The crash occurred just a Mitsubishi Triton ute travelling south.

> Police are working on the theory that one of the vehicles crossed onto the

wrong side of the road but investigations are continuing.

Both vehicles came to rest down an embankment and the ute had its canopy ripped off by the impact of the collision.

Both drivers were taken to hospital by ambulance with the 48-year-old sole occupant of the ute later being airlifted to a Canberra hospital with

life-threatening injuries. The 72-year-old driver of the truck incurred minor injuries and was suffering from shock.

The road was closed although police were allowing local traffic through.

Opportunity knocks again for community shop

The committee of the Corryong Op Shop is very excited to let the Upper Murray community know that it will be returning to refurbished premises at 15 Hanson Street in the coming weeks.

"We would firstly like to take the time to thank all our loyal volunteers for putting in the hard (cold) yards to keep us operating at the old school site while the renos were happening," said committee member, Melissa Whitehead.

In 2019/20, the shop roof was replaced, kicking off what was to become a marathon effort of renovations and updates to the premises.

After the fires, the committee was able to tap into some of the bushfire funding on offer, to give the shop, what it thought at the time, would be a nice facelift.

This resulted in new solar panels on the roof and bigger plans being discussed

Thanks to funding from Emergency Recovery Victoria (ERV) and the generosity of Border Trust, Saputo Dairy Australia, Towong Shire, Corryong Men's Shed, Corryong Lions and WAW, close to a full renovation of the old shop was carried out.

The refurbishment has included a total gutting of the interior of the shop. All wall paneling, flooring and

cabinetry was removed, which showed the extent of years of water damage to the shop walls.

"This was a setback, as we needed to rethink how we could best afford to redo walls, hence the amazing stepped out vijay walls that builder Matt Webb suggested," Melissa explained.

"They look amazing!" Colours were then decided, painting done, new floors went in along with lighting and fans and all the old wiring was dealt

The shop was starting

to take shapeand looking the goods.

Next was cabinetry for the volunteers in the sorting room along with a new, functional kitchenette.

"Finally, we have been able to source some great new fittings for the shop, which has brought the interior project together nicely," Melissa added.

"With the back storeroom now fitted out as shop space for household goods, haberdashery, linen and containing a stand alone change room, the shop feels brand new."

Regular visitors will also wonder if the old couch will make an appearance in the shop.

"We have decided not to bring the old girl back, however you will find a lovely sitting area with nice chairs and a floor rug for those who would like to sit for a chat or to help cut rags," Melissa said.

The final stage of the renovation is to replace the verandah and install new signage.

"We have been working closely with Towong council and the streetscape crew and this stage of the

project will be tied in with those works when it is our turn," Melissa said.

The former school Op Shop will be officially closed from Wednesday 8th November while a return to the Hanson Street premises is completed.

The shop will re-open for business (after 10 long months) on Monday 13th November at 12.30pm.

It should be noted that donations will not be accepted until after the move is complete. Donations can only be deposited at the rear entrance to assist the volunteers.

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Obituary:- Robert John Salter

Super coach had a heart of gold

Robert John Salter popularly known as Bob or Salt - was born on April 4th, 1945.

He was born and raised on the Mitchell property at Towong Hill. His father Jack was the stud groomsman there as at that time the Mitchells had racehorses. Maybe this is where his fondness for the punt started!

His mother Dot also worked at the station maintaining the households with all her work being done by hand. She was known to be tough but fair.

Bob was a younger brother to Patsy. Patsy married Alex Hazelwinkle and they had two children Andrew and Jane. Corryong was a huge part of their childhood and 'Uncle Bobby' was always involved with them throughout their lives. They still call Corryong 'home'.

The family was at Towong Hill for 45 years and Bob lived there until his parents retired to Corryong, moving into his uncle Gordon Hamilton's house which was left to him.

Bob went to school at Corryong High and though he was a bit of a larrikin, he loved his time there. He had been expelled on one occasion but he was more afraid of his mother than the headmaster so he kept turning up to shool!

He made some great life long mates at school including Ian Whitsed, Colin Attree, Bob Bickett and Daryl Herrod.

