Radio station ramps up

Seventeen community organisations across Victoria will share in bushfire recovery grants to build, upgrade or repair important local facilities.

Minister for Emergency Services, Jaclyn Symes, Recovery Victoria. joined Memberfor Eastern

Victoria, Tom McIntosh, to announce the latest at community halls and recipients to share in more than \$660,000 in Bushfire Recovery Grants for Community Facilities, delivered by Bushfire

The successful projects



will improve facilities encourage community connection through new and improved sporting areas and gardens.

In the North East, the volunteer-run Upper Murray Community Radio Inc will receive \$29,000 to co-locate the community radio station with the local community hall.

"Community radio stations play a vital role broadcasting emergency information and connecting communities before, during and after emergencies," Ms Symes said. The project includes refurbishment works at the Walwa Memorial Hall and expanding coverage across the district. "We have listened to local communities about projects that are important to them and we are investing in communities so they can build resilience for future emergencies," Ms Symes said.

By Christine McKee The death of Queen Elizabeth II last week has revived recollections of royal connections for several residents of Mt Mittamatite Lodge aged care facility.

An Englishman and a Royalist his whole life, former Tintaldra Hotel owner, Alf Wilson was absolutely devastated when he heard of Queen Elizabeth's passing.

"My wife called me in the morning to tell me the Queen had died and I just

blubbered," he said. Alf (86) never actually met the Queen but he did come within 20 feet of her while enlisted in the British Army during the 1960s.

Alf was in the 44th Heavy Anti-aircraft Artillery and the Queen was doing the rank and file and he was close enough to see her.

"I love the Queen, I swore allegiance to her twice," he said

"It was her presence and the fact that she was a lovely lady and always smiling.

Royal memories recalled

"She was just an absolute treasure."

A decade earlier, on the other side of the world, a young Keith Owen saddled up his best horse for an occasion that had

captured the entire nation. Keith and a young friend rode from Surrey Hills in Melbourne to

Kooyong to see the young Queen Elizabeth on her first visit to Australia - the first visit by any reigning monarch.

with huge Faced crowds, Keith (94) said they had a very good view from horseback.

"We dared not push through the crowds and annoy the police, we just used the better elevation we had on the horses to get a good view," he said.

"We thought very kind thoughts of her, she was our future. We were very impressed with her, she was a lovely looking girl and charming to the crowd."

If there was anyone with a front-row seat to Royalty, it was 83-yearold Jim Guttridge.

Jim was a mechanic. and in 1963 he recalls being employed to look after the Queen's five Rolls Royce vehicles, with one kept in each of the state capitals.

He was tasked with keeping them in tip top shape for whenever they were needed.

Although he never picnic baskets while they met Her Majesty, he did meet her husband, Prince Phillip, the Duke of Edinburgh

"He was very good to me, he encouraged me to keep working and keep trying," Jim said.

"We were driving in the car and then we got out and had a walk."

Jim says he doesn't remember how but he knew a lot about Rolls Rovces.

"They were a beautiful car, mainly the beautiful body but the engine was the same as all cars."

They didn't know each other then but two of Mittamatite Lodge's residents - Joyce Moloney (92) and Olive Button (98) - were both among the huge crowds that lined the streets of Wagga in February 1954.

The Queen was in Australia to thanks the nation for its supprt during WWII and to the delight of thousands headed into the regions.

She and her husband spent two and half hours in Wagga in what has become remembered as the most important day in the town, ever.

"We saw her walk," Jovce said. "Everyone lined up

along the road to see her. We couldn't get a good look but we did catch a glimpse.

"We all took food and He's learned a lot," he everyone was eating out of

that day was "a very long time ago." "All the school kids were lined up and I remember she looked lovely," she recalled.

And while 101-yearold Vera Bailey recalls seeing the Queen on her visit to the Upper Murray and the Snowy Hydro Scheme, it was on February 18, 2020 that she received a letter, celebrating her 100th birthday.

Olive, who is two years

older than the Queen, said

"Someone said I'd be getting a letter from the Queen and I said 'I'll just have to wait and see' and I did!" Vera said proudly.

The letter arrived in the mailbox. Her Majesty didn't ask for a response, nor did she receive one but Vera was delighted.

"I thought 'fancy me getting a letter from the Queen'," she said.

"I felt very sad when she passed away because I felt I had some connection to her.


"She was a wonderful lady who had people's concerns at heart.







returning from injury and Isaac Lampe lined up on league goalkicking winner Nick Brockley, who was noticeably hampered by an ankle injury as the game went on.

At the other end, the Blues were relying on Kade Small and Darcy McKimmie to put the clamps on the Roos' sharpshooting trio of Dan Hitchens, Tyler Lampe and James Crozier with support from Jack and James McInerney. The decided favourites

flew the gates from the first bounce but Hitchens set the tone for his day by missing a relatively easy shot.

Soon afterwards, play was stopped for a couple of minutes when Henry Waters was cleaned up with a heavy bump and left
