Mental health promise secured

mental health will flow to the Upper Murray after Member for Indi, Helen Haines, received a commitment from the Health Minister to support ongoing mental health services in the region.

Corryong Health will receive \$100,000 a year for the next three years from the Australian government on top of the \$500,000 mental health package that was committed at the height of the Black Summer bushfires.

It is expected that the Victorian government will match the ongoing federal funding, resulting in more than \$1 million in mental health funding for people in towns like Corryong and Walwa.

Minimise the risk of haystack fires

Important Tips

- It is important to ensure hay is well cured before baling (know the history of the hay you purchase) • Keep haystacks to a limited size and don't stack hay right to the top of the shed. Allow some air to circulate at the top to help carry away moisture
- Monitor moisture and temperature of your hay regularly
- Watch for unusual odours such as pipe tobacco, caramel, burning or musty smells
- · Store hay in separate stacks or sheds away from farm equipment and other buildings
- Keep your hay dry (protect it from rain, shed leaks and runoff and cover stacks with tarps or hay caps)

Temperature Guide

- Use a thermometer in a probe or insert a crowbar into the middle of the stack for 2 hours
- Less than 50°C (can handle bar without discomfort) check temperature daily
- 50°C 60°C (can only handle crowbar for short time) check temperature twice daily / remove machinery from shed.
- 60°C 70°C (can touch bar only briefly) check temperature every 2-4 hours / move hay to improve air flow.
- Over 70 °C (bar is too hot to hold) potential for fire / CALL 000 IMMEDIATELY

Hay demand prompts warning

Victorian farmers have a spring in their step with the onset of strong seasonal growth of pastures and crops but the CFA has warned them to exercise caution when cutting, baling and storing hay.

The most recent seasonal outlook for spring - released late last month by the Australasian Fire and Emergency Service Authorities Council (AFAC) - shows that average to above average rainfall is expected to promote strong vegetation growth across the state during spring.

Chief Officer, Jason Heffernan said the forecast indicated farmers could expect greater yields and hopefully a successful hay season.


"Add to that the current

high demand for hay – in part due to the mouse plague in NSW wreaking havoc on stored hay in that state – and a lot of farmers are growing hay right across Victoria right now," he said.

"Whether you're a seasoned hay grower or getting into it more recently, it's really important to take care of your hay and crops this fire season."

CFA volunteer firefighters responded to dozens of haystack fires across the state last year.

Chief Officer Heffernan said haystack fires can start quite easily from lightning strikes or sparks from equipment and machinery but a major source of ignition is spontaneous combustion of the haybales themselves.



"This can happen to any hay bales, regardless of size, and it is something farmers can help prevent," Chief Officer Heffernan said. "After baling, make sure you check the heat and smell of the bales before stacking them into haysheds or large external stacks and leave any suspect bales separate from the rest."

Partners power up for fire protection

The 2019-2020 Black Summer bushfires highlighted the importance of a durable electricity supply during emergencies and steps are being taken with affected communities to develop sustainable energy systems.

Victorian The government funded program will provide at least \$7 million in new technology for Corryong, Mallacoota and Omeo which will be developed by the Department of Environment, Land, Water and Planning (DELWP) and AusNet Services.

In Corryong, the Community Microgrid and Sustainable Energy program will support existing efforts by residents and businesses who already have invested in renewable energy systems and generators.

A key goal of the DELWP funding is to improve the town's local electricity durability in the event of network outages and future emergencies.


community Α engagement period is underway and will run for six weeks. Feedback will be sought through a survey

hosted by DELWP and through follow-up phone calls where needed, as well as an expression of interest process. This feedback will guide the design of the best energy solutions ahead of any installation activities planned from the middle of 2022.

The Corryong installation will focus on locating approximately 50 subsidised residential solar and batteries systems with smart energy controllers as demonstrated through an expression of interest process. Additional township design work is being completed to review whole of town options for a future microgrid.

This program is being completed in collaboration with the Upper Murray Inc program - Upper Murray Energy Reliability and Resilience Project.

Corryong residents are invited to complete an online energy survey by November 30, 2021 to help inform community support of the Community Microgrid and Sustainable Energy Program. An expression of interest is available for those residents interested in a



subsidised household solar and battery system. The two project partners are also working

with the Mallacoota community on a first-'Community of-its-kind Microgrid and Sustainable

Energy Program.'



"We've had some commitments but we've had long delays in getting those commitments realised," Mr Sandilands told the Senate hearing.



Second fire report delivered

The Victorian government has tabled the second phase report from the Inspector-General for Emergency Management's (IGEM) independent inquiry into the 2019-20 Victorian fire season.

Minister for Emergency Services, Jaclyn Symes, welcomed the report and confirmed the government's support for all 15 recommendations.

The recommendations aim to ensure the emergency management sector, local governments and communities are better placed to manage relief and recovery from bushfires and other emergencies.

The Phase Two Report examined relief and recovery arrangements during and immediately 2019-20 after the Victorian bushfires. This builds on the Phase One report released in 2020, which focused on emergency preparedness and response.

"This has been a difficult two years for the communities directly affected by the devastating 2019-20 fires," Ms Symes said.

"I thank the Inspector-General for their work in recommending how we can better support these Victorians.

"Community experiences, highlighted throughout IGEM's report, show there is further work all response agencies can do to better support locals during and after emergencies," Ms Symes said.

"The government will build on work already underway including making relief a greater within priority the emergency management system.

"Creating a dedicated strengthened, recovery entity to work with government departments, agencies and councils to develop state-wide, allemergencies response will ensure the sector is well equipped to drive ongoing improvements and tackle enduring challenges.

"The government will work with the sector over the coming months to finalise the design of the dedicated recovery entity and in the interim, Bushfire Recovery Victoria will continue its vital work and play a similar role to support the recovery of communities, as it has for the 2019-20 Victorian fires and the 2021 flood and storm events over the coming extreme weather season.

"We'll continue to support communities as they recover and rebuild and we appreciate the work being done by our incredible emergency services personnel to help those efforts," Ms Symes said.

Local youth investigated employment opportunities in the region.

Young people learn how work works

The North East Local Learning and Employment Network (NELLEN) has released a report on a youth-led project on employment in the region. The 'How Work Works' project engaged five local interns aged from 17 to 25 to investigate employment,

workforce development and industry growth in the Towong, Alpine, Indigo and Wodonga regions.

This research has resulted in four pieces of good news, four things young people need to hear and four recommendations to school, government, and policy makers.

WorkingalongsidetheformerFoundationforYoungAustralians

Director and strategic researcher, Jeanette Pope, the interns have interviewed 18 local businesses across eight industries of growth in North East Victoria and 79 local young people.

The interns took on the responsibility of creating the employer interview and youth survey designs, contacting the businesses and producing online content to ensure that Covid-19 did not impact

their efforts.

Intern Sophia Feeney-Nesire said "We shouldn't disregard the importance of education or the advantage of technical skills but it's not the 'make or break' to gaining employment.

"Many responsibilities count as 'work experience' so young people shouldn't feel discouraged if they haven't had the opportunity of formal work experience arrangements."

The research highlighted gaps between what young people are being taught to do when job hunting and what local employers are seeking.

The findings of the research project will be used to inform 10 round table forums between businesses and schools in the four North East municipalities in 2022, workshopping place-based solutions to this issue.