He graduated from Form 5 with honours and even got 88 in History, much to the dislike of his teacher Mrs Gilbert who had kicked him out of her class. Bob wanted to prove her wrong and spent those classes studying in the ladies toilets!

After graduating, his father thought a job on the booming Snowy Scheme

would be the go. However, that was short-lived as he didn't see eye to eye with one of his supervisors.

He was then employed by Humes Pipes which opened up some great work opportunities for him and taught him many skills and a love of welding. There were many extremely qualified workers from around the world coming to the area because of the Snowy Scheme who shared their knowledge.

Bob worked at Humes for five years nearly to the day but left as the company was getting bigger and the work more dangerous.

After this he spent a bit of time with Weeds and Seeds this got him out and about

Bob throughout his late teens and early 20s found a love for fast cars. He got his license in his father's 1951 Chevy but nearly blew it up. He admitted he probably was a bit of a hoon!

He probably shouldn't have lived as long as he did as he had at least six crashes in his time, the worst being at the Khancoban Station corner where he rolled half a dozen times and landed in a culvert but the only damage was a dented radiator!

His mother didn't think he'd make his 21st but he proved her wrong.

The love of cars and driving fast was a feature throughout his life and also instigated his relationship with the local police who were forever trying to catch him for speeding.

Bob sold one of his cars to a mate, Owen 'Sniff' Bennetts, and on one afternoon the coppers thought they'd finally caught Bob only to find 'Sniff' in the driver's seat.

They exclaimed "We finally thought we had him because he generally takes off just before we get to the driver's window and

we can't catch him!"

Bob's next job was at the fruit fly inspection station on the Bringenbrong straight. He claimed it was an interesting job as you got to dress officially and you had the power to uphold the law.

The local coppers used to pass on by down to the river and Bob worked out they had set lines in, which were highly illegal.

So he pulled up his tie nice and firm and told the boss he was off to make an arrest! He thought it was only fair as they were always giving him a hard time. That job didn't last much longer!

One Saturday night Leo McCoy got into a bit of trouble with the copper, Leo took off in a hurry and the cop chased after him leaving his police hat and jacket behind. Bob, being the larrikin he was, decided to put the jacket and hat on and start pulling cars up in front of the Eldorado restaurant. He was was conducting 'random breath tests', the difference being if they hadn't been drinking he'd pull them over to the curb and say "It's a Saturday night, maybe you had better have a few." He had cars backed up past the fire station.

Bob then resumed employment on the Snowy Scheme where he got his first working number back - 38442. He spent 41 years there until his retirement.

He loved every minute of his time there. Former Chief Operating Officer, Ken Lister, said "Bob left the Snowy with a legacy" and that was something he was very proud of.

He started at Murray 2 power station and was present when it was commissioned. He knew every nut, bolt and O-ring in that place.

He later transferred to the Tumut 3 power station but as he was playing football in Corryong and "this side of the hill" was where his heart was, he returned to spend the rest of his working days out of Khancoban.

Bob was pretty chuffed with the fact he was only qualified to be paid in Band 2 but got paid better than Band 3. If the big bosses wanted to know something or what was going on over this side of the hill they'd just get him on the phone.

After work, getting to the pub from Murray 1 fast was a challenge Bob and a handful of co-workers accepted daily. Bob held the record of five minutes from Murray 1 to the Alpine Inn carpark.

This behaviour was frowned upon by the heirachy of the Snowy so they were ordered to attend driving training. After the three days of training, Bob raced off to the pub as usual only to find the driving instructor waiting there with a stern look on his face. He said that trip should take 13 minutes. Bob's reply was simple "What, did you do it in reverse?"

Bob never imagined the time he spent on the Snowy would not only create so many work opportunities but also so many life long friendships.

His knowledge of the Snowy Scheme was second-to-none and it was more than a job to him, it was a passion. He spent many hours working by himself and with age the wiser he became and the better he understood how it all worked

He could walk into the power station and just by listening to it operate he would know if it was running smoothly or something needed some attention.

In one instance, he was impressed with how a simple piece of engineering outsmarted all the big wigs.

stations were commissioned the pressure of the water coming down the pipes into the generators used to make the power station vibrate severely and there were fears it would be shaken to pieces.

Bob came up with the idea of placing steel inserts inside the pipes to split the water and reduce the pressure but not the force.

