

## **Early scouting days remembered**

After a long hiatus, the 1st Corryong Scout Group was reformed in 2020 and is once again providing young people with the skills for life.

However, after a previous revival following WWII. the group eventually went into recess in 1999.

At the time, Corryong woman Helen Malitz was asked to collect information about local mounted scouts.

Three former scouts Albert Mildren, Gordon Herbert and Robert Whitehead wrote to her and the following are some of their recollections:-Albert Mildren (Pictured)

I joined the 1st Corryong Troop in 1939 (scout number 92525).

The scout master of the day was Rev Wade, his scout name being 'Skipper'. He was Methodist minister of nearby Cudgewa and helped reform the 1st Corryong Troop after a long recess.

He took a group of scouts to the 1938-39 Sydney Jamboree at Bradfield Park. There is a good chapter of the early and recent Scout and Guide history in T W Mitchell's book 'Corryong and the Man from Snowy River Country' published in 1981 (ISBN 0959627413).

During my own experience some of the outstanding persons were Kel Pearson, Skipper Wade, Chas Brown, Kanga Coulson, Ian Col McClure, Hales, Cameron McMillan, Robert Whitehead, T W Mitchell. Len Lebner, Rev. Dunklya Hunkin. Committee members were Chas Lebner, H Nankervis and H Kaigin.

Weekly meetings from 1937 until 1941 were held



in the Athenaeum Hall. The present scout hall was opened in 1941. After the departure

of Skipper, Thomas Coulson Tregarthum arrived. He really lifted the troop with his ideas and great character and was very popular with all. He conducted proper meetings, organised patrols. He started competitions at meetings

and during outings and camps. World War 11 was at its height. The scouts collected waster paper, rubber and metal and helped with the wood for absent cutting servicemen's families. The local postmaster held Morse code for prospective RAAF recruits. Several senior scouts attended

these sessions. In company of Graham Stevens I took a leader's course at Gilwell Park in 1942. Scouts grew onions for seed to send to

England. Kanga Coulson left

Corryong in 1944. The troop was carried on by Mr Ian Hales, assisted by Rev. Hunkin (Tiger), Col McClure and myself. After my resignation

Robert Whitehead and others carried on. activities I Some

remember included Corryong Scouts travelling to Albury for an Easter Rally in 1940. We embarked by train from Cudgewa. It took all day to arrive at Albury showgrounds. We had inter-troop competitions and camped on the showground in tents.

TW Mitchell organised camps, boating etc at his property and at the Mitta arm of the Hume dam, called the 'Head of the Mitta'. Many competitions on the water were held. Mr Mitchell organised an army helicopter and crew to demonstrate rescue Wodonga operations. and Tallangatta troops all attended.

In 1947 a local transport operator took

the troop on a camping tour to Canberra via Yass and returned via Wagga, Tumut and Cooma. While in Canberra we were accommodated by local scout scouts at their hall on Black Mountain, near the present site of ANU.

Mr Embery also took us on another jaunt to Deniliquin, Echuca Bendigo etc. meeting local troops at every stop.

Kanga Coulson sadly died at Daylesford in the late 1940s.We attended a memorial service in the Anglican church in Corryong. We also had an earlier memorial service for Baden-Powell (Scouts founder), this time at the local Methodist church 1941.

A mounted patrol was formed in Corryong for scouts interested in horsemanship. Notables were Gordon Herbert, Kevin Carlyle and M Findlay.

I failed in my attempt at First Class badge when Jim Greenhill and I were lost in the bush at Bunroy!

Sir Rohan Delacombe visited Corryong in his capacity as Victorian Chief Scout to dedicate a lake side Scout-Guide Chapel at the Mitchell property in April 1969.

Scouts and Guides formed a Guard of Honour for the departure of Princess Anne at Corryong airfield after a visit to the Snowy Mountains area.

I left the Scout Movement in 1945 after starting a five-year motor mechanic apprenticeship. To increase my £2-2-6 weekly wage I took on sleeping duty at the local manual telephone exchange for £3 per week. Not much time for other activities! I still had an interest in

Scouting.

