australia's mammalian evolution and should not be considered a native species.

The 'dingo' value and responsibility of care to present day Traditional Owners is recognised but civilisation has played a major part in the current wild dog situation in Victoria. In comparison to other areas in Australia, this uniqueness and relevant environment should be acknowledged by all.

The term 'hybrid' is used to describe the evolution of the dogs. They are now an animal that continually cross breeds with any lost or stray dog that finds its way into the High and Low Country. The input of varied genetics appears to be increasing the overall hunting instinct, pack and lone dog behaviour, colour, size, and breeding cycle - with known whelpings of up to 10 pups at a time.

With Museum Victoria recently updating its classification of the 'dingo', from *Canis lupus* to *Canis familiaris*, it now

sits on par with other national advisory groups which support the claim the dingo is a domestic dog and should not be protected.

The state of Victoria had two wild dog control programs up for renewal on October 1, 2024 - both managed by the Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA). Recent dog status announcements plus previous long-standing studies, seemingly fell on deaf ears as the program in northwest Victoria was axed last month; a snap decision that has left many varied groups and individuals grappling with the future of wild dog management.

This decision significantly impacts the Victorian livestock industry and service providing agricultural businesses and directly influences the cross-border communities and control programs in New South Wales and South Australia. Is the government ready to wear this? It is not confirmed if the remaining control program in north east Victoria will continue beyond the renewal date, albeit there have been constant requests for answers sent and awaiting ministerial response.

The DEECA wild dog control program goes beyond assisting the responsibility of reducing the impact of a hybrid species; it is currently the only successful option for managing the balance of the dog population on public and private land throughout a highly urbanised and densely populated environment. Across the state of Victoria, there is roughly 4.7 million hectares of public land and the LPB zone operates on 1.6 million hectares, leaving 3.1 million hectares for dogs to freely roam on. Trained DEECA wild dog controllers work on as little as one per cent of the total LPB area and they are the only people allowed to control the number of dogs on public land, not farmers.

The true number of dogs in Victoria is unconfirmed. Simple estimates can be formed using the historic data from the control program and the last 10 years of data report 550-600 dogs are caught annually. One does wonder how many are out there if one per cent is returning caught dog numbers in the hundreds. At first glance the data represents a healthy population and highlights the program is sustainable.


Of all the strategies currently available to minimise conflict and biosecurity risk between dogs, agriculture, and wildlife, the control program is the single most important implement in the toolbox.

As dogs and many other introduced species such as feral cats, deer, and pigs, mostly reside on Public Land, we believe the responsibility of keeping the balance in check falls on the Victorian government. We call on Minister Spence and Minister Dimopoulos to conserve the remaining Wild Dog Management Zone and renew the wild dog control program's Livestock Protection Buffer for five years. We also emphasise the government's promises of firstly, consulting the communities that will be directly impacted and also to conduct a count of the wild dog population across Victoria.

The invitation still stands for a ministerial visit to the north east region.