It could be said he pretty much saved the whole Snowy Scheme!

It played a big part in his life and when he retired the corporation threw him a massive farewell function in Khancoban. They also shouted he and partner Annie to a day out at the Caulfield Cup with betting money - a day he'd never forget!

Sport was a major pastime for Bob and he had many interests including basketball where he won a senior premiership. He is also remembered for his involvement at committee level where his main aim was to make it cheap so everyone could play. He'd often get caught umpiring games all night. He was awarded the basketball association's first Life Membership, something he cherished deeply.

There was only two colours in Bob's eyes - the red and blue of his beloved Corryong and Melbourne football clubs - the mighty Demons.

He loved footy but it probably wasn't his best sport personally as tennis was his favourite. He could probably hold his own against most throughout the district and back then most people played.

He won an A grade premiership with Towong which was quite an achievement. He was amazed at the trust that Bill and Ruby Lloyd had in him taking their three daughters - Barb, Ro and Podge - to games. They were like little sisters to him and affectionately called him Uncle Bobby.

Bob didn't start playing football until late in his teens and he didn't have the pleasure of being able to kick a footy with siblings at home but he soon learnt if you were going to be any good you had to have good skills. He never played in a senior premiership but was a multiple reserves best and fairest winner until he got knocked out at Cudgewa one day and never played again.

From there he umpired a few junior games and then took over the junior coaching role which he filled for 17 years.

Coaching became a passion and he took the role very seriously, not only developing and teaching the players the game but also mentoring them in life.

He was a father-like figure to those that needed it and someone that had the backs of his charges for life.

He coached his juniors to an impressive ten grand finals, winning nine of them. He was also proud when his youngsters went on to play senior football; most notably the generation of players that went on to play in the 1995 premiership win at Walwa. This was then repeated several times in the early 2000s. As a dyed-in-thewool Demon, Bob hated the arch enemy Federals, especially in his playing days. However, over the years he grew fond of the sideline banter especially giving a bit of lip to his mate Charlie Paton.

Football gave him many happy days and he was fortunate to be great mates with Kevin Mack who along with Evan Nicholas were his two favourite players.

He received a Life Membership of his beloved Demons and two of his last outings were for Evan's 300th match and Corryong's 20-year 2003 premiership reunion which Annie broke him out of hospital to attend.

His love of the Melbourne football club started in their glory days and he remembers listening to them on the wireless. They won many premierships but the one

they lost going for four in a row in 1958 is one that sticks in his mind.

They were playing the 'filth', aka Collingwood, which was also the team his mother barracked for. He was giving some abuse to the wireless and banging his hand on the table in anger so got a clip from his mother and sent to his room. Melbourne ended up losing so the 'filth' gave him two clips that day - one for losing and one from his mother.

He was shattered when Barassi left for Carlton in 1965 but his love for the Demons never wavered.

Bob loved a bet and maybe it was a love of horses from his early days or that he was known as the 'trifecta king' but punting and having a beer went hand in hand and this was something he enjoyed

Later in life along came Annie, his best mate. They were together for just on 31 years and in Bob's words "they made a great team" and they just enjoyed each others company. They still had separate houses but that worked for them.

They both shared the love of horses and the punt and possibly his second best day was winning the \$25,000 quaddie with her.

Annie and Bob shared many great memories together and enjoyed trips throughout the country but generally to a race track. Bob attended the Swan Hill races for 33 years straight where he made friends with Terry and Lyn Vlance, Max Runnalls and Noel and Anne Smith. And there was no Towong race meeting without him where Bob Bickett, Jane Bartram Gary Wishart and Daryl and Trena Herrod would come up for the day then all head off to Corowa races the next day. Bob just loved being around

One of Bob's many qualities was his loyalty and he had many lifelong friendships. Bob lived a full life with no regrets and was happy with how he treated people. Death came earlier than he had hoped but h was content with it. He was glad he got to see so many friends in his last few weeks and at no point did he complain. His only worry was that everyone look after Annie!

He was also annoyed with Melbourne's lack of effort this season and sh...y the 'filth' won!

He was a true gentleman that never lost his wit and the love of a good time.