I visited the HQ in

London in 1957 and noted the interest at that time in world-wide Scout Rodeo contests.

In 1976 I visited Mafeking in South Africa where it all began at the turn of the century. Gordon Herbert

About 1934 I became a lone scout but little came of it then. On 14/3/1946 I was discharged from the A.I.F. and returned to my pre-war employment at Towong Hill station.

Shortly after, my employer Mr T W Mitchell, asked if I would lead a mounted scout group. I said 'yes' but stipulated that the numbers be limited to six (I I had visions of carnage if greater numbers of horses and boys came together at one time!).

If you don't vote and don't have a valid excuse, you may be fined.

## Water comes to Corryong

Celebrating Corryong's Centenary of Reticulation By John Murphy

Next Thursday, October 10th will mark exactly 100 years since the residents of Corryong were connected to reticulated (piped) or mains pressure water. For a dry town perched

up on the edge of Playles Hill, where the benefits of a permanent water supply were obvious, obtaining such had been a long and difficult road.

Corryong was officially designated a town in 1875 and from that time until late 1924 householders businesses were and totally reliant for all their domestic and trade water needs on water tanks and often, unreliable wells sunk into granite soil. The thought of additional water for decorative and vegetable gardens and other green spaces was out of the question and during late summer and in times of drought, water shortages during the early days of Corryong, were severe. The town sits near

two clear, crisp mountain streams and in times of scarcity water could be supplied from Hanson's Bridge on Parish Lane

(approximately 3kms distant) or School Lane (approximately 2kms) and the Thowgla Bridge (approximately 3.5kms from town) via water carts but by these means it was expensive to purchase and difficult to handle and time-consuming to procure.

prospect The of reticulating the town was first investigated when Government Surveyor Mr E. J. Brown, Chief Engineer of the Water Supply Department, Melbourne, made his way to Corryong in 1889. Reticulation had been achieved in other rural towns to great benefit.

The obvious advantage of Corryong's location was the two nearby streams emanating from the mountains and these he considered as viable options to supply the town's needs. water The two streams were Corryong Creek (also known as Nariel Creek further upstream) and Thowgla Creek. Both had reasonable 'fall' at were not too great a distance to supply the township with water by natural

gravitation. The thought at that time of pumping water up to the town (at an elevation of 314 metres) was out of the question. The only appliance in those days capable of such was a steam engine connected to a hydraulic pump which would have needed constant attention and a never-ending supply of fuel.

Dismissing this option, Brown conducted a contour survey to potentially cut an open channel to the Corryong starting at 100 feet (30.5m) above the business centre of the town to "points of supply" on both Thowgla Creek and Corryong or Nariel Creek with a fall of two feet per mile (0.38 metres/ kilometre). He envisaged bringing the water to his chosen starting point on the slopes of Playles Hill via an open water race and this fall would allow the water to flow without eroding the walls or bed of the race.

Coincidently, he found the distance following up both valleys to where the streams could be tapped was the same at eleven and a half miles

In his report he designated that the Corryong Creek scheme would be the more at £1,000 (\$2,000) using favourable of the two in that during the summer months Thowgla Creek had a much-reduced supply. At this time (1889) Corryong's population amounted to 110 souls. He estimated the costs at £995 (\$1990) for the construction of the race and other infrastructure but this did not take into account compensation to the land holders through which the race would pass. Despite all this good work Brown's report languished on various people's desks and the scheme was taken

(approximately 18.5kms).

no further. In 1895 Councillor C. M. Findlay called a public meeting in Corryong to consider a proposal for a water supply sourced from Thowgla Creek. This was devised by Towong Shire Engineer Mr Peter Wright. It was a variation on Surveyor E. J. Brown's proposal. In the mid 1890s Corryong's population was estimated at 280 individuals, its numbers being very recently

increased by the discovery of gold on Mount Elliot.

