

Spotlight put on election vows

Member for Indi. Helen Haines, is asking the Australian National Audit Office (ANAO) to investigate election commitments made by the Labor Party in 2022, amounting to \$1.35 billion through two invitationonly grant funds.

Dr Haines said that during the last election campaign, the Australian Labor Party made 435 commitments to fund projects, with 86.8 percent

of seats that Labor won or held at the election receiving a grant through the programs.

"Only 51.7 per cent of non-Labor seats received a grant," Dr Haines noted.

"Once Labor formed government, it directed the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development, Communications and the Arts to set up two grant programs - Investing in Our Communities



Program and the Priority Community Infrastructure Program, allocating almost \$1.35 billion to these programs in their October 2022 budget.

"Freedom of Information requests show the relevant minister asked the department to undertake a desktop review for project merits after coming to government, long after the spending commitments were made."

Dr Haines pointed to the program guidelines as a point of concern, noting they were 'one-off, closed, non-competitive programs', with the eligibility restricted to those 'invited to deliver

"The government had an 'invite-only' list of organisations that could apply through these two programs, mostly projects that were already promised by Labor as election commitments,"

she said. "When you put all of the information together who received a grant, the application process and the assessment process we have to ask, does the process for determining recipients under these programs seem rigorous, objective, fair, equitable and responsible? Or is this just another example of pork barrelling?"

and Local Government, Catherine King, to lay out her concerns in a meeting in October, advising the minister she would be making a referral to the audit office.

"The ANAO is the auditor for public spending - it makes sure that when the government spends taxpayer money, it stacks up. I want to know if these election commitment programs do indeed stack up."

Dr Haines said that any assertion by the government that "the election is the selection" goes to the heart of the problem of pork Dr Haines said she had barrelling and called on met with the Minister for the Parliament to take firm Infrastructure, Transport, action to end the practice. Regional Development "The spending of taxpayer money should always be done fairly and transparently, with proper guidelines and selection criteria and awarded to recipients who objectively demonstrate merit." According to the Australia Institute, more than 80 per cent of Australians view pork barrelling as a form of corruption. "This is a flaw of Australian democracy and needs to change," Dr Haines said.





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

Three Corryong College students have been successful in taking a non-traditional route to tertiary education.

Year 12 students Shei McLean, Brooke Tregilgas, and Ruby Scammell have been accepted into their first-choice programs at Charles Sturt University's Albury Campus through the VCE Vocational Major (VCE VM) which offers an alternative senior secondary pathway, equivalent to the VCE unscored.

Ruby will pursue a Bachelor of Education - Early Childhood/Primary; Brooke has been accepted into a Bachelor of Education - Primary; and Shei will begin a Bachelor of Nursing.

The program also provides students with the opportunity to undertake employment or further training.

Lachlan Nugent has earned an apprenticeship as a Service Technician with Hutchinson Pearce in Albury, while Jess Damm has secured a traineeship with Snowy Hydro at Khancoban, working towards a Certificate III and IV in Business, with potential to train as an Administration Assistant in 2026.

to be successful in their chosen study. "Our students have used our centre in Boundary Road more than 1000 times this year,


showing that it makes a difference to their study," Vicki said.

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
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


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Tourism group has more irons in the fire

At the 2024 annual general meeting of the Man from Snowy River Tourism Association (MFSRTA), president Ros McKenzie presented her report of its activities over the past 12 months.

I would like to thank all our committee members for their support and input into the ongoing projects of the association. Thank you also to my secretary, Cathy Ross for all her hard work and support over the last 12 months and to Dianne Humphrey for her work as treasurer keeping the books in order. Our projects are

funded from profits from the sale of souvenir items at the Corryong Visitor Information Centre and in the last few years we have also been successful with funding from a number of grants.

Ongoing projects of the association are:-• Honour Avenue

Carvings - this project has been funded from a grant from the Department Affairs. Veterans' of sub-committee has Α been formed comprising members of the MFSRTA committee, representatives of the Corryong Memorial Hall, RSL and Upper Murray Historical Society and community members. Stephen Learmonth,

local war historian, is playing a major role in researching and sharing his knowledge relating to the Corryong Avenue of Honour. More than 120 names of those honoured by the original avenue have been found and recorded and photos of 41 of these servicemen have been found.