Regional post offices must

be protected

Post offices in rural and regional Victoria could face closures after Australia Post failed to commit to the regulated minimum of 2500 post offices, according to the Leader of The Nationals,

Peter Walsh.

He has written to the CEO of Australia Post, Paul Graham, seeking an assurance that rural and regional Victorian post offices would remain open to provide access to vital services like banking, retail, identity and passport services, and disaster relief support.

Mr Graham's response to his letter failed to rule out closures or mergers of post offices, despite his recent testimony to the Federal Parliament's Senate Estimates including that Australia Post "will never abandon the regions and rural Australia."

Mr Walsh said he was originally concerned when Mr Graham last week told Senate Estimates that it made "no sense" for Australia Post to maintain its current footprint of post offices.

"We sought an assurance that Australia Post would maintain their minimum 2500 rural and regional post office footprint, because we know how important those post offices are in our smaller communities"

We remember our fallen heroes

This is the fourth instalment in a series of biographies by Stephen Learmonth of servicemen from the region which the Courier will be printing in the lead up to Remembrance Day this

year on November 11.

CURLEWIS Kenneth

Ken was born on the 20th of November, 1893 at Tintaldra. He was the youngest of six children of Alfred William and Frances Ann (née Graves) Curlewis. He attended Tintaldra School and after the family moved from the Upper Murray, Dandenong State School. He then studied electrical engineering at Working Men's College in Melbourne (now RMIT).

At the time of his enlistment on the 6th of October, 1914 he was an electrical engineer, living 20 Bailey Avenue Malvern Victoria. He was allocated the Regimental Number 1133 and placed in the 14th Battalion. His initial training was undertaken Broadmeadows Camp on the outskirts of Melbourne. The 14th Battalion, along with the 13th, 15th and 16th formed the 4th Brigade, under the command of Colonel John Monash, of the 4th Australian Division.

The 14th Battalion embarked on HMAS A38 Ulysses at the Port of Melbourne on the 22nd of December 1914. Along

with other troopships it arrived at King George Sound at Albany in Western Australia on the 26th of December. Here, a total of sixteen ships and one submarine (AE2) assembled with other troopships to form the second ANZAC Convoy to leave Australia's shores. Unlike the first convoy, it was not escorted by any warships although at least four of the troopships including the Ulysses, had been armed by having two 4.7 inch guns, one forward and one aft.

The convoy arrived at Suez early on the morning of the 28th of January and after transiting the canal, arrived at Alexandria five days later.

On April the 1st, while the battalion was camped at Heliopolis, Ken, who was now a sergeant in No. 2 Company, was admitted hospital. Although the reason was not listed it was serious enough to prevent him from rejoining his battalion until the 25th of May. The 14th Battalion had landed on the Peninsula on the first day of the Campaign. It had also occupied positions at Monash Valley and had spent all of May at Courtney's Post.

When Ken landed on Gallipoli on the 25th of May he joined his battalion at Courtney's Post. On the 7th of June Ken was promoted to Company Quarter-master Sergeant. Around this time the battalion moved to Reserve Gully and remained here until early July when they were taken off the Peninsula and taken to the island of Imbros for a well deserved break at the Kephalos Rest Camp.

On the 14th of July the battalion moved back to its old positions at Reserve Gully on the Peninsula. As the battalion was preparing for an offensive on Hill 971, Ken was commissioned to the rank of 2nd Lieutenant in D Company, 14th Battalion.

Hill 971, also known as Koja Chemen Tepe, was the highest point of the Sari Bair Ridge. As part of the break-out operations in early August, the 4th Infantry Brigade was allotted this peak as their objective. The intention of the operation was to seize the high ground between Hill 971 and Chunuk Bair in order to secure a drive across the peninsula to capture the forts guarding the Straits.

A witness report in Ken's Casualty Report tells the story of the circumstances of his

"About 6am on 8.8.15 they lined up for a charge on Hill 971. Lts Curlewis and Luscombe, Sgt Kilmartin, Bug. Morgan and two other men, besides witness (Pte E.E. Bishop) were cut off from the rest of the Battalion. Lieut. Luscombe called for volunteers to follow him. They all (including Lt Curlewis) followed on to a ridge, which they held and sent back for reinforcements, which however, they did not get as their messenger never returned. They held the ridge for about half an hour and were then ordered by Lt. Luscombe to retire, which they proceeded to

Coming along a gully, Curlewis was hit in the back by a bullet from a machine gun. He fell, apparently dead and did not move. They tried to bring him away but could not manage it, so they left him. Witness was the only

one of the party to get back. Lt Luscombe is, he says, "a prisoner of war."