The cost of the scheme was calculated an open water race from the point of supply on the upper reaches of the Thowgla Valley to the site already chosen for the reservoir above the town. However, Findlay's proposal was considered too great a financial burden by a majority of other councillors in the Corryong Riding and the scheme was voted down. Little did they realise how much they would rue this decision.

mid-1890s The saw the beginnings of the great Federation Drought so-called because it commenced in 1895 and reigned until 1903 - right through transformational the period in our history where Australia became a single nation. It was perhaps the most severe drought experienced since European arrival and many experts still consider it was more damaging than any drought since.

### Big dry forced the water issue

*Cont. from page 4.* The extreme dry spell affected mostly the eastern states. The worst years were 1901 and 1902.

Corryong, although being reasonably drought resistant, did not escape its consequences.

The Federation Drought was absolutely ruinous, especially for rural Australia and the smell of death hung everywhere. This long extended dry spell saw enormous stock losses. Sheep numbers Australia wide fell from 91 million to 54 million and cattle numbers fell from 11.8 million to seven million. In addition to this, in Eastern Australia, rabbit numbers increased to plague proportions and they stripped the country of nearly all vegetation in their desperate quest for sustenance. This saw the end to many long-term farming dynasties - some which had existed since early squatting days. With the majority of livestock lost on many properties, debts could not be paid and banks foreclosed with their owners losing everything.

Near Mildura the Murray River ran dry and more locally, both Corryong Creek and Thowgla Creek ceased to flow. Once again water had to be carted from Corryong Creek and this was sourced from questionable pools still remaining in the creek's bed. Water for drinking purposes had to be boiled. Also during this period, students at the Corryong Rural School had to bring their own water in bottles as no water was available on the school grounds. How the horses in the school paddock coped during the day isn't known.

Through the next two decades, since the worst years of the drought, with regard to the water situation, among those concerned there was still much indecision, differences of opinion and delay with some still opposed to reticulation.

Another proposal, with various alternatives, was submitted in 1912. This time, although not completely disposing of the idea of an open race, the committee also looked at piping water to the town reservoir; one of the main factors being the continuing rabbit plague. One way of dealing with these pests was poison baits but when they ate them, they soon afterwards headed for the nearest pools and dams to find relief and these water sources became putrid with their corpses. By this time costs for the scheme had risen considerably with the Shire Engineer submitting the following:-• Piped water from Nariel Creek - Wooden were being pipes considered -£5,000

(\$10,000) t • Open channel from 5 Nariel Creek - £4,000 (\$8,000)

• Pumped water from

Thowgla Creek near the Cudgewa Butter Factory -£3,000 (\$6,000)

• Pumped water from Corryong Creek near Hanson's Bridge (Briggs Gap Road) - £3,000 (\$6,000) The above expenses

included the cost of the town reservoir and reticulation and, if the Thowgla Creek option was not taken up, then the Butter Factory would be supplied with water from the town.

Still, nothing was done in making a final decision and physically getting the project off the ground. Then came the drought of 1914, another drought so severe that Corryong Creek, below Mt Mittamatite, ceased to flow.

Another public meeting was held in September 1916 this time with a more determined committee comprising Mr Albert Bartlett, a strong and long-time advocate of reticulation, Mr T. Brown, Mr A. Acocks, Mr Hamilton and Councillor Nankervis. H. The meeting was convened at the Athenaeum Hall, forerunner to the Memorial Hall. The Towong Shire Engineer, Mr. Sambell, was also in attendance to offer technical advice.

At this time Corryong's population, even with many young men away at the war, stood at about 500.





Cont. from page 3. We recruited Len Lebner, Mervyn Findlay, Kevin Carlyle, Jack Tyrell and Stewart Findlay. We rallied at monthly intervals at the scout hut (a hut near the stock yards and stables at Towong Hill). We raised the flag, then carried out normal scouting activities. We also made a deal

with Mr Alan Hamilton, whereby a number (10 or so) of his 12 to 15 month old jersey steers were fed on Towong Hill grass, in return for being yarded, lasooed and then riddened on rally days.