John Brady. woodcarver, has used these 41 photos to create eight images of typical servicemen from the Upper Murray which are designed to honour all WW1 servicemen. The sub-committee is now seeking final quotes on a memorial plaque (to list all 120+ servicemen), a granite seat, signage and landscaping of the site where the carvings will be situated. We hope to have this project completed by April 2025.

• Pioneer Corner Mural: Grant funding has been set aside for this project. Permission has been obtained to create a mural on the Donaldson Street wall of the Top of the Town Takeaway which will reflect the early pioneering history of Corryong.

• The Beautiful Upper Murray Map: The first edition of this map was produced in 2014. Work has started to identify errors, corrections and any changes needed. A number of these are needed due to the effects of the 2019/20 bushfires. We still have sufficient of the current edition for sale, however it will be great to have a newer edition available.

• Corryong Circuit Trail Signage: Now that the trail is complete (Towong Shire project) we have started work on the signage. The weatherresistant horse stands (produced for the MFSR Festival Art Show in about 2014) will be used as the base for the signs. Thirteen of these will be placed along the trail to give both direction signage and also information about the pioneers of Corryong. The pioneers highlighted by these signs will be related to the street names of Corryong. We are working with Towong Shire and the Upper Murray Historical Society on this project.

Congratulations to John Murphy for his tireless work towards the Corryong Wetlands project. The association plans to support the project with signage. Being along the Corryong Circuit Trail, there is an opportunity to design the wetlands signage to fit with that style.

We have supported the Playles Hill Park project in numerous ways. This includes replacement seating at the rotunda and the gabion basket seats which can be seen at the rotunda and labyrinth. We provided funding for the drinking fountain at the rotunda. Most recently we donated one of the horse stands for signage at the newly completed labyrinth. We congratulate the Playles Hill Project Group on their work to help develop this park into a major attraction for both locals and visitors.

Our website upper murraytourism.com.au details a number of our past projects such as Kat Brown's 'A View Through the Valley' artwork at Playles Hill and statues of Horrie the Wog Dog and Jack Riley in Corryong.

We also support other Towong Shire projects such as the High Country Rail Trail, Great River Road and the new Upper Murray website.

Towong Shire has not yet been successful in its applications for various grants for development of the High Country Rail Trail. We are hopeful that this will be funded in the near future as we believe that its development will have a significant impact on tourism.

Parklands Albury Wodonga secured funding to complete the bridge across Tallangatta Creek and also to produce and install a mural on the trail at Cudgewa.

The Great River Road project has seen the completion of walking / cycling tracks at Towong, Tintaldra, Walwa and Walwa to Jingellic Bridge and the installations and signage at the Pine Mountain wayside stop.

We look forward to seeing the installation of the brolgas artwork at Towong. We also look forward to seeing the production of new publicity / marketing material on the Great River Road.

It is great that the new Visit Upper Murray website is now up and running. We look forward to this becoming an even better resource as further information is added in the near future. We encourage all Upper Murray businesses to have a presence on the site.

We have supported the Chauvel Border Light Horse Trail with a contribution towards the cost of production of brochures.

We have also worked with Towong Shire and Upper Murray Inc (UMI) on the annual Business and Tourism Expo, UMI Tourism Innovation Working Group and UMI Tourism Entrepreneurial Discovery Workshops.

Now that we are past the stresses of the pandemic and the 2019/2020 bushfires I hope that we can get back to business as usual.

It will be great to see our ongoing projects progress towards completion in 2025.

Our committee meets once a month and we are seeking interested members of the community to join us and help to support tourism in the Upper Murray. Program delivers boost to fish stocks

Thousands of native sportfish will be released into waterways across NSW over coming months through the popular Two-Dollar-for-One-Dollar Native Fish Stocking program.

NSW Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) Acting Executive Director Fisheries, Peter Turnell, said \$500,000 in funds from the Recreational Fishing Trust has been allocated to the community-based program for the 2024-25 season including stocking local waters.

