Holiday tax will hit hard

Victorian border towns along the Murray River will be hit hardest by the Victorian government's new Holiday Tax on short accommodation. according to Liberal Member for Northern Victoria, Wendy Lovell.

Bill 2024, which will be debated in the Victorian parliament this week, seeks to introduce a 7.5 per cent slug on short stay accommodation available through online platforms such as Airbnb or Stayz.

"The Holiday Tax The Short Stay Levy will hit the economies

Victorian destinations along the Murray River hardest, as visitors will be tempted to stay at cheaper accommodation across the border in NSW where the tax will not be charged," Ms Lovell said.

"The new tax will push tourists away from accommodation providers on the Victorian side of the river and rip tourism income from communities.

"About half Victoria's 36,000 shortstay accommodation properties are in regional Victoria, but the Labor government will only invest 25 per cent of the collected revenue into building affordable regional homes," Ms Lovell added.

"This is a total investment of \$750,000 and is due for practical completion in February/ March 2025 in time for the festival," Mr Jackson said.

"Once completed, this will take total investment at the recreation reserve by the festival to well over \$1.25M which is an incredible result for the community.

"This year we will also embark on a much needed upgrade to the fleet of toilet trailers with conversion of the pump units to flushing cisterns, to correct the issues we have had with blocked toilets due to the nature of the old flushing systems.

"Our financials reflect a well governed and planned organisation and decisions made by this board over the last five years have been significant and is the reason we find ourselves in a positive financial position, whereas many of our peers are struggling to stay afloat.

"During this current board's tenure we have had to deal with the 2029-20 Black Summer Bushfires, the pandemic, a cancelled 2020 event and we just got the 2021 event off the ground in trying to deal with a belligerent government, oblivious to what this secondary cancellation would have done to this community.

"Basically, the event would have ceased to exist.

"Now we are dealing with cost of living pressures and inflation meaning that disposable income is reduced and yet, we book out every year which is a credit to all involved."

Mr Jackson also announced that ticket prices for the 2025 event have been increased by 17.5 per cent.

This will allow for the inevitable increase in costs while still looking to bring in a profit of around 10 per cent which enables capital growth and vertical integration expansion," he explained.

"We provide a payroll in excess of \$400,000 to this local community in addition to the benefit to local businesses and contractors which runs into the hundreds of have already been booked for the 2025 festival. thousands directly from the festival, let alone the income from attendees and tourism as a result." In a 2019 study by

the Victorian government in partnership the Victorian Tourism Industry Council, it was estimated that the festival brings in excess of \$7.2M to the local community annually.

"The investment of \$150,000 in the initial purchase of the toilet and shower trailers has also proven to be a master stroke with annual hire of these facilities exceeding \$100,000," Mr Jackson said.

"They are available to benefit other community events such as the bushfire relief centre and Towong Cup.

"Through the Jewish

Foundation we have been able to acquire five stateof-the-art generators which not only limit our hire expenses but have also been loaned out to several businesses around town to run refrigeration and other infrastructure during power outages.

"Through relationship we recently acquired a larger generator which fully powers the food court during the festival. In an agreement with the recreation reserve committee, this generator will be permanently installed to back up the reserve's battery bank, ensuring critical services to the events centre as the place of last resort in Corryong.'

Mr Jackson also acknowledged that the entire event would simply not be possible without dedicated board members, staff and volunteers.

"On behalf of the board I would like to personally thank you all," he said.

Mr Jackson did not stand for re-election to the board at the annual meeting.

The following were elected to the board -Nicole Martin (acting chairperson/secretary), Anna Beirs (treasurer), Shea Bloom , Jodie Grzeschka, Jayden Pierce, Nicole Faithfull, Sarah Whiteley and Greg Hillier.

Ticket sales for the 2025 festival are once again strong and much of the main golf course camping area is already sold out.


Coming together to celebrate milestone

A dedicated member and supporter of the Corryong Craft Shop was bestowed with Life Membership at the group's annual general meeting on Tuesday, for her four decades of service.


Thea Newton has served on the committee for many of those years starting in 1985; illing various roles from general committee member, assistant treasurer and treasurer, continuing to the present day.

Councillor role can be rewarding

As the current fouryear term of Towong Shire Council comes to an end, it's time for me to declare that I will not be seeking re-election.

I would like to continue as a councillor, however many of you will not be aware of the serious health issues that my wife is dealing with but would understand that looking after her is more important.

Thank you for the privilege of representing and advocating for our community, along with the responsibility of participating in council's strategic planning. took my role seriously and am proud to have been part of a respectful, diligent group, even when decisions didn't go the way I would have liked.

There's a lot that I would like to say and comment on, so let's start

My highlights have been encouraging and assisting the volunteers with the whole Playles Hill redevelopment from conception; advocating for the completion and extension of the High Rail Trail, leading to the adoption of a masterplan for its implementation; some improvements with remote telecommunications, especially in fire-affected areas; and improvement in staff culture and the level of customer service.

My frustrations have included not completing upgrades and negotiating a new lease for Colac Colac Caravan Park; no resolution to issues affecting Corryong Early Years' services and facilities; and cost over runs and delays to some major capital works projects.

Having said that, our council is extremely under-resourced and under-funded but together we have achieved a lot.

I have observed councillors and staff make decisions based on facts, the best available information and in the interests of the community - which still sometimes disappoints, frustrates and angers some community members

It does intrigue and surprise me that many residents criticise council for obtaining grants to fund certain infrastructure projects across the shire. Why are we spending ratepayers' funds on that?