We had one daylong horseback ride to the big point on Indi range, ascending from Biggara Valley and descending to the Khancoban Valley. We planned a week-

long ride with pack horses to the Toolong area. Mr O A Rixon was to be our guide and we were set to go when the sudden death of my mother put an end

to those plans. Subsequent happenings caused the folding of that mounted scout troop. We operated between

the end of March and the end of December 1946. I think attendance was

close to 100 per cent. During this time a group of Department of Information photographers

stayed at Towong Hill for a few days. We invited them to a mini rodeo that we held. They came as spectators although some became participants. One, a Mr Bothouley, elected to ride a jersey steer which pitched him off. We named that steer 'Bothouley's

Folly'. Mr J P Pierce and his sons, Johnny and Murray, came that day. They gave lessons in whip cracking,

and running of the Upper Murray Pony Club. This active involvement lasted for 30 years. Today we have three children, their spouses and six grandchildren actively involved in the movement. I feel that although Mounted Scouts may have faded, the pony club movement (with similar goals) is flourishing. **Robert Whitehead** 

I became a member of the movement in 1939 while being in Corryong after the destruction of our house in the 1939 bushfires.

I recall a camp at Albury showground - must have been a district camp with a large number of events and sporting competitions. Our transport must have been by train from Cudgewa to Wodonga as I seem to remember being one of several - not all - our troop riding our bikes across to Albury.

We had Christmas holiday camps at Stacey's Bridge and Colemans (now John Whitsed's at the top of Biggara); travelling to these on the back of a truck, made available by Messrs Kaighin and Vickery, who operated a general merchant's store, for at least some of the camps.

One Sunday afternoon early in my day we went to Cudgewa and gathered a load of wood from, I think, Carkeek's property for Rev Wade, our scout master a Methodist minister whose house was at Cudgewa.

We had a special service and gathering at the scout hall at the time of Baden-Powell's death.

Day trips were made to 'Towong Hill' and the lagoon below the homestead for swimming,

and

canoeing

'Lake Possum' or Possum Puddle available for scouting activities and I understand an area containing the waterhole was made the property of the movement. However discussions with region leaders shortly before I left the movement indicated a degree of uncertainty about the situation.

The troop took part in the district camp at Tallangatta "the head of the Mitta", organised by Tom Mitchell when district Scoutmaster.

Corryong had, to my knowledge, the only mounted troop and Alex Masters and Mark and Ron Waters would be able to help you with that group pre-war.

There was reformation organised by Tom Mitchell and led by Gordon Herbert. Others from Cudgewa whom I think were members and brought to meetings by Rev Wade were Ken Jarvis and Max Carkeek. There were some others but not in the district anymore as I recall.

Scout leaders in my time were Rev Wade assisted by Kel Pearson, Rev Jamison, Presbyterian minister, 'Kanga' Coulson, Col McClure, Albert Mildren, Jim Embery (the latter three being late postwar when I was away from the troop).

I was assistant to Jim Embery when he left the district and I carried on as an acting Scoutmaster for a number of years as a full leader was not found. I later became a group leader. Howard Smith was my successor.

The troop always was part of the ANZAC day march and service.



Snowy Valleys Council (SVC) has issued a bluegreen algae 'Red Alert' for Mannus Lake and warning signs are in effect at key recreational areas around

> the lake. Red levels alert represent 'bloom conditions. The water may appear green and may have strong, musty or organically polluted odours. Blue-green algae may be visible as clumps or as scums.

The 'blooms' should be considered to be toxic to humans and animals, and the water should not be used for drinking (without prior treatment), stock watering, or for recreation.

On advice from WaterNSW people are reminded not to enter the water, not to drink untreated water or bathe in water drawn from the lake or creek while the red alert level warning is in place.

Livestock owners should monitor stock water supplies and remove stock from waters where surface scum is visible or blue-green algae is suspected.

A red alert level indicates that warning