"Funds are available on a two-dollar for one-dollar basis, where applicants will receive two dollars for every one dollar they spend on stocking high priority native sportfish, including Australian Bass, Golden Perch and Murray Cod," Mr Turnell said. "Fish are supplied to local groups by the NSW commercial fish hatchery sector, which complies with strict measures to ensure the highest quality production, fish health and genetic standards.

"Approximately 75 groups, including fishing clubs, local councils and other community i organisations, participate in the program each year. Collectively, these groups have released more than 15 million native fish into waterways across NSW since the program commenced in the late 1990s."

The Khancoban Angling Club has received \$ 7, 0 0 0 for stocking the Tooma River, Murray River and Tumbarumba Creek with cod.

Mr Turnell said the community stocking program has been operating for 26 years and is a great example of how fishing licences fees are invested back into recreational fishing in NSW through the Recreational Fishing Trust.

"The Two-Dollar-for-One-Dollar Native Fish Stocking program plays an important role in boosting recreational fishing opportunities in NSW, as well as increasing community involvement in, and awareness of, responsible stocking," Mr Turnell said. "During the 2023-24

season, more than 825,000 native fish were stocked through the program. "This includes

Sport upgrade grants on offer

The Victorian government is ramping up its investment in regional communities looking to upgrade or build new local swimming pools, women and girls' change rooms, courts, sports fields and pavilions.

Member for Northern Victoria, Jaclyn Symes, announced that applications are now open for Round 2 of the Regional Community Sports Infrastructure Fund (RCSIF) to help regional communities plan, design and build the sport facilities they need. The five funding

streams in the Regional Community Sports Infrastructure Fund will help regional communities plan and build everything from indoor stadiums and aquatic facilities, upgrades for women and girls, community facilities, and infrastructure and planning to encourage people from all abilities to get involved. Additional grants of up to \$50,000 are also available through

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Former workers take a look at the future

They came together from all corners of the world to build the iconic Snowy Scheme and decades later, a visit to the Snowy 2.0 project has provided former workers with an eye-opening snapshot of Australia's renewable energy future.

About 60 members of the Snowy Scheme workforce continued 75th anniversary celebrations with a recent tour of the main Snowy 2.0 construction worksite at Lobs Hole and lunch with current workers.

Snowy Hydro's 2,200 megawatt pumped hydro mega project, which is expanding the scheme's generating capacity by more than 50 per cent and delivering 160 hours of energy storage, made an impression on the tour group.

Former Snowy Chief Operating Officer, Ken Lister, described the engineering on display as "truly world class" and was matched by the competence, courage and collaboration of the Snowy 2.0 workforce.

"It is obvious that the people of Snowy 2.0 are just as committed to delivering a project to

'keep the lights on' as the former workers were in 'turning the waters westward," Ken said.

Tumut resident, Ray it Holloway, who worked for as a fitter's assistant on the Tumut 3 power station build, said the scale of Snowy 2.0 was "amazing". 2.0 "The whole day was magnificent and to see pr

the project like that was a memorable experience.

It's a lot bigger than I thought it was," Ray said. Snowy 2.0 Project

Director, Dave Evans, said it was a privilege to host former scheme workers onsite.

"We were incredibly proud to show them Snowy 2.0 and to acknowledge their contribution to this project," he said.

"Without them and the mighty Snowy Mountains

Scheme, we wouldn't be here today.

"We stand on the shoulders of those who came before us. "Together, the Snowy

Scheme and Snowy 2.0 will be critically important to underpin Australia's transition to renewable energy."

The Lobs Hole site tour followed a 75 years of the Snowy Scheme Former Worker Reunion event in Cooma and a range of community-led initiatives including an open day at the Snowy Scheme Museum in Adaminaby.

The final Snowy Hydro initiative for the 75th anniversary was the community open day at Tumut 3 Power Station on Saturday which attracted a record number of registrations. Boring machines are making steady progress

The Snowy 2.0 pumped hydro megaproject has marked a significant milestone, with one of three tunnel boring machines (TBM), Lady Eileen Hudson, now two-thirds of the way through its second tunnel excavation.