Four of Ken's cousins from Western Australia also enlisted. Three of the four - Gordon, Selwyn and Arthur - would also be killed during the Gallipoli Campaign.

Ken has no known grave and is remembered on Panel 29 of the Lone Pine Memorial on the Gallipoli Peninsula. He is also remembered on the Australian War Memorial Roll of Honour, the Cudgewa War Memorial, Tintaldra School Honour Roll and the Corryong War Memorial. For his service during the war he was awarded the 1914-15 Star, the British War Medal and the Victory

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Play it smart and leave early Letter from the Chief Fire Officer:-

Victorians won't leave early in the event of a bushfire.

An alarming number of Victorians living in highrisk bushfire areas say they would stay at their properties until they felt threatened by a bushfire or would wait for an official warning, a CFA survey revealed.

CFA's annual Bushfire Community Survey, undertaken since 2009-10, showed 30.9% would wait for emergency authorities to tell them what to do, 28.6% would stay until they felt threatened and 13.8% would stay and defend their property.

Victoria experienced many damaging fire seasons in recent memory such as the February 2009 bushfires and the 2019-20 fires and with the prediction of a warmer and earlier start to this year's season, CFA is concerned that not enough people are preparing themselves for fire season and heeding its advice.

CFA Chief Officer, Jason Heffernan, said it's concerning knowing around half of all Victorians in high-risk bushfire areas are risking their lives if a bushfire was to occur.

"Victoria has had quieter fire seasons the last few years but now is not the time for the community to become complacent,' CO Heffernan said.

"And while firefighters are always well prepared and your safety during fire season is a shared responsibility, so it's vital that you understand your local risks and take actions to prepare your family and property.

"We've seen in the recent release of the spring seasonal outlook weather patterns are changing and we're expecting warmer and drier conditions across the state leading up to



"Fires spread quickly and they threaten lives properties. The community needs to be prepared and they need to know their triggers to act. Please don't rely on one source of information, utilise the multiple channels available to you. Use common sense and protect yourself and your loved ones "

The AFAC Seasonal Bushfire Outlook for Spring outlined that fire risk in the coming months is expected to be normal across most parts of Victoria.

The predicted development of an El Niño weather pattern will contribute to higher fire risk in some parts of Victoria this season compared to the last three years.

"Now is the time to sit down with your family or household and make sure you have a bushfire survival plan," CO Heffernan said. "Practice this plan and be ready.

"On hot, dry and windy days, don't drive into or through high-risk areas. Plan an alternate route or postpone your travel if possible. Continue to monitor conditions every day."

The survey showed 44.4% believe CFA is responsible for protecting them during a

bushfire and 43.8% say CFA is responsible for protecting their home.

"We simply can't get a truck to every house during a major bushfire. Fire safety is a joint effort and the community need to also take on this responsibility when living in a bushfire prone area," CO Heffernan said.

"Our promise is to continue with our mission to protect lives and property and we are lucky to have some of the best firefighters in the world to do this."

Victorians should know where to find the best information to stay safe and never rely on just one source of information.

Victoria's integrated warning system includes the Vic Emergency website, app and social media channels, VicEmergency Hotline 1800 226 226, emergency broadcasters including ABC radio, Sky News TV, commercial radio and select community radio stations.

Warnings are issued when an incident is occurring, and you need to act. Make sure you understand the three levels of warnings and additional messages such as 'Evacuate Now':

Reducing bushfire risk to protect life, property and the environment is at the heart of what Forest Fire Management Victoria

That's why we're focused on planning and delivering our bushfire risk management program all year round.

This past year, heavy rain and floods across large parts of the state have had a serious impact on our communities. This means less opportunities to lower bushfire risk through planned burning and other measures.

Following three years of lower fire risk seasons, this spring has already seen a significant number of bushfires, particularly in the east of the state. My thoughts go to the communities affected by bushfire, and I thank our crews, contractors, incident management personnel and partner agencies for the work they do to keep our communities safe.