That's a useless waste of funds, why don't they spend that money on instead?

The facts are that state and federal grants are nearly always for a specific purpose - not a free hit to be used wherever we want. Staff have become very adept at tailoring grant applications to meet either current or upcoming infrastructure needs, which reduces the use of ratepayer funds in the long

Often projects will be identified that renew aging or dated infrastructure or address priorities in the four-year Council Plan. That's another reason why residents should participate in the Council Plan consultation that will occur early in 2025.

Have I been satisfied with council's performance? Yes and no. Do I wish some aspects

were better? Yes.

Did I make a difference? I believe so. Many probing questions were a feature of my tenure, as was the ability to remain calm, dignified and committed, sometimes in the face of unacceptable behaviour



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Reiland bulls meet market demand

Above average maternal traits combined with carcase were on the bucket list for commercial beef producers at the Reiland Angus 2024 spring bull sale last Friday with prices topping at \$30,000.

Interfaced with AuctionsPlus, the sale was hosted by the Lucas family at Killimicat Station at Tumut and drew buyers from NSW and Victoria including several new stud and commercial clients.

A total of 67 bulls sold under the hammer from the 70 offered for a 96 per cent clearance and average of \$10,209.

Among clients were Greg and Sally Chappell, Dulverton Angus at Glenn Innes, securing the top price bull for \$30,000. The rising 16-month-old Reiland U-Recharge U23 was sired by Dunoon Recharge R102 and out of the famed Braebell cow family.

The 666kg young sire ranked on BREEDPLAN top 15 per cent for calving ease, a breed average birthweight of +4.5kg, 600-day weight of +144kg, an eye muscle area of +8.9sqcm, top 5 per cent for intramuscular fat at +4.6. Reiland Angus reserved the right to collect semen.

Whale, Dick Breeding Services of Wangaratta, secured the bull for Dulverton Angus and said the stud had been selecting bulls on a combination of BREEDPLAN data and Igenity Beef genomic profile.

"All the Reiland U bulls were tested using Igenity Beef and U-Recharge was the highest indexing bull," he said.

"His sire Recharge is doing a good job in the industry and his grandmother was the \$25,000 high sell cow in the Reiland 50th anniversary sale.

"Many recent sales have struggled on clearance and to sell 67 bulls for \$10,209 is very good. These strong phenotype bulls found their mark. People like to have carcase but as long as the bulls are sound, free moving and with adequate muscle, it suits them. I like to see yield in cattle as well as carcase attributes."

Reiland co-principal, Mark Lucas, was humbled with the sale result following a challenging winter to prepare bulls.

"According to industry pundits, in spring 2026 people will be selling the steer progeny of the bulls bought here for 30 per cent more than what they are today," Mr Lucas said.

"We have come through the dark phase

and now there is a positive outlook for the industry as we move through recovery.

"Relative areas under seasonal including constraint, northern Victoria and the Upper Murray, it was an exceptional sale. I respect the no nonsense program of Dulverton Angus and see their purchase of an elite young Reiland sire for use in their genetic program as a feather in our cap.

"It was clear the commercial buyers were looking for breed average birthweight and calving ease, growth at least 20 per cent over the average and balanced carcase data.

"It appears that IMF or EMA were considered equally and it's up to us to keep our genetics in that zone where we are driving better carcase yet retaining positive fats."

Purchasing the second top price bull was repeat client Dougal Kelly, Wallah Pastoral at Rugby, NSW, taking home eight bulls to a top of \$20,000 and average of \$12,375 for his spring calving 1600 Reiland blood cow herd.

Among the volume buyers were Houston Pastoral at Burrowye who bought three bulls to a top

"Clients with surplus females will be calculating their matings now and are asked to register their interest," Mr Lucas said.

"The sale will be linked with AuctionsPlus and I do believe the time is right for a quality female sale."

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Tools help assess dam water levels

Agriculture Victoria has a range of online tools available to assist farmers in assessing the volume of water in their dams and how long that water may last.

Agriculture Victoria Land Management Extension Officer, Clem Sturmfels, said assessing how much water there is in a dam can be difficult due to it's odd shape and formulas used to measure their volume.

"Farm dams generally hold less water than expected and in a dry year, it's important farmers have a good understanding of how much water is left in their dams and plan accordingly," Mr Sturnfels said.

"The volume of a dam is closely related to its length and width. A stable, well-built dam has gently sloping sides which nearly meet in the middle of the dam's base.

"For example, a rectangular dam measuring 33m by 22m has a depth of approximately 3m and volume of approximately 1 million litres or 1 megalitre. A triangular shaped dam with similar measurements has a volume of approximately half this amount.

"Evaporation cause a loss of around 60 per cent of this volume leaving the dam with enough water to carry approximately 200 sheep or 20 cattle for one year.

"Many dams rely on a regular top-up of water during autumn or spring, however this year has seen dry seasonal conditions, making the chance of a top up less likely due to depleted soil moisture and less runoff," Mr Sturmfels

Agriculture Victoria has several tools to help farmers calculate dam volumes based on shape, length, width and depth, including the Farm Water Calculator and the Summer Water Calculator.

The Summer Water Calculator also helps to calculate how long the remaining water may last.

The depth of a dam can be measured using a depth sounder or fishing line measuring device.



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