The TBM is approximately four kilometres into the six kilometre 'tailrace' tunnel, which will link the lower Talbingo Reservoir with the massive 20-storey underground power station. TBM Lady Eileen Hudson previously completed a 2.85 kilometre main access tunnel, which is now being used by construction teams to reach the underground power station site.

Drill and blast works are also advancing at the Talbingo water intake, creating a new 700-metre tunnel between the intake structure and the tailrace tunnel. The Talbingo intake is located in very steep terrain and following excavation of 570,000 cubic metres of material over two years, the rock face is now 110 metres high.

Snowy Hydro CEO, Dennis Barnes, said that recent months have been some of the project's most

productive. "Overall the project is around 60 percent complete and there's a strong sense of momentum, with good tunnelling progress by TBM Lady Eileen and other two TBMs performing well," Mr Barnes said.

"Snowy 2.0 is one of the most complex and challenging megaprojects underway in the world. There is an immense sense of pride in what's being achieved across the workforce of more than 3,000 people."

Mr Barnes said Snowy 2.0 will be the most significant addition to the National Electricity Market (NEM) since the original Snowy Scheme.

"Snowy 2.0 will have a generating capacity of 2,200 megawatts and an unmatched 160hour storage capability, meaning it will be able to power around three million homes for a week," he said.

"While batteries and gas are important to store the excess energy from the increasing amounts of wind and solar in the grid, only pumped hydro can offer the long-duration storage needed to keep the lights on.

"Pumped hydro will also smooth energy price peaks during extended periods without enough sun and wind," Mr Barnes said ...

"Snowy 2.0 is on track to be delivered within the \$12 billion budget and be complete by the end of 2028," Mr Barnes added.

Across the project, more progress is being made:-

• In the underground power station complex, the caverns are more than 27 per cent excavated.

• All 196 of the verv large brackets that will Tantangara water reservoir hold the temporary construction cranes to power station, with build the underground more than 1,600 metres power station have been installed in the two power station caverns.

• When fully excavated, the Snowy 2.0

power station will be the equivalent of a 20-storey, 250 metre-long building, located 800 metres underground. • At Marica, the

28-metre wide surge shaft is excavated to 123 metres or half of its final depth. The shaft will provide water storage when the power station starts up and pressure relief in the headrace tunnel when it shuts down.

• TBM Florence is progressing, excavating the 17-kilometre long 'headrace' tunnel that will link the upper to the underground excavated. TBM Kirsten is performing to plan and is now excavating the 1.6-kilometre, very

steep tunnel that will link

the headrace tunnel to the underground power station. Ground conditions ahead of all TBMs are expected to be inconsistent and the performance of the machines will vary as a result.

• The NSW government is currently assessing the planning modification to enable a fourth project TBM, which is required to tunnel through a challenging geological fault zone. • While health and

safety performance is encouraging, it is an area in which the project is continually monitoring and looking to improve further. The project's current total reportable injury frequency rate (TRIFR) is 2.42 (per million hours worked.

• The current LTIFR is 0.92.

Safety competition launched



The Victorian Transport Accident Commission (TAC) is offering young the chance Victorians to make a life-saving difference, with its 'Split Second' Competition returning for a sixth year this time with an exciting twist.

The initiative, designed to engage young creatives from 18 to 30 in spreading critical road safety messages, calls for a compelling 45-second short film capturing the devastating consequences of a split second decision on the roads.

This the year competition is open to filmmakers both and content creators and will now include two winning entries who will each be awarded a \$5,000 cash prize and \$35,000 production budget, and mentoring from Truce Films and creative agency Taboo.

Duck count commences

The Game Authority Management (GMA) will begin its annual survey of Victoria's game duck population on Tuesday, 12 November 2024.

The aerial survey will be conducted by wildlife biologists who will record the presence, species and number of game ducks at more than 850 waterbodies across Victoria including wetlands, farm dams,

sewerage treatment plants, streams and rivers.

The survey will include ground also counts where the survey helicopter is unable to operate.

Satellite imaging will then be used to determine the amount of wetland habitat available and, together with survey

"Results from this survey will help to accurately estimate total game duck abundance, based on environmental conditions at the time," he said.

"This research benefits wildlife conservation increasing bv our understanding of the ecology of Victoria's game duck populations and the






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