Preparing for Victorian summer takes a lot of planning. As part of our year-round approach to reducing bushfire risk, last year we delivered bushfire risk reduction works across more than 92,000 hectares of public land across the state.

This included planned burning and mechanical treatments such mulching, mowing, slashing and spraying, as well as constructing and maintaining strategic fuel breaks and upgrading and maintaining the public land road network.

Despite the fire activity we have already seen in spring, our bushfire risk management program will continue where conditions are suitable and it is safe to do so.

Planned burning, mechanical treatments and planned burn preparation are our highest priority into late spring and early summer because



if a bushfire starts, these activities will help us suppress fires.

Reducing fuels like grass, leaves, bark, shrubs and fallen branches means fires are less intense and slower to spread, which helps firefighters keep bushfires smaller and contained before they pose a risk to the things we care about – our communities and our environment. Victoria will always

have bushfires, but we want our communities to know that when a bushfire starts, we are ready to respond with close to 1,800 FFMVic personnel on the frontline this season. They are part of DEECA's 3,000 personnel who perform a fire or emergency role, which also include around 1.200 personnel who hold accreditations in incident management roles.

firefighting Our equipment includes more than 500 ultralight tankers, around 100 heavy tankers, as well as more than 300 additional plant and trucks including dozers, tractors, graders, loaders, forklifts and excavators.

operations Ground are also supported by Victoria's aerial fleet of 51 aircraft contracted for the 2023-24 summer season. The fleet includes a mix of firebombing aircraft, air supervision and aerial information gathering aircraft. It is supplemented by up to 100 aircraft that can be called when needed.

We are also supported by a plant panel of around 400 contractors (including 19 harvest & haulage contractors) that we can call on for fire suppression using skilled work personnel, dozers, graders, excavators, harvesters and other machinery.

But Victorians also need to be prepared for bushfires if they live, work or visit areas at risk of fire.

With drier and warmer than usual spring and summer conditions, we expect Victorians will be looking forward to getting outdoors to explore and enjoy our beautiful state forests and parks.

We ask visitors to take extra care with campfires and always know and follow the rules as it can take just one stray ember to cause a destructive fire.

Please never leave a campfire unattended and always put a campfire out with water. If the ashes are cool to touch - it's safe to leave. More information about campfire safety is available on the FFMVic and CFA websites.

And to keep up to date on planned burns near you, sign up to receive notifications at Planned Burns Victoria download VicEmergency app. You can download the app from the App Store or Google Play.

Awards recognise water innovation

North East Water's work has been recognised with a major award and a high commendation at the recent Australian Water Association 2023 Victorian Water Awards in Melbourne.

The organisation won the Infrastructure Project Innovation Award (Regional) for its Beechworth sewer upgrade and was highly commended for its Independent Aboriginal Board Delegate Program in the Organisational Excellence category.

Managing director, Jo Murdoch, said the awards highlighted the innovative and highly specialised work of North East Water staff and partner organisations.

She said the recognition also demonstrated the importance of engaging with communities and agency stakeholders to achieve significant environmental, social and cultural outcomes.

North East Water's complex \$6.5 million Beechworth project involved drilling through granite bedrock to construct a one-kilometre pipeline in Beechworth Historic Park, making it one of the longest single shot boring operations attempted through granite

in Victoria.

The sewer pipe, now installed, runs at depths reaching 50 metres below Historic Park.

"This innovative solution, which followed extensive community and contractor engagement, enabled us to overcome problems which have for many years plagued the Beechworth sewer transfer system through the Historic Park."

Ms Murdoch also said North East Water's unique Independent Aboriginal Board Delegate Program was the first of its kind in Australia and was now being replicated across other water corporations

catchment management authorities.

"Our aspiration vas simple, to increase Ingrams Rock in the the representation of Aboriginal people on water boards, provide development opportunities and learn from their deep cultural knowledge, wisdom and experience," she said. We believe the Australian water sector can learn much from Traditional Owners and First Nations peoples."

Through this program, Duduroa Dhargal and Yorta Yorta man Johnny Murray, who Aboriginal delegate to the North East Water board in 2022-23, has since been appointed a board director.






